

Postage Increase Slated Jan. 1st On Second Class

Postal rates for newspapers and magazines and other material mailed at the second-class rate will be increased January 1, the local Postmaster reminded second-class mailers today.

The increase results from the postage rate law enacted in December 1967, which raised most second-class rates in three annual steps. The Postmaster pointed out. The January 1, 1969, hike is the second phase of the increase. The first phase took effect January 7, 1968, and the third step will go into effect January 1, 1970.

The second-class rate increase affects general interest, nonprofit and classroom publications.

Rates also will go up January 1 for controlled circulation publications. These are primarily trade, technical and industrial journals which generally do not charge a subscription fee and are not eligible for second-class rates. The 1967 postal rate law called for three-step raise for controlled circulation publications, to be effective the same dates as second-class increases.

Except for home county mailings, postal rates for newspapers and magazines mailed second-class are based on the weight of the publication, the amount of advertising it contains, and the distance it is mailed.

Effective January 1, rates for editorial or non-advertising matter in commercial publications will be increased from 3 to 3.2 cents per pound, rates for advertising content depends on the distance the publication is mailed. These one rates now range from 4.6 to 15 cents per pound of advertising content. The new ad-

vertising zone rate range will be 4.9 to 16 cents.

There are special lower second-class rates for classroom publications and publications of nonprofit organizations. These rates also will be increased January 1.

The Postmaster said that second-class or controlled circulation mailers who need more detailed information on the new rates should contact the Post Office where their publications are mailed.

Poultry Heads Plentiful Food List for Month

COLLEGE STATION—What could mean more during December than a good supply of food?

Turkeys and broilers are available in big volume now, according to the Texas Agriculture Extension Service. You'll also find more adequate offerings of fresh oranges and grapefruit, dried prunes, canned tomatoes and tomato products, onions and dry beans.

All are on the December plentiful foods list compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Orange production this season is forecast at 41 per cent above average—and grapefruit production is estimated to be 26 percent more than normal. The Texas early and midseason crop is expected to be the largest in 20 years. Shipments of both oranges and grapefruit are on the upswing, according to market news offices of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service.

Volume of canned tomatoes and tomato products on hand should exceed market requirements, due to a record-high production of tomato crop processing. The last summer onion crop is the second largest on record. And dry bean output is about 14 percent over last year.

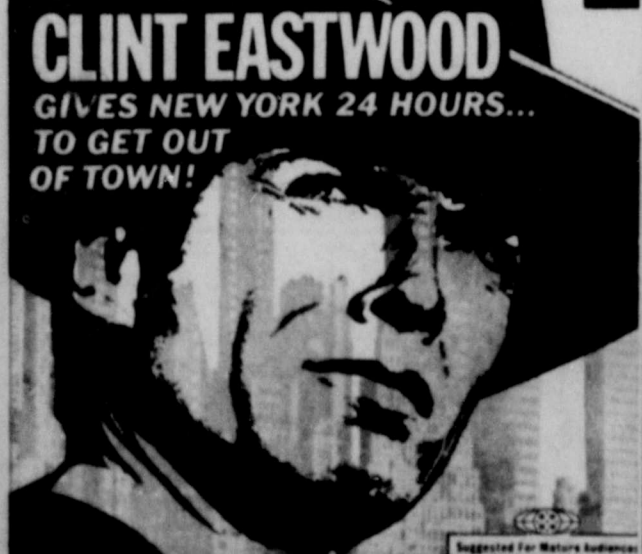

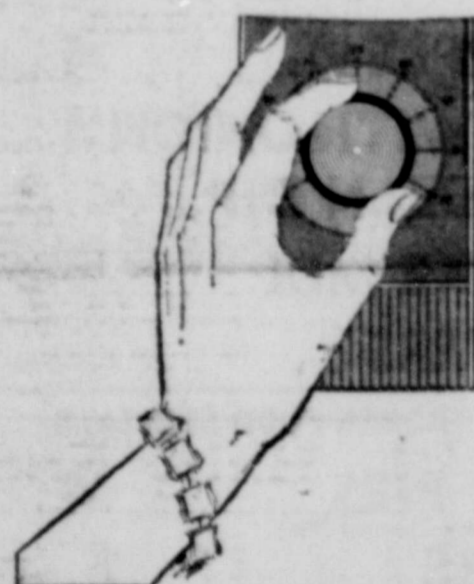

Veteran Questions & Answers

Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. 9th Street, Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions.

Q—They say I have to register with the draft board at 18. I'll arrive in Chicago that day for a two-weeks vacation from Houston. May I delay registration until I get back to Texas?

A—No. You must register on your 18th birthday, or within 5 days thereafter. Go to any board in Chicago and register, giving your residence address in Houston. Your registration card will be sent to Houston.

Q—My son is 17 years old. He wants to volunteer for induction even though he has not yet registered for the draft. Can he do this?

A—Yes, provided the parents consent. He should complete and file with the nearest local board two copies of SSS Form 254, Application for Voluntary Induction. The parents will have to consent to this by signing both forms. A guardian may also sign these forms when he consents in any case.

Q—I served four years in the Navy from January 1961 through December 1964. Am I a veteran of the Viet-Nam era?

A—Yes. All service after Aug. 4, 1964, other than active duty for training as a reservist, is considered Viet-Nam era service.

Q—I will not be released from active duty until late this summer, just in time to enroll in college for the fall semester. Can I get a certificate of eligibility from the Veterans Administration now so that I can present it to the school when I enroll?

A—No. In applying to the

VA for a Certificate of Eligibility for G. I. Bill educational benefits, you must furnish a copy of your Report of Separation (DD Form 214) with the application. And you cannot obtain this necessary form until you are actually separated from the Armed Forces.

However, this should present no problem. Your application will be handled without delay by the VA regional office where your records will be maintained. And you will receive an educational assistance allowance dating back to the time you started school.

Q—I plan to enter college under the G. I. Bill in September and intend to take one three-semester-hour course. With a wife and three children, I must also work. Will I receive extra training allowance for my dependents?

A—No. A veteran enrolled

for less than half time can be paid the cost of the course only but not to exceed \$30. Three semester hours are one quarter time for an undergraduate student. Thus you will not receive additional training allowance for your dependents.

Q—When I get out of college I still have to finish high school. Would it be smart for me not to use my G. I. Bill education and training entitlement while completing high school so that I can have all if it available for college?

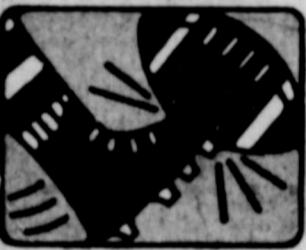

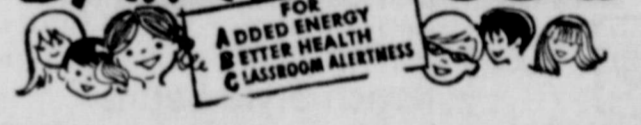
