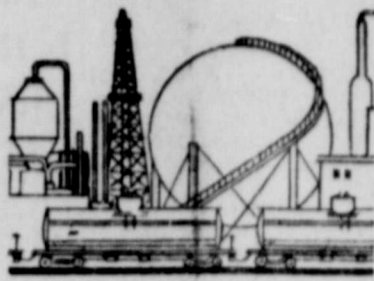

A DIRECTION FOR RANGER?

(An Editorial)

Ranger property owners will vote "yes" or "no" on Saturday, May 24 on whether a hospital district will be organized here, and whether approving bonds to help underwrite the cost of building a hospital.

As is almost always the case, there are differing opinions—should a district be formed, should bonds be approved, is there a better way? These are questions that Ranger folks are pondering. And well they should, because they are reasonable people and these are serious and important questions.

The Times would not for a minute presume to indicate, direct or instruct a voter as to how he should mark his ballot. These things a voter should and must decide for himself.

As indexes, we believe that these persons who are advocating the creation of the district and approval of the bonds are sincere in their approach to the needs of the community. At the same time, we believe that those who oppose the district and the bonds, are just as sincere in their search for a "better way". The right to dissent, in a lawful manner, is a basic right, we believe.

The Times will continue to ask itself, as it hopes each individual voter does: What is best for Ranger? Not just for now, but for the years ahead, and the people to come.

The basic questions are: Do we need a hospital? Are we willing to pay the price for one. It's our firm belief that you pay for what you get—nothing's free and we as a town shouldn't expect a miracle of hospital materialization.

It won't be easy, but if, after we've decided we need one and want one, we, together, can provide one . . . by working together.

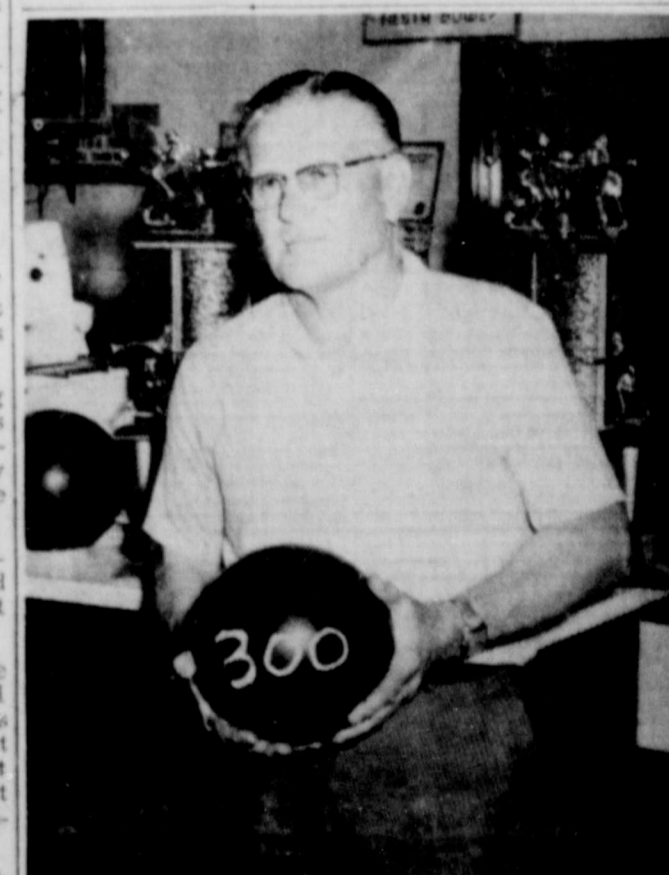

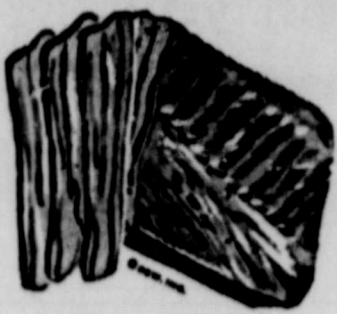

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (BJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund. (c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state. (f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character. Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund, eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

in Texas, and urge all Texans to join in honoring their fellow citizens who have reached a status of seniority and respect, and further urge that all Texans include senior citizens into the normal sphere of everyday living.

HEARING ON COURT BILL TUESDAY AT 2:30

A public hearing has been called for Tuesday, May 6, on State Rep. Temple Dickson's bill that would, if passed, permit Eastland's 11th Court of Civil Appeals to sit in Abilene, according to a report by Rep. Burke Musgrove.

The House Judiciary Committee was assigned the bill after Rep. Dickson introduced it recently. Eastland Countyians made a trip to Austin to oppose a Dickson bill then, which would have overtly moved the Appeals Court to Abilene.

So far as is known here, there are no plans to make another expedition to Austin to voice objection to the "subversive" bill, although a token notice might be wise. Indications here are that most are relying on State Sen. Tom Creighton to help protect Eastland County's efforts, in the event the bill is handed out of the committee with a favorable recommendation. It is felt that such a bill might actually be passed by the House as an embarrassment to Rep. Musgrove, but stopped in the State Senate. Indications were that such a measure was seriously considered two years ago, due to Rep. Musgrove's "wheeling and dealing" manner in the House.

This, of course, leaves Eastland Countyians, who are naturally concerned about the Court remaining in Eastland, in a quandary — whether to "go forth" and voice themselves again, or to remain calm, assuming that the court-move measure is merely a House political football.

At week's end, Rep. Musgrove appeared to have his hands full of interscholastic League programs, so most agreed that it's comforting to have a man of Sen. Creighton's stature, looking after things in Austin.
