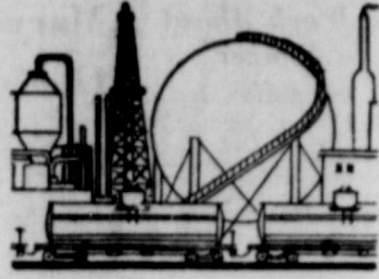

Two Couples Charged With Tuesdays Motel Armed Robbery

Two couples charged with the \$30 armed robbery of the Sunray Courts operator and his wife at 12:34 a.m. Tuesday were arrested just over an hour later by the Abilene Police Department.

The quartet was booked into the Abilene City Jail where a .32 revolver was confiscated. Speedy communications by law enforcement units led to the arrest after the victim, Waymon Smith furnished a description of the robbers.

Smith and his wife operate the motel on the east edge of Ranger.

It was reported by the County Sheriff, Lefty Sublett, Smith and his wife were tied up in one of their cabins. They were freed by one of the occupants of a nearby cabin.

Charged with the armed robbery were: Gerald Tittle Jones, 28, and Sandra Gail Jones, 16, both of Dallas; Alan Lewis Lacefield, 21, and Sarah Jean Lacefield, 18, who gave their address as Waco.

It was reported that the .32 pistol was taken off the Jones woman. She was also booked for carrying a prohibited weapon.

Police said the holdup occurred after the four persons came to the motel and asked for a cabin. Smith was confronted with the weapon while showing the cabin.

While Smith was being held at gunpoint, the motel office was being ransacked.

The noise aroused Mrs. Smith, who was taken to the cabin where her husband was being held; there they were tied up, it was reported.

Smith managed to free his feet and aroused a construction worker in another cabin. He untied the Smiths.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith make their home at the motel.

Smith called Ranger Police-man J. C. Rose and gave him a description, which was radioed to the Texas Department of Public Safety office in Abilene.

The arrest was made at 1:44 a.m. at the I-20 intersection by the Abilene Police Department.

All four persons were taken before Corporation Court Judge Josephine Jameson in Abilene.

The quartet were returned to the Eastland County jail Tuesday morning.

Peanut Industry Study Will Be New Industrial Lure For Area

Results of a study recently completed by Texas Electric Service Company of the peanut industry and the potential for manufacturing peanut products in this area were distributed to a group of civic leaders Monday by Bill Collings, manager for the company.

"We hope this study will be helpful in attracting new industries to this area," Collings said. "It points out some of the real opportunities for the profitable manufacturing of peanut products, such as candy, peanut butter and salted peanuts."

"This study is part of the company's Program for Economic Progress (PEP) intended to help communities served by the company in their economic and cultural improvement programs," he said.

James H. Harwell of Austin, executive director of the Texas Industrial Commission, was present at the meeting Monday.

"This is a comprehensive study of peanut production and industry in this area," Harwell said. "Texas Electric Service Company is to be commended for making this report available."

"The Texas Industrial Commission will use the study in every way possible to attract new industry here."

Texas Electric Service Company plans to use the study in contacting manufacturers of peanut butter, salted peanuts and peanut candy throughout the country to stimulate their interest in this area as a possible site for location of a plant. Copies are being provided the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and other industrial development groups in this area. Copies are available for interested persons at the company's office here.

The availability of all the resources — raw materials, markets, transportation and labor — that are essential for a profitable manufacturing operation in this area is described in the study. More than 97 million pounds of peanuts were produced in Eastland, Comanche and Erath Counties in 1967, the study shows, and a larger crop was estimated for 1968. This valuable raw material was exported from the area for processing into food products elsewhere.

The study further indicates that a new industry locating in this area could easily employ 300 workers in the first 12 months of operation and approximately the same number each year thereafter.

Latest figures available according to the study reveal that 4.7 pounds per person of shelled, edible peanuts were used in the production of peanut butter, salted peanuts and peanut candy in the U. S. in 1967. Of this, 2.5 pounds were used in making peanut butter, 1.2 pounds in salted peanuts and 1.0 pound in peanut candy.

The population within a 200-mile radius of the Eastland-Comanche County area is about 4 1/2 million people, providing a peanut butter market of more than 11 million pounds per year, a salted peanut market of more than 5 million pounds, and a peanut candy market of more than 85 million pounds. Enlarging the area to a 600-mile radius increases the market to six times these amounts.

