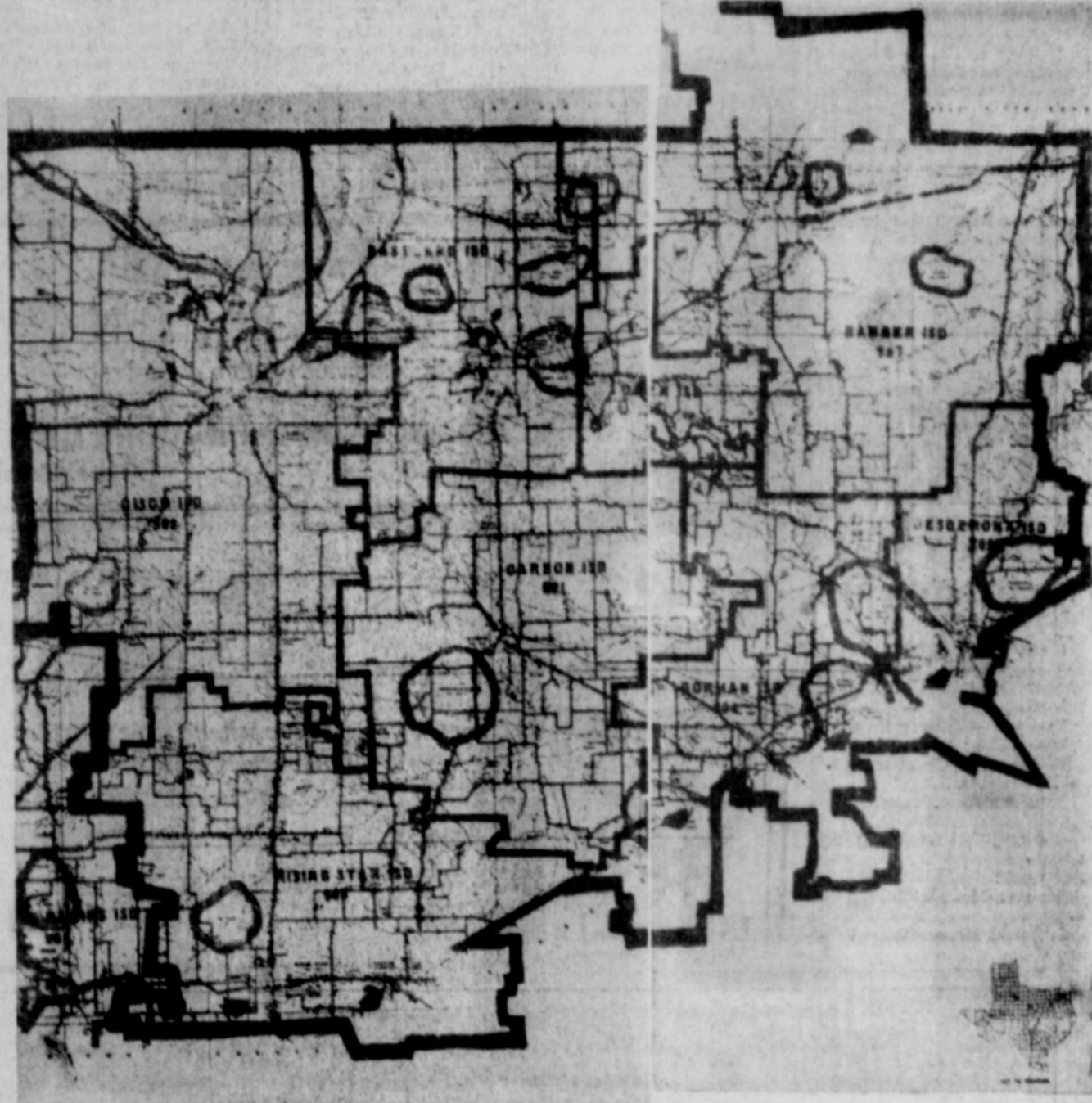


School Reorganization Plans Due To Cause Much Concern In Region

The other four is the tax rate is Ranger ISD take a tremendous jump inside of two years and the control of tax values and rates might be lost to the larger district. Presently Ranger's Local Fund Assignment is \$34,700. This would jump to \$49,200 in 69-70 and to \$60,600 in 70-71. This would be a 44 percent increase Clark said. The total tax rate would probably be doubled within two years based on present values if the Legislature should pass the bill. Manufacturing Employment Up 44% In State

