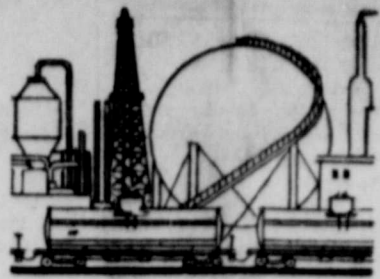

Be Sure To Vote Saturday In School Election

IT MAKES NO DIFFERENCE HOW YOU VOTE, BUT VOTE

Saturday, April 5 is election day for trustees of Ranger Independent School District. For the interest of the readers, the Times compiled four questions concerning school matters and each of the four trustee candidates had an opportunity to answer the questions.

The Times is not supporting any two candidates for the places to be filled on the Trustee Election and the questions are for public interest only.

If either of the proposed pay raises for teachers passes in the legislature, and nearly every election official says they are for the pay raise bill, it will increase local taxes from approximately \$85,000.00 to \$111,000.00 and this does not include the sick leave or bills

for pay raise for bus drivers or better retirement plan. If the bill passes, which of the following would you prefer, following would you favor:

(1) Blanket raise of values across the board, leaving the rate at \$1.50 per \$100 value it now is, or

(2) Bring in outside appraisal firm to equalize all values within the district and then determine the new rate based on new values, or

(3) Let a local board of equalization raise the money by equalizing taxes or raising values as they see fit.

ANSWERS: Gaston Dixon, candidate for Place One said, "I think that part three would be the answer."

Dr. Luther Gohlke candidate for Place Two answered: "A local board of equalization could raise the money by equalizing the taxes or raise the values as they see fit."

Are you in favor of the School Board or the Superintendent having the authority to recommend for election or dismissal of all principals, teachers and other personnel of the school district?

ANSWERS: Dixon, "I am in favor of the superintendent having the authority to recommend the election or dismissal of all personnel of the school district. This is part of the Superintendent's job and not the duties of the trustees."

Gohlke, "The recommendation or dismissal of all personnel of the school district is the duties of the superintendent. The trustees can act on his recommendation."

What is your opinion of the Governor's report concerning school consolidation?—Not in favor of present plan.

ANSWERS: Dixon stated, "I am not in favor of the present plan."

Gohlke said, "I am not in favor of the Governor's Report on school consolidation in small communities."

Are you in favor of the trustee meetings being open to the public? Yes.

ANSWERS: Dixon, "It is a law that all trustee meetings be open to the public."

Gohlke said, "I am in favor of open meetings of the trustee meetings."

'Lee' Cantrell Elected New Ranger Mayor

O. L. (Lee) Cantrell was elected mayor of Ranger Tuesday in a tight turnout of local voters.

Cantrell polled 303 votes, while his opponent George Falls took 255 of the 558 ballots cast.

The only other contested election at Ranger was for position of water commissioner.

Buck Wallace won the commissioner's seat with 340 votes. Wallace's opponent Don Adams received 206 ballots.

Uncontested elections saw W. H. (Bill) Marslander elected police-fire commissioner with 524 votes. Edwin Lumus re-elected street commissioner with 527 votes and Glyn Gilliam elected finance commissioner with 534 votes.

Ranger Hospital Bill Advances

The Ranger Hospital District came a bit closer to reality Tuesday when the House Committee on Counties took up Rep. Burke Musgrove's bill to allow voters to create the authority.

Testimony on the bill, HB 495, was brief although Musgrove introduced some Ranger residents who had gone to Austin to support the legislation.

Appearing for the measure were Mrs. Dortha Harris and Herman Cupp, representing the hospital board; Jann Cupp, Bruce Golemon, Dean of Ranger Junior College, and the Rev. Thomas Tribble, pastor of First Methodist of Ranger.

Musgrove told legislators the district needed to help the Ranger hospital meet federal requirements for Medicare and related problems.

He emphasized that the district is needed to help take care of the "large number of people" in Eastland County who are over 65.

When asked why the hospital district did not cover the entire county, Musgrove said there were other hospitals in the county besides the one at Ranger.

The hospital district, if approved by the voters, would include the part of Ranger School District in Eastland County. Under the bill, the district could levy taxes up to

75 cents a \$100 evaluation.

