Historical Meeting To Be Near Graham on April 16

Museums, archaeology and tourism are topics that will highlight the regional meeting of County Historical Survey Committees to be held at 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, April 16, at Fort Belknap, 10 miles northwest of Graham on FM 61. Invitation to attend, have been extended to Mike Collins, chairman, and members of Eastland County Historical Survey Committee. Other interested individuals are invited to sit in on the meeting. Program participants will include State Archaeologist Curtis Tunnell who will discuss the significance of archaeology in a well-balanced historical preservation program. A member of the Travel Development Section of the Texas, Highway Department will discuss the various services that department has available for Chambers of Commerce and other tourist-oriented groups. Also, a newly prepared slide program that highlights attraction, on the near-by Texas Travel Trail will be presented. Museum Development and Operation is the topic of TSHSC staffer, Miss Diana C. Files. Miss Files fills the newly-created position of Museum Consultant for the Survey Committee. Other members of the TSHSC staff will discuss pending legislation effecting historical preservation, placement of historical markers, and the 1969 program of work. Under previous years' program of work the following achievements have been recorded: 4,500 official historical markers erected; printing and distribution of more than 1,000 historical guides, maps and brochures; establishment of 185 fire-proof archives; restoration or preservation of more than 1,000 historical structures; and an increase from 82 museums in the state in 1964 to 280 today with 215 more being planned.

Construction, Insurance, Financing Is Discussed at Industrial Meet

New Trustee Officers Elected for Ranger Independent School District

Saturday was another big day for voters as they turned out 720 strong to elect two trustees of the Ranger Independent School District. Elected for Place One was Gaston Dixon, auto parts dealer. Dixon received 360 votes to unseat Mrs. Frances Cox. Mrs. Cox received 350 votes. Receiving 380 votes to win the position on Place Two was Dr. L. R. Gohike, incumbent. Gohike was opposed by Mac Jones, Enco dealer, who received 335 votes.

The new trustees were sworn into office at the regular Tuesday night meeting of the Board of Trustees in the office of the superintendent. New officers were also elected at the meeting. F. P. "Pete" Brashier was elected president of the board; Dr. W.

P. Watkins, vice-president; and Gaston Dixon was elected secretary of the board. Members of the Board of Trustees for the Ranger School District other than the new officers are Dr. L. R. Gohike, Morris Campbell, Ross Hodges, and Bob Revels.

The Ranger Industrial Development team heard reports on Construction and Insurance by Bill Parnell, James Ratliff, and David Pickrell and also a report on Financing by Glyn Gilliam and Lester Crossley at the Tuesday afternoon meeting held in the Ranger Room of the First Federal Savings and Loan Building. A thorough study of the industrial and commercial building construction was discussed. The cost of materials and service related to construction was discussed.

The cost of steel frame buildings was discussed and the materials delivered to the site of the building was explained. It was noted that material for a building could be delivered to a site in Ranger for \$1.50 to \$2.00 per square foot, material for a building with a concrete floor, delivered, would cost \$2 to \$3 per square foot, and material for a building with a dock high floor would cost \$4 to \$5 a square foot.

It was also noted that buildings in the area that have been built, a 40'x40', 1600 sq. ft., cost \$6,400; a 70'x112', 7840 sq. ft. cost \$21,953; and a building with air conditioning and heating and a 40'x40' sq. ft. costs \$9,008. A building with double masonry walls and extras with a 5100 sq. ft. plan costs \$12,000.

David Pickrell presented the topic on Insurance. He stated that the "Key Rate" for Ranger was 37c. He said that Ranger has the highest insurance rate in the area due to the lack of fire fighting equipment.

Pickrell gave a report on the liability insurance for automobiles in that the rate in Eastland County was \$46 as compared to \$84 in Harris County, due to the 164er auto accident in Eastland County. The insurance for commercial trucks in Eastland County is \$69 per year as compared to \$85 in Harris County.

The financial portion of the program was brought to the Industrial Team by Glyn Gilliam and Lester Crossley. There are several sources of funds for financing industrial facilities, Gilliam stated. Those most frequently and considered to be basic are:

Mortgage companies, Investor-builders, Commercial banks, Savings and loan associations, Insurance companies, Small Business Administration, Investment banker, Private investors, and industrial foundations.

He stated that the First State Bank and the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger are in a position to help any industry that is interested in locating in Ranger.

The final portion of the Industrial Development Training Sessions will conclude next Tuesday afternoon with the discussion of Transportation, being led by Pat Collins and Herman Cupp and Resources by Jerry Bob Greer and Duke Dixon.

County Roads To Be Improved In District Project

Three Eastland County highways will be improved in a contract let recently to McElroy Transport Co., Fort Worth, for 137 miles or seal coat work in the Brownwood District of the Texas Highway Department.