Manufacturing employment rose a dramatic 44% above the most recent five-year average during 1968 as industrial de-

velopment continued at a record pace across Texas. "A total of 735 new plant locations or major expansions were reported in Texas during the year, compared with 666 the year before," Jim Harwell, Executive Director of the Texas Industrial Commission, announced in a year end report.

However, this was overshadowed by the rate of employment growth. There were 52,900 new jobs created in manufacturing during the year, 44% above the 1962-67 average of 36,725.

While new industry locations kept pace with the previous year, it was in the area of plant expansion that the bulk of the growth was recorded. Plant expansions numbered 444 during the past year, up from 370 in 1967.

The largest growth came in the area of fabricated metals, machinery (except electrical), food and kindred products, chemical and allied products, an transportation equipment.

There were 145 new plants located in Texas in these five categories of industry almost half of the 291 new factories established in the state during the year. These five industry sectors were responsible for an even more significant increase in jobs, with 62% of the new manufacturing positions recorded.

There were 35 new plants each in the fabricated metal and machinery areas, 26 in food and kindred products, 25 in chemical and allied products and 24 in transportation equipment.

The largest employment boost, however, came in the area of transportation equipment with jobs for 101,400, an increase of 15,300 during the year. Petroleum refining and related products was second with a boost of 6,900 over the 55,200 maintained in 1967.

The industrial growth, which came on the heels of an increased appropriation for the State Industrial Commission, was not limited to new plants and expansion. Export development also set new records. Using the Texas Industrial Trade Center at San Antonio World's Fair as headquarters for 1968 activity, the

THE GORDON SPOT

By DE GORDON, County Agricultural Agent

The Texas livestock men organized to control the screw-worm several years ago. Now they have formed a new organization to attack another of the state's agricultural problems. Nearly 82 percent of Texas range has been invaded by brush. The brush reduces animal carrying capacity by half or more. Brush also affects the prosperity of many Texas communities that depend on agriculture income.

The new organization has been formed to provide funds for increased research on range improvement and brush invasion of pasture lands. The organization, called the Brush Control and Range Improvement Foundation, hopes to obtain one cent per acre from each cooperating landowner each year for five years. Money collected will permit more basic research and education on brush control.

Foundation funds will support basic experiments and field trials on the various methods of control.

John Matthews, prominent Abilene area rancher, is foundation chairman. Bill Donnell of Mathison is vice chairman and Robb Brown of Throckmorton is secretary. The group already is selecting district

chairmen and county leaders eventually will be named to organize local efforts.

The new organization already had the enthusiastic support of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, Texas Farm Bureau, Texas Farmers Union and The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association. Until now, no organized effort among stockmen has been developed to help in the attack on brush. "Closing time," as it relates

to 1968 farm records, is at hand. This means totaling up the balance sheets on farm and home enterprises and taking a close, hard look at what has happened during the past year. A close look should point up the problems that must be met in planning for 1969 and the years ahead. Records often reflect whether management

changes are needed and also whether an enterprise should be expanded or dropped. Furthermore, a complete set of records is a must for proper income tax reporting. Regularly kept records can save dollars at tax paying time for deductible expenses are often overlooked, especially if paid for in cash. Too, complete farm records

are an asset when money must be borrowed for production and operating expenses. Knowing what the business is doing makes a strong talking point in making necessary credit arrangements. Farm families need facts on which to base their decisions and none are more reliable than those obtained from well-kept farm records.