The study even covers the possibility of making peanut brittle in the home and the amount of profit that could be made with pan, paddle and kitchen range.

"A Letter to all Citizens of Ranger."

I just returned to my home this morning from our "Good old Ranger General Hospital." I had been there eight days and in pain for five days. I received the very best of care from our family physician and nurses. Thanks to them, I am very happy to be back home again.

The hospital has been a haven of rest many times to different members of our family during our seventeen years in Ranger. We love the city of Ranger and our many dear friends. We feel no differently now about going to Ranger General than any time during the seventeen years; in fact, such money and time has been spent to improve it. It is clean, the nurses are very attentive and patient.

A new hospital would be great, but it will take 18 months to get one built. I understand steps are being taken to build a new one, but right now, Medicare is hurting all of us. As of now, Medicare will not under any circumstances permit or pay for our aged to be treated there. This is naturally creating a great financial hardship and there is a possibility it could be closed within six months.

Where will we rush to as we did with our sick family? How many of our elderly will stay home and die for lack of money to go away from their homes? My husband and I have adopted an elderly couple who have no family or children. When they call any time of the day or night, we go to them to help in any way we can. Right now, this dear old lady needs to go to the hospital for care but won't go because Medicare will not pay. Can you blame her for not wanting to go to Abilene or Fort Worth when she could be hospitalized right here where her friends and her husband could see her each day?

Don't misunderstand, I think Medicare is wonderful but they are being brass and cruel to citizens of Ranger and other small cities by refusing to let us have Medicare in Ranger General for 18 months to give us time to build as we plan to do.

We plan to do our best to donate funds to help; what do you plan to do? I wouldn't want to be placed in the hall of Eastland Hospital with a curtain around me. I would certainly hate to see an elderly person there either. To be farther away would make a hardship on my family.

They claim our hospital is a fire trap. We have never had a fire there as well as I remember. Our homes can be fire traps and we may not be aware of it.

While I was in the hospital, the board examined the building. One member refused to accept the operating room and another said it was no different than one in another large town.

What gives? It looks as if we are being pushed around. I also know the oxygen supply had to be moved outside the back door. They happened to let another hospital in another small town keep their upstairs and on the floor near enough to perhaps save a life much quicker.

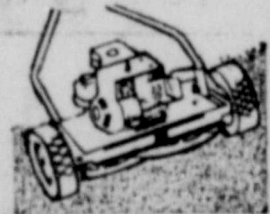

Orient Trip Is Dream Come True For Ciscoan

As we neared Love Field, I became suddenly aware that what I had dreamed of, hoped for, and yes, even prayed for had matured into a reality. If someone had told me two months before our trip that I would be going to Taiwan, Hong Kong and Japan to spend Christmas, I wouldn't have believed him. But there I was leaving for a twenty-day visit to the Orient!

Flying from Dallas to Taipei, Taiwan with an hour or two lay over in L.A., Honolulu, and Tokyo took approximately nineteen hours, and left three tired "chickens."

Rev. Michael Varro, Superintendent of the China Peniel Missionary Society in Taiwan, met Josephine Cleveland, her daughter, Carolyn and me at the airport in Taipei. As we left the airport with my head "swimming" we got our first vegetable glimpse of the Orient. Rev. Varro pointed out the places of interest, such as Chiang Kai-shek's winter home as we made our way around the city that is overly crowded with bicycles and motorcycles. Even though the city has built a special lane for this type of vehicle, the cyclist will always use them.

Taipei has the highest death rates from traffic accidents of any place in the world, and I could very well see why as we drove along. I promised myself that if I ever got back to Cisco, Texas alive I would never gripe about our minor traffic problems.

The next three days that we spent in Taiwan are still a mystery to me. How could one see and do so much in such a short length of time?

One reason for taking the trip was to try to gain an insight into the apprehensions of the Chinese youth. We had this opportunity when we met some university students Wednesday night at a Bible class taught in English. While we enjoyed Chinese tea after the class, the fifty some odd students bombarded us with all sorts of questions about the U. S. from race problems to religion. After the "trial", I was invited by two of the students to view their campus, which was about three blocks from the university. I wanted to be in the know about the Chinese youth; therefore, the next two evenings I tried to spend every spare minute I could with the two students. These two delighted in having me try different kinds of Chinese food. Then they would watch my facial expressions, as I downed the food, to see if I liked the dish or not. I confessed to them that I preferred American food.