The county roads to be seal coated were listed as follows: U. S. 183, 2 miles, from the north city limits of Rising Star to the Brown County line; State Highway 36, 4.5 miles, from 3.7 miles east of the Callahan County line to Rising Star; and, Farm Road 717, 3.2 miles, from Farm Road 101 in Ranger to the Stephens County line.

The 137 miles will cost \$239,392.90. B. R. Russell of Brownwood is the engineer in charge of the work. Some 60 days will be needed to fulfill the contract, it was estimated.

Deadline Is Near To Obtain Auto Safety Stickers

AUSTIN—Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today reminded Texas motorists that only a short time remains until the state motor vehicle inspection deadline.

State law requires that cars, trucks, and certain trailers be inspected at an approved inspection station, and that a current inspection sticker be displayed in the lower right-hand corner of the windshield by midnight, April 15. The fee for the inspection is \$1.75, plus charges made by the inspection station for mechanical adjustments, if any.

The required inspection procedure requires that mechanics check a vehicle's brakes, lights, rims and wheels, horns and warning devices, windshield wipers, mirrors, steering, and front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment.

Speir urged motorists to get the inspection soon to avoid long lines which will develop at inspection stations as the April 15 deadline approaches.

There are 5,466 licensed inspection stations, located throughout the state.

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Called for Federal Jury? Read This, Be Prepared

It is early fall when the first letter arrives. The envelope is marked "Official Business, United States Government". Reasonably sure that the United States Government has no official business with you, except to send you those forms you ordered from the National Archives, you put the letter in your purse to read when you have more time to think about genealogical research. Later that morning, you pour a cup of coffee and get out the letter. It is not from the Archives.

It appears that your name has been selected at "random" from the voter registration list of 16 counties in this area of Texas and you are therefore being considered for jury duty in the Federal Court, Northern District of Texas, meeting at Abilene. Your cooperation in completing and returning the questionnaire herein enclosed would make the government most happy and, incidentally, prevent you from being jailed or fined.

Eager to spread happiness in official circles, you complete the form and let your husband check it. Just to be sure you have spelled your name right.

Another letter comes Jan. 6 and there is no mistaking what it is: it is certified and the postal department is anxious to have your photograph on certain papers of their own selection.

You scan the letter - idea seems to be that the government has examined you and found that you are not exempt from jury service nor entitled to be excused upon your request unless the facts in the previously returned questionnaire have altered. (Apparently this means that if you have died in the interim, you are not expected to serve on the jury.) You are hereby summoned to appear - 9 a.m. - Monday.

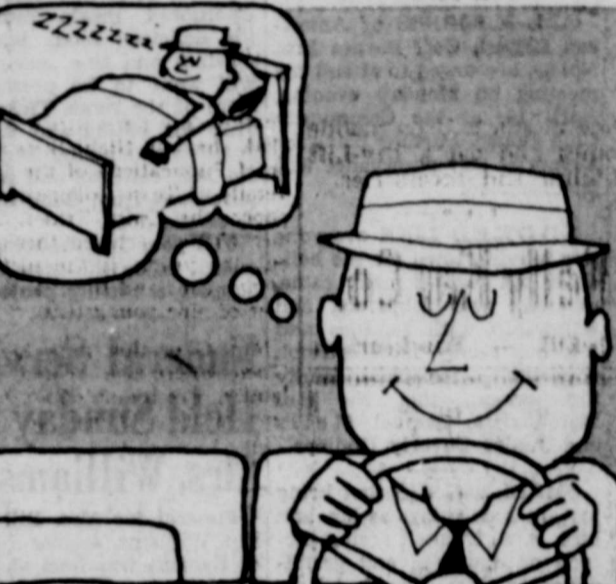

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History Of Eastland County Goes To Press

The first large-scale, comprehensive history of Eastland County since the Langston book was published in 1904, will be off the presses in May. This 400-page book, with its broad, extensive scope, covers the county as a whole and he develops the history of each town and village from its earliest settlement.

Early chapters cover topography and description, organization educational development and social and economic growth. Later chapters include history of each of the cities, in all are replete with biographies of many pioneers and their descendants.

The book has twenty-five illustrations scattered throughout.

Each one carrying its own point of interest. Published in hard binding with an attractive dust jacket, this book will be treasured for years to come by those who wish to preserve not only the history of their homeland, but also that of many families of the area, including, perhaps, their very own.

The author, Mrs. Pearl Ghormley, and her children are fourth-generation residents of the county. This is her second book. The first, Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow, was published in December, 1966, by the Naylor Company of San Antonio. Although primarily a genealogy of family relationships with a four-color production of eight family crests, it contained many pages of Eastland County history as well.

