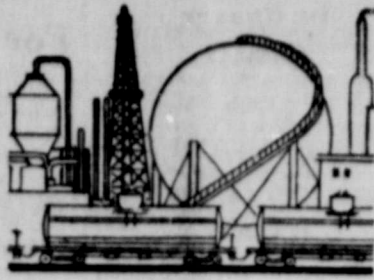

Ranger Public School Census Now Underway

The annual school census is now under way in the Ranger Public Schools and will include the names of all children who will be six and under eighteen years of age next September 1, 1969.

Supt James R. Clark asks that anyone knowing of a neighbor or who themselves have a child who will be six by next September 1, 1969 please call the school office and give the office information so that they may make a call to that residence and take the census.

Clark estimates the census will run between 620 and 650 of school age. The person listed on the census does not have to be in school to be enumerated Clark said and thus might include some married young people.

The school is very interested in locating pupils who will enroll in the Ranger first grade next September Clark said so that the school can estimate accurately how many teachers will be needed.

Texas Inaugural Festival Is Being Planned For Jan. 20-21

AUSTIN — A lively and colorful "Texas Inaugural Festival" is being planned to highlight the inauguration of Preston Smith and Ben Barnes as governor and lieutenant governor.

"We are planning big, friendly and entertaining festivities surrounding the inauguration," said Gov.-elect Smith, "and, we're emphasizing that they're strictly for the people of Texas and open to the public."

Six inaugural balls, a record number, will climax the festivities following the inauguration at noon on January 21.

Test For Peace Corps Post To Be Held Jan. 18

Eastland County residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, Jan. 18, at the Post Office in Abilene.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass or fail.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20525.

Fifteen thousand Volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin American and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from food production to health to education. More Volunteers are needed for programs which will begin this spring and summer.

Noon — Official Inauguration ceremonies on the front steps of the Capitol Building. The Texas Technological College Band, designated as the official inaugural band, will play the State Song, "Texas, Our Texas."

3:00 p. m. — Inauguration Parade featuring about 100 marching and performing groups and floats from all over the state, including an Alabama-Coushatta Indian group.

8:00 p. m. — Six Inaugural Balls.

Jimmy Dean, singing star of records and television, will pour all the inaugural balls for performances. He will precede and introduce Gov. and Mrs. Smith and Lt. Gov. and Mrs. Barnes, who will tour all of the dances.

State Cabins At Lake Brownwood Get Face Lifting

BROWNWOOD — The renovation of 17 cabins in Lake Brownwood State Recreation Park, located 16 miles north-west of Brownwood in Brown County, is about 70 per cent complete, according to Paul Harris, regional parks supervisor for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Harris said the \$40,000 project includes new electrical systems, water systems and new cabins. The grounds

around the cabins will be landscaped, and grills and picnic tables for each cabin will be added.

The 538 acre park is located on the shores of 10,000 acre Lake Brownwood near the geographical center of Texas.

Presently available to the public are 35 picnic sites, five screened shelters, two group camps, 19 cabins, boat ramp, children's play area, fishing pier, and two group lodges.

Activities in the park include tent camping, trailer camping, water skiing, fishing, swimming and hiking.

The price for the cabins range from \$5.50 for one person to \$9.50 for six persons.

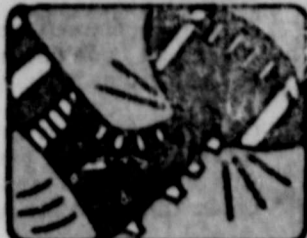

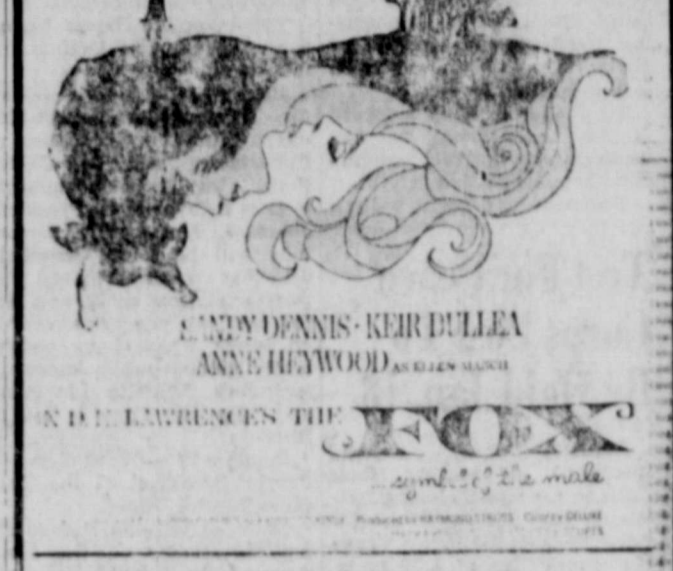

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Letter From Thailand

Well, I'm about settled here at Korat and have grown accustomed to Thailand. How's the newspaper business doing? Hope everything is going smoothly. I'm sorry I haven't written sooner but we've been working pretty hard here. Since my outfit deals with reconnaissance, bombing halts and truces mean that much more work for us.

I'm sending along the first in a series of stories about this fascinating country hoping they can be of use to you. If you decide to use it feel free to edit or re-write any portions you feel necessary. I don't quite know how to explain some of the things I've seen or encountered to a small community like Eastland, but I think most people can understand most of the things I've written about. Again, use your judgment as to what to use.

are direly lacking, and children are really suffering here. I've been reading about the bad weather in the States in the Stars and Stripes. We had a cold snap here two days ago, when it got down to 74 one night about 11:30. This may sound ridiculous, but after the hot weather we've had ever since I arrived I was actually cold. You can imagine how the Thais felt.

The immortal Bob Hope has come and gone. It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience but I can truthfully say that I hope I never see Bob Hope again, at least not in Southeast Asia. Not that I didn't appreciate his coming, but that if I ever see him again it will probably be one of his Christmas tours. And I'm not planning to stick around for another four years for another chance.

I won't bother telling you about generalities concerning Thailand, since you can read them in my humble offerings enclosed. There are some interesting facts about this particular area that might interest some though. For instance, the Korat Plateau, of which I now sit in the approximate center, is the most highly populated area in the world, King Cobra-wise, that is. They are everywhere but usually shun humans, so I've only seen two so far. There are numerous other varieties of deadly snakes here too. The small, green krait, one of the most deadly in the world, is found in abundance here, as well as the Bamboo Pit Viper. The latter two species poses a nerve poison of which there is almost no recovery. Death usually follows a bite within 30 seconds to two minutes. Again, these snakes avoid humans, and there have been no human deaths reported here. A sentry dog died on patrol close to the base from a krait bit last week, though.

There is a species of cats here, too, along with the proverbial Siamese cat, that is worth noting. It is called simply the Korat Cat and according to the Bangkok Post is an extremely rare animal. It is born white, with chocolate fur and bright yellow eyes, much like the Burmese cat. I guess you can tell from all this that my wife has turned me into a cat fancier.

The people here look down on dogs as the lowest form of living matter in existence, and I can't understand why. These dogs here crave affection and are some of the best looking mongrels I've ever seen. Most look like mis-shapen Scotties, with colorful coats.

Well, I guess I'd better close and get a letter off to my wife. Let me hear from you when you get a chance. Hope the new year, "Sawadde Pie Mai" in Thai, finds you and your family healthy and prosperous.