The sad farewells had to come; and as we left, I wondered if I could enjoy any other place as much as I had Taiwan. But before I realized it, there we were in Hong Kong, the Pearl of the Orient, and I knew I could enjoy it as

well. But little did I realize how happy I would be and the spiritual growth that I would obtain before leaving Hong Kong.

The next ten days in Hong Kong were glorious! We made our way all around the border of the new territory. We viewed the communist border of Red Shina a mile away. We visited a market place where the people were selling everything from dog meat to snake medicine.

We were wondering why the crowd had gathered in one area of the market place. As I peered over the heads of the small Chinese people, to my stupefaction there were two men playing with a cobra and another deadly snake. When I saw what was going on, I didn't tarry long because one of those snakes was to close to me for comfort.

We went through Yuen Long and saw the Nixon library. (There's a very interesting story to its beginning.)

At the Aberdeen harbor we saw thousands of houseboats and took a ride on a sampan to get a closer look at the homes of these boat people. It is really heart-breaking to see how some of the people live over there. Not only are they living in great poverty but also in darkness, spiritually speaking. The thought, "Americans are always looking on the materialistic side of things, but the only thing that really matters is the spiritual side", was really brought home to me while we were attending a boat wedding.

"All Americans are rich, aren't they?" We heard this in every country we visited. America is so far ahead of the Orient in some things and in others America is lagging far behind.

There is such a great contrast in Hong Kong. Over on the hill will be hundreds of little wooden refugee shacks and thirty yards away where the mountain has been cut away will be a twenty story, ultra modern apartment house. Dr. David Chun, head of the China Peniel Missionary Society in Hong Kong, and his showing us around the island and the main land. The spiritual emphasis they added to our trip was wonderful.

We got to see how from one

man's obedience to God's calling eight churches in Hong Kong go to their start and how the work has flourished and has spread to Taiwan and Korea. That man is the Rev. A. K. Reiton of Cisco, Texas.

Japan, our next stop, had a new and different experience awaiting us, along with colder weather. We had scheduled a side tour of Nikko where there is a very large Buddhist temple. 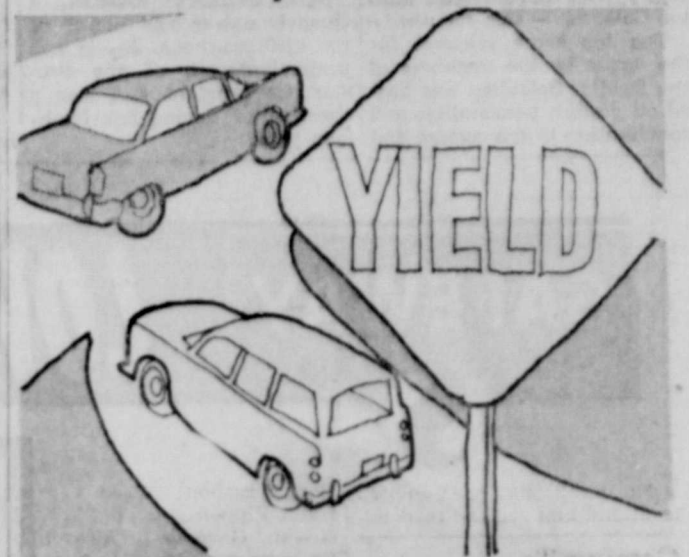

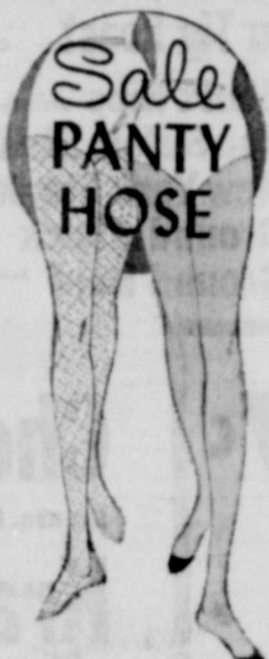