The author has long been involved with the printed word. For fifteen consecutive years before her retirement in 1964, she was Night Supervisor of Publications of the University of Texas college newspaper, the Daily Texan. She has written articles throughout the years; is the mother of two sons and the grandmother of nine youngsters.

Mrs. Ghormley grew up in Cisco where she reared her family. Fresh out of an Abilene business college, she became legal secretary for the late Judge J. J. Butts at the age of eighteen, and later worked for several other attorneys there. She is a former employe of the Cisco Daily News, where she acted as circulation manager, United Press Operator, and bookkeeper, her two sons carried papers: When the Daily News sold, the family moved to Breckenridge where the boys graduated in 1943 with honors. In that year Mrs. Ghormley accompanied her son, Wayne, to Austin, where he was enrolled in the University as a pre-medical student and she became associated with the Daily Texan.

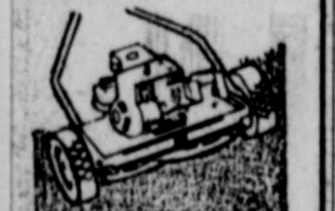

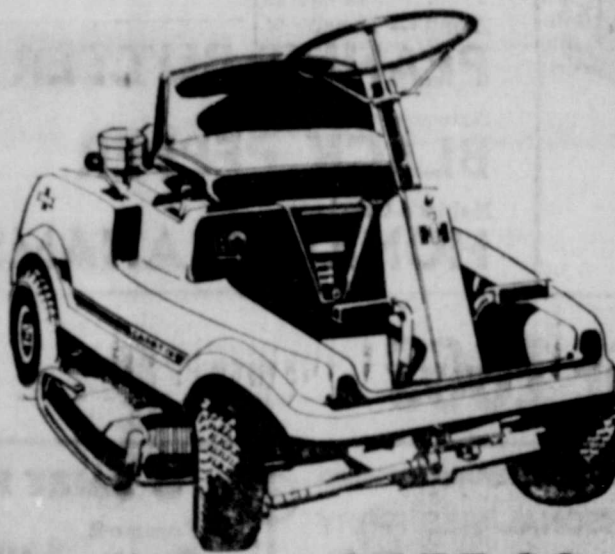

THE GORDON SPOT

By DE GORDON, County Agricultural Agent

Now that spring is here the outdoor work really begins. Most homeowners have more yard work to do than they can possibly get to. Cool season broadleaf weeds and grasses seem to be causing everyone trouble including myself. There are three different treatments recommended to control cool season plants before the lawn grass starts growing. Ammonium nitrate dissolved in water will burn all vegetation. Dissolve one pound of

ammonium nitrate fertilizer in one gallon of water and spray the weeds and grasses. One gallon is enough to spray 1000 square feet. The nitrogen will also benefit your lawn grass. There is, however, a problem in spraying with ammonium nitrate. It's hard to get all the fertilizer to dissolve causing the sprayer to clog. The nitrogen also corrodes the sprayer if it is not cleared real well.

Endothal is another material that can be sprayed on cool season weeds before the lawn

grass comes out. It should be sprayed on two or three days after a close mowing.

Paraquat is the third material that may be used on the weeds. It kills all vegetation it contacts. So more precautions should be followed when using paraquat. It should not be used after the grass comes out.

Bagworms, damaging insect pests of evergreens and occasionally of broadleaf plants, will soon be making their spring time appearances. Evergreens should be close-

ly examined, and if newly hatched bagworms are found, control measures should be applied.

The worms immediately spin a bag of silk around themselves and attach bits of foliage to the outside of the bag as they feed. The larvae carry these bags wherever they go with only the front part of their bodies protruding for feeding and movement. The bags enlarge as the bagworms grow. A heavy infestation can completely strip that plant of foliage. When this happens,

the plant may be lost. The effective "camouflage" presented by the bags makes the insect hard to detect and damage may be extensive before they are noticed. They are much easier to control while they are still young.

If bagworms were present on a plant last year and control measures were not applied chances are good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Recommended control measures are outlined in L-199 "Texas Guide for Controlling

Insects on Ornamental Plants". Copies are available from my office.

Chemical shearing of sheep and goats will be demonstrated to Texas producers April 17 at the Sheep and Angora Goat Field Day planned by Texas A&M Agricultural Research Center near McGregor.

Chemical fleece removal now only in the testing stage, will be done by Dr. Maurice Shelton, sheep and goat geneticist at McGregor. Shelton will discuss the possibilities and limitations of this method

for producers use in the future. Several other interesting topics will be discussed at the field day which begins at 9 A.M.

Now that pecan trees are budding out there is increased interest in budding and grafting the new improved varieties on native an undesirable stock. If you would like to learn how to do the budding or grafting, be sure to attend our propagation school at Cisco Junior College, April 18.
