

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

Restoration Is **Planned At Fort** Griffin by UofT

AUSTIN - A \$9,000 interagency contract has been negotiated between the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the University of Texas for archeological work relative to the restoration of Fort Griffin as a historic site. Fort Griffin is located on

the Brazos River in Shackelford County 15 miles north of Albany. The fort was established in 1867 and deactivated in 1881.
