This census will include every student now in the Ranger Schools as of February 1 this year with the exception of a few seniors born after September 1, 1951, who cannot be enumerated.



A widespread police search was continuing in this region and over the state Saturday for three young men who held up a Cisco Junior College youth and abducted his girl companion at Lake Cisco Park early Friday morning.

Victims of the incident were David Cowley and Diana Brzozowski, both 18 year-old freshmen students at Cisco Junior College from Abilene.

The search for the trio was being directed by L. E. (Lefty) Sublett, Eastland County sheriff, assisted by Police Chief Clyde Brymer of Cisco, state highway patrolmen and others. It was reported that officers had a good description of the three young men.

The young couple had driven to Lake Cisco Park to release Cowley. Police saw the car, however, and stopped her. She was told that Cowley was at the police station and she accompanied them there.

The girl seemed dazed and in a state of shock, police reported. She said that the three youths had not harmed her but that she had been badly frightened by them. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Berney A. Brzozowski of 552 Buffalo Gap Road, Abilene, were notified and they came for her.

Cowley's parents, Mr. and Mrs. O. H. Cowley of 3018 Palm, Abilene, also came to Cisco and took their son back to the family home.







The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass or fail.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

Fifteen thousand volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from food production to health to education. More volunteers are needed for programs which will begin this spring and summer.

State Cabins At Lake Brownwood Get Face Lifting

BROWNWOOD — The renovation of 17 cabins in Lake Brownwood State Recreation Park, located 16 miles northwest of Brownwood in Brown County, is about 70 per cent complete, according to Paul Harris, regional parks supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Harris said the \$40,000 project includes new electrical systems, water systems and new cabins. The grounds

around the cabins will be landscaped, and grills and picnic tables for each cabin will be added.

The 538 acre park is located on the shores of 10,000 acre Lake Brownwood near the geographical center of Texas.

Presently available to the public are 55 picnic sites, five screened shelters, two group camps, 19 cabins, boat ramp, children's play area, fishing pier, and two group lodges.

Activities in the park include tent camping, trailer camping, water skiing, fishing swimming and hiking.

The price for the cabins range from \$5.50 for one person to \$9.50 for six persons.





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Letter From Thailand

Well, I'm about settled here at Korat and have grown accustomed to Thailand. How's the newspaper business doing? Hope everything is going smoothly. I'm sorry I haven't written sooner but we've been working pretty hard here. Since my outfit deals with reconnaissance, bombing halts and truces mean what much more work for us.

I'm sending along the first in a series of stories about this fascinating country hoping they can be of use to you. If you decide to use it feel free to edit or re-write any portions you feel necessary. I don't quite know how to explain some of the things I've seen or encountered to a small community like Eastland, but I think most people can understand most of the things I've written about. Again, use your judgment as to what to use.

I appreciate the article you did on my activities at Muang Nakon Ratchasima School. About the only other reward I've gotten from teaching has been the personal satisfaction I've attained from seeing those 35 bright, shiny faces looking at me in eagerness to learn. At least I feel I'm doing my part to improve the image of the American serviceman in the eyes of the Thai.

I've also become involved in orphanage work here. I haven't devoted much time to the orphans because between work and teaching and my college courses I've been kept pretty busy. I think my sister, Teresa, has a project going at school to help "my kids" out. I know it is a lot of trouble and time-consuming for people to devote some time to a bunch of little brown-skinned, slant-eyed youngsters 12,000 miles away, but I feel that this is one of the most urgent problems we have. Although Thailand has made tremendous strides in progress in the past decade, several areas

are direly lacking, and children are really suffering here. I've been reading about the bad weather in the States in the Stars and Stripes. We had a cold snap here two days ago, when it got down to 74 one night about 11:30. This may sound ridiculous, but after the hot weather we've had ever since I arrived I was actually cold. You can imagine how the Thais felt.

The immortal Bob Hope has come and gone. It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience but I can truthfully say that I hope I never see Bob Hope again, at least not in Southeast Asia. Not that I didn't appreciate his coming, but that if I ever see him again it will probably be one of his Christmas tours. And I'm not planning to stick around for another four years for another chance.

I won't bother telling you about generalities concerning Thailand, since you can read them in my humble offerings enclosed. There are some interesting facts about this particular area that might interest some though. For instance, the Korat Plateau, of which I now sit in the approximate center, is the most highly populated area in the world, King Cobra-wise, that is. They are everywhere but usually shun humans, so I've only seen two so far. There are numerous other varieties of deadly snakes here too. The small, green krait, one of the most deadly in the world, is found in abundance here, as well as the Bamboo Pit Viper. The latter two species possess a nerve poison of which there is almost no recovery. Death usually follows a bite within 30 seconds to two minutes. Again, these snakes avoid humans, and there have been no human deaths reported here. A sentry dog died on patrol close to the base from a krait bite last week, though.

There is a species of cats here, too, along with the proverbial Siamese cat, that is worth noting. It is called simply the Korat Cat and according to the Bangkok Post is an extremely rare animal. It is born tailless, with chocolate fur and bright yellow eyes, much like the Burmese cat. I guess you can tell from all this that my wife has turned me into a cat fancier.

The people here look down on dogs as the lowest form of living matter in existence, and I can't understand why. These dogs here crave affection and are some of the best looking mongrels I've ever seen. Most look like misshapen Scotties, with colorful coats.

Well, I guess I'd better close and get a letter off to my wife. Let me hear from you when you get a chance. Hope the new year, "Sawadee Pie Mu" in Thai, finds you and your family healthy and prosperous.