Ranger has been making plans for a new hospital to meet the requirements of the federal governments.

Upon the passage of this bill a town meeting will be held in order for the citizen's committee to explain what has been done so far and answer questions and explain what they are interested in doing for the community. The members of this committee is as follows: Bill Marslander, Glyn Gilliam, Norman Richardson, Ala Rae Morris, Wayne Matthews, Felton Brasher, Dr. W. P. Watkins, Dr. Luther Gohlke, Dr. Mince and Dortha Harris.

The Industrial Development teams met Tuesday afternoon for another series of studies to compile the necessary items that would be of interest to a prospective industry that might be considering moving to Ranger.

Dr. E. W. Mince, president of Ranger Junior College, discussed the education and training facilities Ranger has to offer.

The college was established in 1926 and has an enrollment of over 300 students at the present time.

All instructors of the college have master degrees in the course they teach and Mince stated that "No local money is used for teacher's salaries at the college."

The tuition for students of the college starts at \$100 per year for local students. The college has a new administration building, new dormitories, new gym and science building.

The Ranger Public School is known as the Ranger Independent School District and lies mostly in Eastland County with a very small portion in

the north lying in Stephens County. It is 176 square miles in land area.

The schools are supported about 72% from local ad valorem taxes and the remainder in State Aid as is given to all schools. The present budget calls for expenditure of \$328,597.

The assessed valuation of the district is \$5,817,330. This is based on 39% of actual value. Actually 18% is a more realistic figure according to a State survey. The tax rate is \$1.50 per hundred dollars of value. Of this rate, \$1.38 is for local operations and 12c is for payment of bonds.

Tax assessing and collecting is done by the district. At least 94% of the taxes are collected each year. About \$96,279 will be collected this year.

Presently there are 821 students enrolled in grades one through 12 with an additional 29 enrolled in Kindergarten. In the Hodges Oak Primary School there are six teachers for grades one, two and three and the pupil-teacher ratio is 29-1. Grade four, five and six are located across town in Young School where there are also six teachers. The ratio there is 24-1. In both schools this does not count a remedial teacher who does not have a fixed class nor does it include three teacher aids in primary.

The Junior-Senior High School is in another building and has 18 full time personnel employed there with a half time counselor. The graduating class ranges from 30 to 40 each year and a great majority do enroll in a college following graduation. Forty-four units of work is offered but only 18 is required for graduation.

The high school is fully accredited by the Texas Education Agency and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The elementary schools are affiliated with this last organization. Few schools in this area are members of the Southern Association.

The school presently receives over \$33,000 in Federal money which pays for Remedial teachers, teacher aides and office aides plus some teaching supplies. Over \$35,000 has been spent in three years for furniture and teaching equipment such as record players, maps, motion picture projectors, tape recorders and similar equipment.

The Labor Market in the Ranger area was discussed by George Kloss and Charles Arnett.

The total labor force of Eastland County as estimated by the Texas Employment Commission in 1967 was 6,800. Of these, 790 were engaged in agriculture, 5,620 in non-agriculture and 190 were employed. Of the 6,410 employed labor force, 820 were employed in manufacturing, 4,800 in non-manufacturing and 790 in agriculture.

The discussion for next Tuesday's meeting will be "Construction and Insurance," by David Pickrell, Bill Parnell, and James Ratliff. The second portion of the program will be "Financing" by Glyn Gilliam and Lester Crossley.

Largest Crowd Ever Expected For 5th Annual Kendrick Easter Event

A record attendance is expected for the 5th Annual Kendrick Easter Pageant, on Sunday, April 6, at the Kendrick Amphitheater, located midway between Eastland and Cisco on Highway 80, it was reported at mid-week.

Given good weather, the largest turnout ever is expected according to the Pageant spokesman.

Rehearsals have been developing well and an exceptionally good pageant is forecast.

New scenes to be added this year include the Creation, through the lives of Adam and Eve; the birth, preaching and beheading of John the Baptist; and the Life of Christ from birth through the resurrection.

Pageant starting time will be 3:30 a.m., and ending at sunup, Easter Sunday. A musical will precede the pageant, and is scheduled to begin at 1:30 a.m. Sunday, with a long list of musicians and choirs expected to be on hand for the early entertainment. As in the past, families are expected to come early for the Pageant event.

