Capt. James Sisemore Decorated With Second Flying Cross Medal

VALPARAISO, Fla. - Captain James W. Sisemore, son of Mrs. Willie E. Sisemore, Terry Place, Ranger, Tex., has been decorated with the Silver Star, the distinguished Flying Cross and his second through seventeen awards of the Air Medal.

The Silver Star was for his heroic defense of an allied convoy ambushed between Da Nang and Thuong Duc last February.

Flying a light O-1 Bird Dog aircraft, Captain Sisemore provided liaison between the besieged ground troops and higher headquarters, a n. d. when the attackers attempted to set two vehicles afire, made a strafing run that scattered the enemy. Although his aircraft received several hits, the captain flew protective cover for the beleaguered troops until he was forced to return to base to refuel.

Once more over the site, he coordinated landing zones for helicopter troops, directed aerial medical evacuation of the wounded and made additional low level strafing runs that led to breaking the assault. Then, despite a dwindling fuel supply, he escorted the convoy to its destination.

In September 1967, Captain Sisemore directed the tactical airdrop of essential supplies to army troops pinned down by enemy fire and brought in airpower to repel the enemy. He was awarded the DFC for extraordinary achievement during the mission.

While a member of the 29th Tactical Air Support Squadron headquartered at Da Nang Air Base, Captain Sisemore earned the Air Medal 11 times for demonstrating superior skill while flying small observation planes as an aerial scout over both North and South Vietnam.

He now serves with a Tactical Air Command combat crew training squadron at Eglin AFB, Fla.

Captain Sisemore is a Millisap (Tex.) High School graduate and entered the Air Force in 1959. He was commissioned through Officers Candidate School in 1958.

## Peanut Queen Contest Is Going 'State-Wide'

The Texas Peanut Queen will be crowned at the annual Peanut Bowl football game, to be held in Eastland Sept. 20.

The state queen's contest is being sponsored by Southwestern Peanut Shellers' Association and Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, in cooperation with the Eastland Jaycees. The Jaycees have held a county-wide contest for Peanut Bowl Queen and a Peanut Bowl parade and football game between Cisco Junior College and Ranger Junior College annually since 1960.

Jaycee President Wade Freeman said that the contest will begin on the local level, with each town in the 120 peanut-producing counties in Texas selecting a contestant. These winners, who will be called Peanut Duchesses, will compete for Peanut Princess of each county. An elimination contest will narrow contestants for the state title to 25.

Freeman said plans call for the president of the National Peanut Council to crown the state queen in Eastland, Texas is the fourth state to hold a statewide Peanut Queen contest. Other states are Oklahoma, Georgia and Louisiana.

The Texas Peanut Queen will be presented a \$500 scholarship the night she is selected. Freeman said the contest will probably be a two-day presentation between Sept. 15 and Sept. 19 in Eastland.

To qualify as a contestant, a girl must be a resident or college student in one of 120 peanut-producing counties of the state; be single (never been married); not less than 17 or more than 21 years old on Sept. 1 of the current year; have the ability to communicate intelligently with poise and with charm, personal appearance, beauty and grace.

County winners must be selected prior to Aug. 1.

At the state level, the contestants will appear in an evening dress and in a bathing suit. Each contestant will present an entry in the talent contest and be expected to speak for two minutes on the peanut industry. Contestants are expected to travel when

requested with appropriate chaperone, approved by the Peanut Industry Committee. A contestant who attends school is expected to have average or above average grades.

The sponsor of a contestant must be a civic organization, city or town governmental body or any non-profit organization. The sponsor will file a \$25. entrance fee, see that the County Princess has the proper wardrobe, and pay the girl's expenses for the state elimination contest.

TO THE RESIDENTS OF PROPOSED RANGER HOSPITAL DISTRICT OF EASTLAND COUNTY, TEX., AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS.
