## '25-Mile' Railroad Has Good Plans for Future

The agrusiness economy of Comanche, Erath and Eastland counties may get a "shot in the arm" if the formation last week of the Texas Central Enterprises, Inc., is a sign of coming times.

Nucleus of the company is the Peanut Line—the 24.76 miles of track from Dublin to Gorman, owned by the Texas Central Railroad.

Melvin Shell of Gorman, president of the new organization, said last week that "we must look to agriculturally-related industry because farming and ranching is the backbone of our economy"

Seven men, headed by Shell, bought the original Texas Central Railroad franchise a year ago, along with the nearly 25 miles of track.

Vice president E. G. Stafford said the railroad proved itself during the first year of operation, by hauling 1,543 boxcar loads. "This was an increase over previous year of operation by the former owners."

Stafford said the railroad company purchased 25 boxcars, initiated a truck line, & has begun renovation of the entire right-of-way.

Two major peanut mills, a brick plant, numerous feed mills and farm equipment companies are located along the tracks.

Shell said there still are "many sites available for construction," and added that a survey showed there would be labor available to work in new plants.

The firm has plans to add an excursion train for sight-seers.

"Fewer and fewer people have ever been on a passenger train," Stafford said. "We plan to give them a chance to ride one. We'll connect three day coaches to an engine and make a round trip from Dublin to DeLeon—complete with rig id-of-way attraction and a break for lunch."

He said the first departure from Dublin was scheduled for May 30.

### Dec. 31 Is Deadline for Certain Claims

Everyone of the some 4,400 Eastland countians covered by the doctor bill insurance part of Medicare since 1966 should spend part of this December reviewing whether the program owes him some money.

That is the advice of R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security's Abilene district manager, who added that this is most important for those older people who had medical expenses between Oct. 1, 1966 and Sept. 30, 1967. Appeals for payment of such expenses must be filed by Dec. 31, 1968.

Tuley pointed out that, in the past, some Medicare beneficiaries who were unable to supply evidence of having paid the doctor or the medical supplier, thought they could not file a claim. "These people are in danger of short-changing themselves," Tuley said. "The 1967 amendments of the Medicare law provide that an itemized bill, showing the services or medical goods received and the charge therefor, even if unpaid, is now sufficient for collecting from Medicare."

He issued a reminder that if the annual \$50 deductible is not met until in the last 3 months in any year, that part can be carried over to the following year as part of the deductible for that year.

All social security offices are now prepared to help people make these last minute claims for doctor bill insurance payments on services and goods received between Oct. 1, 1966, and Sept. 30, 1967, in which no Medicare claim has yet been filed?

The Abilene district office is located in the Federal Building, Room 2321. The phone number is 677-3262. Office hours are 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., weekdays, and each Tuesday evening until 7 p. m.

If not convenient to come to Abilene, a representative of that office will be at Eastland County Courthouse at 10 a.m. on Dec. 10 and 31.

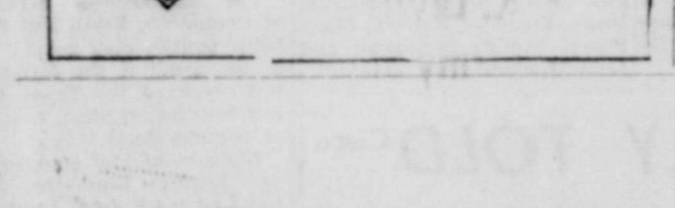
