Two Local Men Are Injured In Collision

Two men were hospitalized as result of a truck-pickup crash 6 miles north of Dimmitt at noon Tuesday, August 16. The crash occurred when a truck driven by Ben D. Hawley of Dimmitt was involved in a collision with a Gas Company pickup at crossing on a new farm to market road being constructed there. Homer Thomas, gas company employe and driver of the pickup was thrown from his vehicle but suffered only a bruised hip from his fall to the pavement. Reuben McGilvary, also an employe of the company and a passenger in the pickup, suffered bruises and lacerations. He was brought to Deaf Smith County Hospital by an ambulance from Gilliland Funeral Home here. Hawley suffered an abrasion on the forehead and was taken to the Dimmitt hospital for treatment. His condition is not considered serious. The truck was damaged only slightly. Damage to the pickup has not been estimated.

Top Wheat Varieties Eligible For Premiums

The acreage of undesirable varieties in Oklahoma and Texas has now decreased to a point where Mr. Soder is advising the flour mills that they can buy plenty of wheat for milling purposes without taking into their plant a single grain of these undesirable varieties. The government loan and government purchases for overseas shipment have disrupted the wheat marketing picture to the point where the true value of the varieties is not reflected in the local market prices. This announcement of premiums for suitable farm stored wheat is expected to repay farmers for their added efforts and to encourage further improvement. Farmers desiring to collect these premiums should submit through their local elevators or mills to determine the exact premiums they can secure, concludes Mr. Soder. Flour mills desiring to pay the wheat grower for its greater percentages of strong gluten wheat and to stimulate continued improvements are announcing a schedule of premiums for wheat of the best milling and baking varieties. Each mill will make its own schedule public, but there is sufficient similarity to make possible a general announcement of the premiums according to K. E. Soder, Director of the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Improvement Program. Central Oklahoma mills are taking the lead on this premium basis and include the Okene Milling Company at Okene, The Canadian Mill & Elevator Company at El Reno, and the Acme Flour Mill at Oklahoma City. Other mills are considering this basis and will possibly make an announcement later. The wheat will be bought on the basis of samples submitted in advance which will be analyzed by a disinterested variety expert and must be 95 per cent or better true to variety. The only varieties covered in this schedule include Comanche, Westar, Tenmarq, and Turkey because they are the strongest gluten of the recommended varieties. The samples must test 12 per cent protein or better and delivery must be on a specified date so that the premium wheat may be kept separate from the other wheat in the mill. The premium will be 5 cents per bushel to start with and will be paid from August 1, 1949, to April 30, 1950. These same mills advise that they will not knowingly accept wheat containing over 10 per cent Red Chief or Chiefkan. In Texas the only premiums currently being offered are being paid by the Morrison Milling Co., at Denton, Texas. These Morrison premiums are 1 cent per bushel from 80 to 89 per cent good varieties, 2 cents from 90 to 99 per cent.

Federal All Coverage Crop Insurance Is Again Available

All coverage wheat crop insurance is again available to the farmers of Castro County. The last date that you may sign up for this all coverage wheat insurance is August 31, 1949, so hurry into Castro County A. C. A. office and have this insurance explained to you. The premium rate is \$1 per acre for the first 25 acres and then a 1 cent reduction for each 50 acres thereafter. Your crop is covered in three stages as follows: Lost and put to grain: continuous cropping, \$2.80; summer-fallowed, \$3.80; irrigated, \$4.80. Lost and summerfallowed: continuous cropping, \$4.00; summer-fallowed, \$6.00; irrigated, \$8.00. Harvested: continuous cropping, \$5.60; summerfallowed, \$7.60; irrigated, \$9.60. If you desire the full details about this all coverage wheat insurance the clerks in the Castro County A. C. A. office will be glad to tell you about it. Here are some of the causes: drought, flood, hail, wind, frost, winter-kill, lightning, fire, excessive rain, snow, wildlife, hurricane, tornado, insect infestation, plant disease and other such causes as unavoidable. Remember the closing date for taking out all this coverage insurance is August 31, 1949, so hurry and make your application.

