Bills for the past month were examined and approved for payment. The Athletic, Tax and Lunchroom monthly reports were gone over. The lunchroom report showed a decrease in student meals served by a little over three meals a day in both lunchrooms combined. Clark said this might be due in part to the increase in price of meals but mostly to increased absence due to sickness. The two lunchrooms combined were in the black financially in net worth for the first time this

year. This is due to the recent price increase of meals to students, teachers and visitors.

Clark told the Board that the white students average daily attendance the first semester was 98.69 and the Negro ADA was 10.42 or a combined ADA of 91.11 students. It is almost a certainty that the Ranger system will lose one teacher unit next year due to low attendance which is due to low enrollment as compared to last year. Had about 24 more students been enrolled this year Ranger would not have lost the teacher. The cut will probably be in high school Clark said.

ed them," he said.
After his acquittal, Curry found adjustment difficult. He found himself asking "Do they think I'm guilty of murder?" when he met people. He could not gain admission to a high school to finish his education, and he tried in a number of cities. Education has long been one of his dreams.
In time, he obtained work with a highway contractor, working with heavy machinery on jobs over the state. He has a reputation as a good man on the big machines and has earned as much as \$175 per week.
Curry married his wife, Gail, in Lubbock a few months after he won freedom. They have two daughters, Kimberley Dawn and Terry Lynn, who make their home in Cisco.

with his mother, Mrs. Joyce Curry. His father, the late F. P. Curry, died soon after the Palo Pinto trial.
Curry saved enough money to enter college. West Texas State at Canyon did not require a high school diploma since he was over 21, and he made a good grade on their entrance exam. He enrolled at midterm as a freshman with the view of becoming a lawyer with a specialty in juvenile law. He was working part-time at a service station, and Gail was working in Cisco.
Then the Amarillo trouble came. The indictments charge that he robbed a 19-year-old housewife of \$180 and was prevented from raping her when someone appeared at a coin laundry. He was also charged with raping a 23-year-old Amarillo housewife at knife point.
Curry said that he voluntarily went to the police station after hearing that they wanted him. He volunteered for a lie detector test, and the results were inconclusive, he said. When the victims pointed a finger at him in a lineup with four plain clothes policemen, Curry said that "I knew that I was in for trouble."
He then telephoned John Watts, Odessa attorney who represented him in the Hussey case, and the attorney flew to Amarillo. Next day, Curry was free on bond. They waived examining trial, pointing out that "We want this case to come to trial so the truth will be presented to a jury."
Nathan went back to Canyon. Although college officials said he could stay in school, both he and his attorney felt that he should withdraw. He was passing in all courses, he added, and was being considered as a dormitory supervisor for next year.
Since coming home, a good many friends have made it a point to express their faith in him, Nathan said. He has had a letter from one of the jurors who heard the Palo Pinto case, expressing confidence that he will be acquitted.
The future isn't too bright, Curry says. "I often feel like I'm in a blind alley," he said. "If it wasn't for my family, I think I'd just give up."
Nathan has prospects of a road job, and he likes running the big Cams. When it's all over, he now feels that it will be best for him to take his family and move to some distant state and start over.
News stories recently about a \$10 million libel suit being dismissed against Dell Publishing Co., Inc., of New York, were not entirely true, Curry said. The suit was dismissed in Texas, but it is still on the New York State docket and will be tried there, in Dell's home state, he added.
Curry, who weighs 190 and is six feet and one-inch tall, keeps in good physical condition.
"We appreciate our friends," he said. "Without them, this second round of waiting for a trial would be unbearable."

25 Area Schools Send Counselors To CJC Meeting

Twenty-five school administrators and counselors were in attendance at Cisco Junior College's second Administrator Counselor Conference of 1969 held Tuesday, March 11, on the CJC Campus.

Month Remains For Inspection Of Cars, Trucks

AUSTIN — Colonel W. E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has reminded motorists that only one month remains before the 1969 motor vehicle inspection deadline.

To date, an estimated 2.3 million vehicles have received the inspection required by state law. The Department of Public Safety said some 3.2 million additional vehicles remain to be inspected prior to midnight, April 15. Speir said 42.2 per cent of the vehicles inspected so far required mechanical adjustment prior to issuance of an inspection sticker. The defect found most often has been misalignment of headlights.

The Department of Public Safety urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches. Texas has 5,466 licensed inspection stations. The required inspection fee is \$1.75.
