## Audit of RISD Made Recently

An audit of the funds of the Ranger Independent School District was made recently by an Abilene firm and presented to the board of trustees who approved the audit which showed a cash balance in each fund.

Funds audited included the State and County Available, Local Maintenance, Transportation, Student Activity Fund of the High School and the Interest and Sinking Fund better known as the Bond Account.

In the State and County Available Fund, the opening cash balance Sept. 1, 1967, was \$4,130.59 with receipts of \$45,475 from Eastland County, \$55,439.64 from the State of Texas for a total income and receipts of \$55,015.98.

Budgetary Disbursements totaled \$59,589.84 leaving a balance of \$26.14 on August 31, 1968.

The Local Maintenance Fund opened in September with a balance of \$1,712.35. Local taxes accounted for \$69,578.79 more. County sources for \$483.15 and State sources for \$119,479.57. Expense reimbursement from Ranger Junior College was \$5,547.03, making receipts total \$196,800.89.

Disbursements were \$196,410.65, leaving a cash balance on August 31, 1968, of \$390.24.

The Transportation or School Bus Fund opened last September with \$603.62, received \$19.31 locally, \$9,220 from the State and \$1,050 transfer from Local to help pay for cost of new buses and for use of buses for other than hauling students to and from school. Total bus receipts were \$10,882.93.

The sum of \$10,867.00 was disbursed from the account, leaving \$25.93 on August 31, 1968.

If you haven't driven around town in the evening, we suggest a tour of the town.

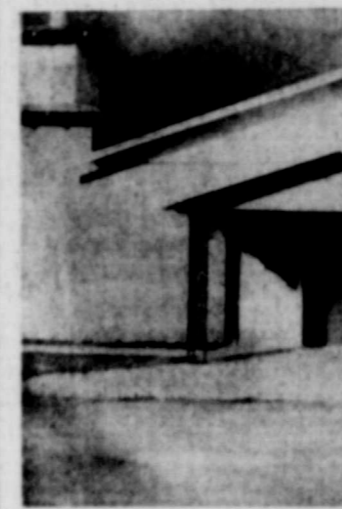

## Habitat Needs of Bobwhite Quails Outlined by Soil Conservationist

Now that the 1968 hunting season is in full swing, the number two small game bird in Texas, the bobwhite quail, supplies many hours of recreation and many pounds of meat for Texas outdoorsmen.

Texas has more than a million hunters, and the survey conducted by the Bureau of the Census in 1960 showed that 321,000 quail hunters bagged 9.8 million birds.

Food, water and cover are

the keys to bobwhite survival. Knowledge of quail needs does not in itself insure bobwhite's continued welfare. This knowledge, to be helpful in wildlife management, must be applied to land-use practices found throughout the quail's range. Bobwhite habitat varies in character with the differences in soils and climate. Always, whatever the make-up, quail habitat comes down to this: a piece of ground capable of providing at least one covey with all its life needs season after season. This includes protection from enemies while feeding, resting, loafing, roosting, traveling, and nesting.

A number of woody plants provide winter quail food. Quail readily eat the smaller acorns, such as those from post oak, Mesquite beans, wild grapes & plums, hackberry

simac berries and other products of woody plants occasionally are eaten by bobwhite. Stockmen should note that grasses contribute little to food needs of bobwhite. This is because few grass seeds are large enough to provide worthwhile food. All farm grown grains, including corn are acceptable to quail in general however, it can be safely said that woods are the most widely distributed source of quail food and woods respond most reliably to management of quail habitat.

Quail cannot live without cover. Cover requirements may be provided by protection of woody cover on range, shallow discing adjoining wide fence rows, or some inexpensive food and cover planting with protection from grazing.

Bobwhite requires access out of all proportion to his small size. The maximum population attainable is believed to be one bobwhite per acre for any large block of range such as a farm or ranch. Because

the average covey consists of 10 to 15 bobwhites, a block 15 acres will seldom support more than one covey. Thus, the acreage requirements of a bobwhite covey are equal to, or greater than, the acres required per cow over most of the native grazing range of Texas.

All farmers, ranchers and outdoorsmen should strive to help provide for one of our most enjoyable and beneficial friends, Mr. Bobwhite Quail.

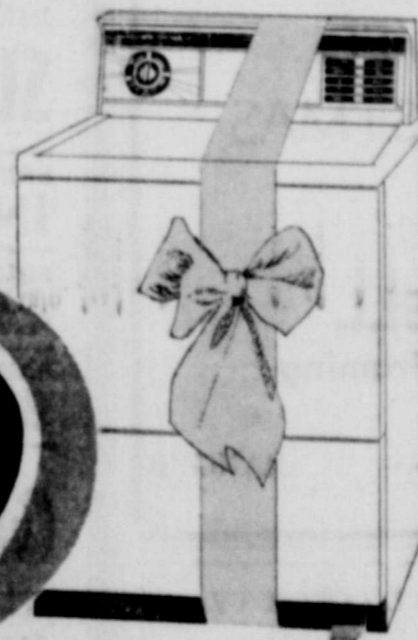