EDITORIALS

During the month of August, 1929 the directors of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce selected the slogan, "Gateway to Opportunity" for Dimmitt and the surrounding Communities. In selecting the slogan, the directors of the Chamber of Commerce had in mind one that would be applicable to the entire county, as the activities of the organization is county-wide, and no one community or section will be shown preference in the work of the progressive upbuilding of our county. The chamber of commerce wants every community and person in the County to feel free to attend its meetings and take part in the work. They want the people of Castro County to know that the organization is theirs—for their good and use.

What Your Chamber of Commerce Wants—and Expects!

The one thing stressed, in behalf of the officers and directors, is full cooperation of the people of the County.

The Directors can accomplish many things without the assistance of our citizens. But this they should not be called upon to do. Every man, woman and child living in Castro County are beneficiaries of this organization, and their association should be freely and cheerfully given in the work which is before their civic body.

Dimmitt and Castro County is not dominated by a faction, clique, or ring, political or otherwise; it is not a "one-man" town or county, and these facts should make it possible for your chamber of commerce to do county-wide work, which is so often hindered by the evidence of a faction, or "ruler."

This Editorial appeared in the News twenty years ago and during this past twenty years the Castro County Chamber of Commerce has not had the full cooperation of the people of Dimmitt and the surrounding communities. On August 10, 1949, Mr. Fowler Brown of Gainsville accepted the position of Secretary of Chamber of Commerce for our County. Let's show our new Secretary that we can and will cooperate 100% with the Castro County Chamber of Commerce to build a better and more prosperous community in which to live.

The housing situation which prevails at the present time in Dimmitt should be remedied, and that without delay. The town is not only injuring itself in a commercial way by the existence of this condition, but financially it is losing virtually hundreds of dollars daily.

Every day people come to the News Office looking for places for their families. We only suggest that something be done and done at once to remedy this condition. It's work for the Chamber of Commerce, but that body must have the cooperation of other citizens in taking care of it.