The theater will accommodate 10,000 autos. A concession stand is available on the grounds and it is being recommended that visitors bring pillows to sit on and blankets to wrap in for warmth.

Admission is free and the public is invited.

Participants in the Pageant are from throughout this area and represent all religious denominations and walks of life. The master stage of the theater is 360 feet in length which houses 12 separate stages and buildings erected of a crystal white aggregate stone finish with each being lighted with three color spot lights and all wired for sound.

Included on the stage is the Sea of Galilee, the running River of Jordan and the Mount Calvary.

This year's production will be the most complete performance in the state, and will include live animals consisting of gray donkey for the Mother Mary, a white donkey for the Triumphant March of Jesus, a camel for the wisemen, horse-drawn chariots, mounted guards, the usual stock scene

in the manager and sheep for the shepherds.

The script is taken word for word from the Bible.

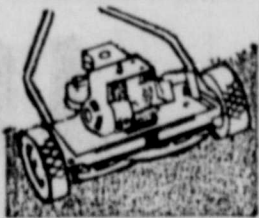

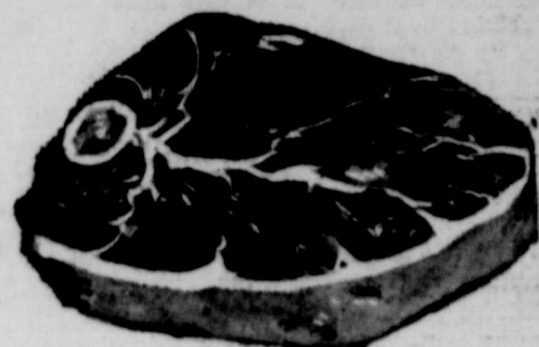

Swine Course In Abilene

Dr. R. W. Moore, researcher in swine diseases at Texas A&M, will discuss the implications of the National Hog Cholera Eradication Program and how swine producers can control the disease.

Other staff members from Texas A&M will present topics on reproduction, market grades of hogs, current swine nutrition research, and their effects on efficient swine production.

Lee Roy Colgan Jr., Texas pork producer from Lamesa, will relate his experiences in making decisions and determining costs involved in initiating a new hog operation.

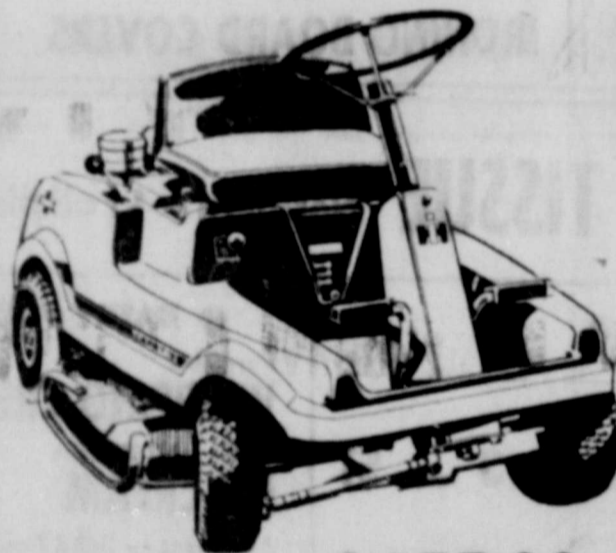

16th County Pecan School To Be April 18th In Cisco

The 16th Annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School will be held at Cisco, April 18, according to an announcement today by DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Agricultural Agent. The school will be co-sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. The morning session of the school will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the new auditorium of Cisco Junior College. This session will be devoted to discussions, pictures and demonstrations on budding and grafting. After lunch, the afternoon session will be held at a local pecan orchard near Cisco. Field demonstrations will be given and everyone will have an opportunity to practice the patch budding and inlay grafting techniques. Dr. J. W. Worthington, Texas A&M Extension Service Horticulturist, will be the instructor. Pecan producers and county agent will assist with the demonstrations. Anton White, President of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Assn., said the association will have bud wood, graft wood, as well as budding and grafting supplies for sale. This will include budding and grafting wood of most of the new USDA varieties. White invites everyone to attend. He said over 1,600 men and women from central and West Texas have attended the school during the last 15 years and learned to propagate pecans.