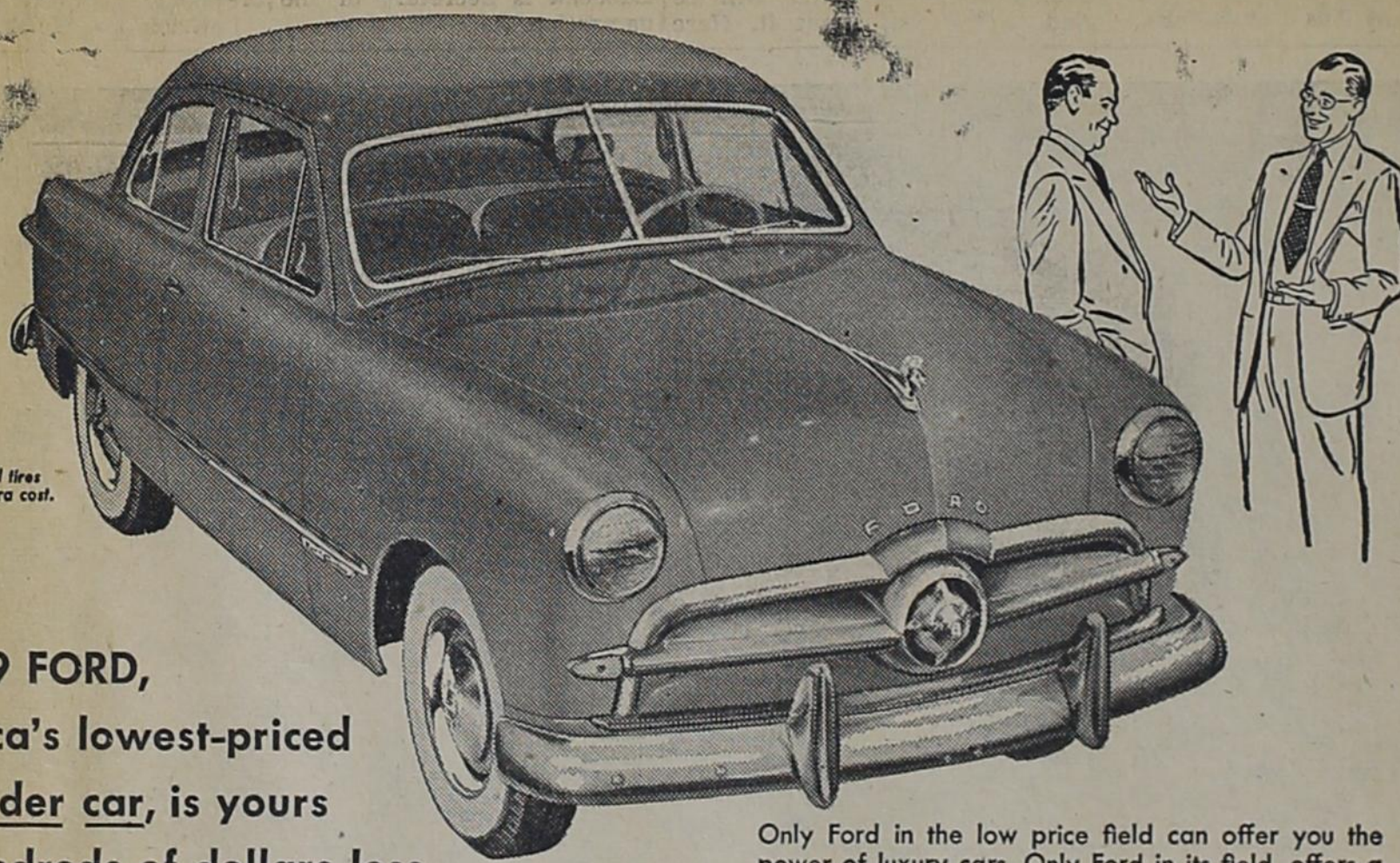

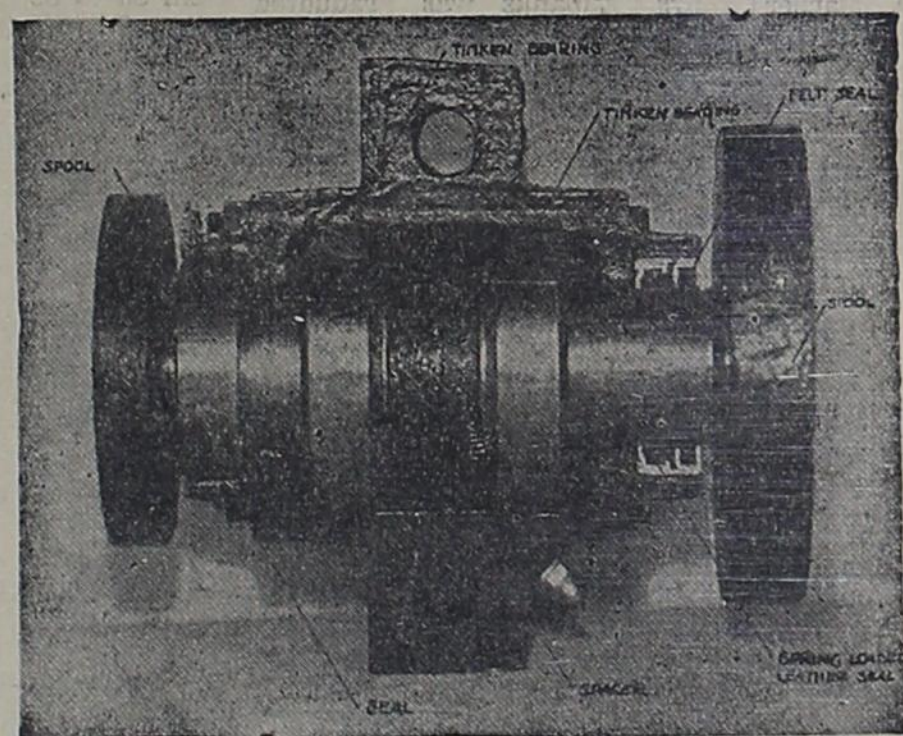

No. 5

Proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session. "Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A.D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

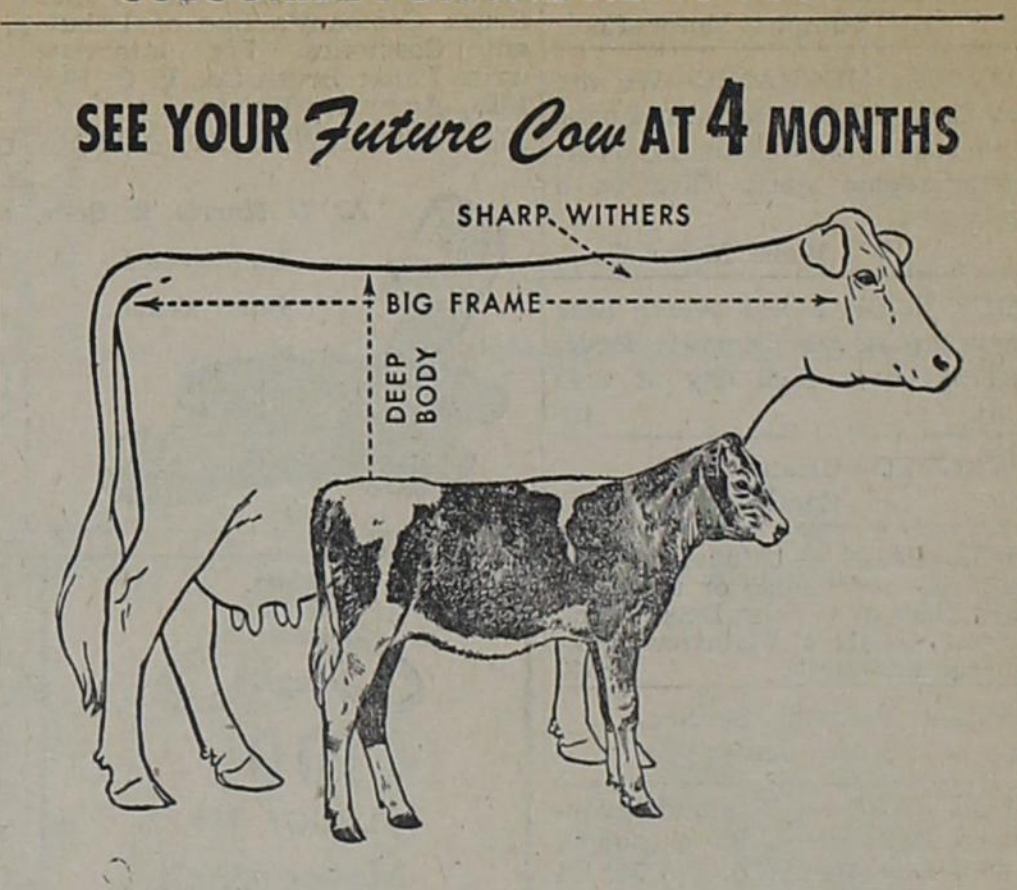

Texas Prospects For Farm Crops Reported as Good

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 18—Right now farmers of Texas and the nation have prospects for a big harvest. The overall production could be the second largest in history. For the nation last year holds the record, but Texas farmers, in 1948, did not approach their record production for wheat, cotton and some feed crops.

The 1949 Texas wheat crop was the second largest, says C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist of Texas A. & M. College, and cotton production—per acre should set a new record. There is an 18 percent increase in cotton acreage over last year in the state.

The acreage of peanuts in Texas is down about 21 percent from 1948. The harvest is underway in South Texas and production for the state is likely to be above average, says Bates.

Texas corn and grain sorghum crops should be above average this year even with the decrease in acreage. Weather conditions have been favorable and the corn crop looks especially good.

Now, what does this all mean to Texas farm and ranch operators? Bates says it means that supplies for most farm products have accumulated to the point that reduction in acreages planted may be desirable. The era of surpluses has definitely returned.

Any reduction of land devoted to cash crops offers an opportunity for a shift to the production of livestock and livestock products, he thinks. This adjustment of farming operations toward more livestock may prove profitable, and permit better conservation of land resources.

For the period just ahead, he says, the demand for meat, milk,

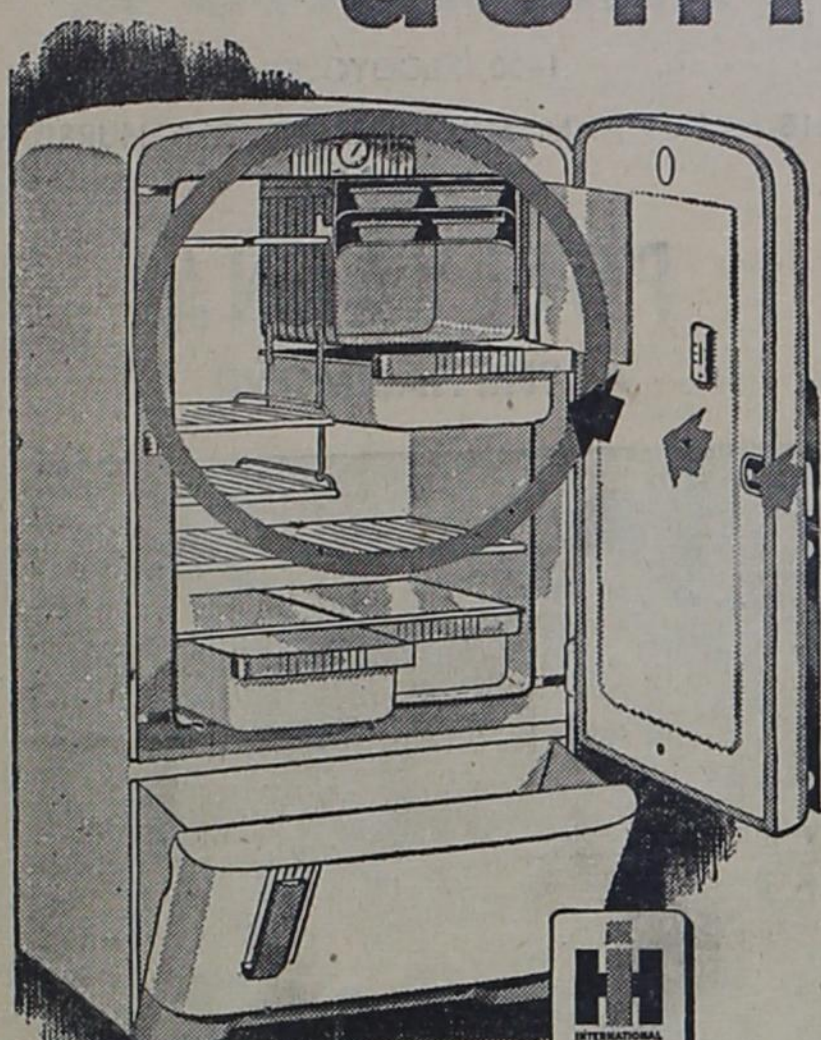

SPORTS AFIELD

By Ted Kesting

Did you ever stop to consider the important part the left hand plays in fly casting? You use that left hand to add tip tension to the back cast, thus giving distance and ease; to retrieve line, meanwhile working the fly; to set the hook positively when to do so with the rod tip would bring only missed rises; and to play a fish.

Jason Lucas, noted angling authority, has some interesting comments on the first of these uses. All tournament distance casters, and many who fish for steelhead and salmon in wide rivers, attain maximum distance by employing what has been known indiscriminately as the "double haul" or the "left-hand haul."

Lucas differentiates between these and also divides the latter into two parts which he calls the short left-hand haul and the long left-hand haul. Let's concentrate on the latter two, since the double haul is suited only for the very experienced fly-caster with good tackle.

The short left-hand haul is so simple that anybody who can cast a fly at all should catch onto it in 10 minutes. On your back cast, see to it that your left hand, holding the line is, say, as high as your chest. Then, as you begin the forward cast, give a smooth, rather quick tug down with that left hand. This pulls more bend into the rod tip, puts more power there. So if your back cast is slightly listless and weak, this will compensate to a great extent; if it had proper snap, this haul will let you shoot considerably more line than you could have otherwise.

Remember that sometimes it will be but a gentle tug of a few inches; on a long cast, or casting into a stiff wind—where this pull is invaluable—there will be a longer, sharper tug. Use a short pull at first, until you get used to it.

I recommend that even the beginner try this method. He should find himself casting more easily and positively than ever before, and be able to lay his fly neatly farther off.

The long left-hand haul is more difficult, suitable for the moderately advanced fly-caster. It gives still greater distance, but to get the full benefit from it, one should have a rod with good backbone, and a properly fitting three-diameter line.

Even the veteran at ordinary trout fishing will regard this long left-hand haul as an emer-

gency measure, to be used only when he cannot wade to within easy casting distance of some promising spot.

In this method, the first part of the back cast is made as when using the short haul, except that more power is put into it. The rod tip must stop, as usual, slightly behind the vertical. But, once that upward toss is executed, the tip is allowed to move again, to drift farther back. At the same time, the left hand sweeps up fairly high, permitting line to shoot out backwards through the guides, but not to slip through the fin-

gers. Then, as the forward cast is begun, the left hand whips the line quickly downward, sometimes clear to the hip. This pulls a very strong bend into the rod, to send the line forward with high speed, allowing one to make a long shoot.

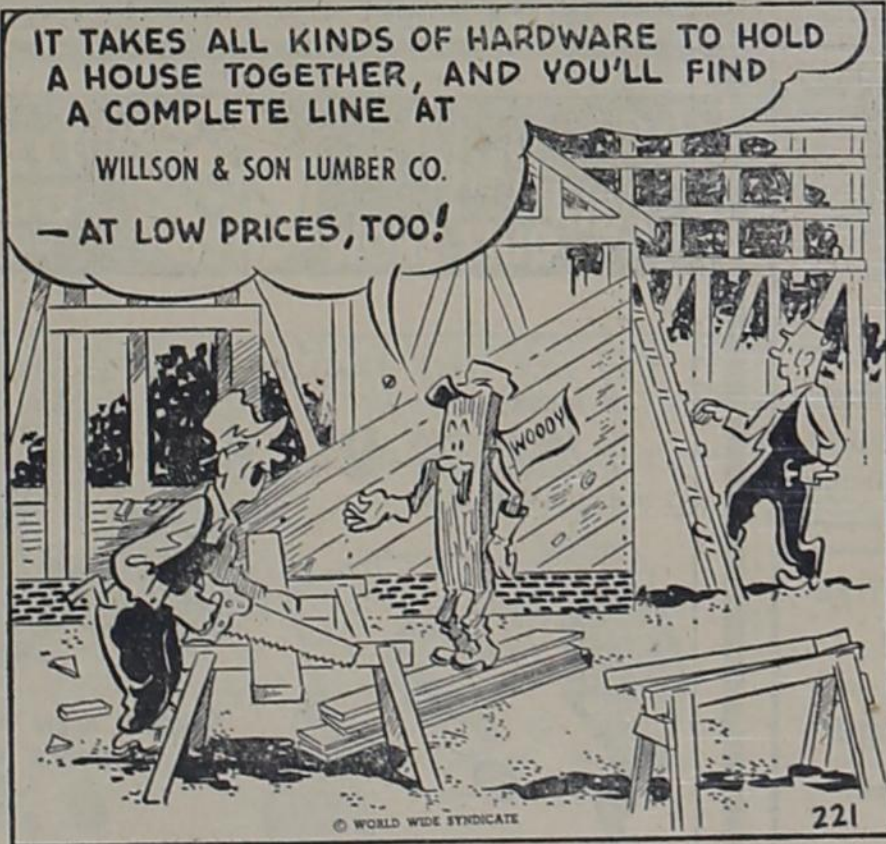
