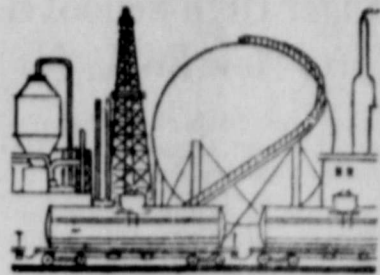

Brush Control Meeting Set in County May 16

John Matthews, Abilene area rancher and state chairman of the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association will be in Eastland County to explain the purposes of the association on May 16. Jame Fry, Eastland County Chairman of the BCRIA said all landowners are encouraged to attend the meeting which will be held at the Eastland Livestock Auction at 8 p. m., May 16.

Fry stated that the immediate goal is to obtain 1 cent per acre from each cooperating landowners each year for five years.

Oscar Schafer, County Screwworm Committee chairman will give a report on the serious screwworm situation facing livestock owners.

Brush control is a complex problem," Matthews said. "Surveys show that nearly 82 percent of Texas rangelands have been invaded by brush, reducing the animal carrying capacity by 50 percent or more. Our universities and the U. S. Department of Agriculture have done much, but it's clear that greater financial support is needed for a crash research program if we are to solve the problem."

Matthews added that more and more ranchers are aware that they must help solve the brush problem. All money collected will support research and educational projects on brush control and range improvement, Fry said.

Ranger Junior College held its annual All-Sports Banquet Thursday night, May 8 at Lone Cedar Country Club with over one-hundred attending. Coach Ken Pair was master of ceremonies for the event.

Coach Pair introduced coaches Ron Butler, coach of the Range-Anns Basketball team, Coach Jack Allen, coach of the baseball team, Coach Orlean Albridge, coach of the track team and Roger O'Connor of the golf team.

R. E. (Dick) Henderson, former coach of the Ranger Junior College Rangers, and now associated with Southwest Athletic Repair Co., was guest speaker.

In Henderson's talk he said, "I want to say that on behalf of a majority of Ranger Townspeople, that we feel that we have one of the best athletic programs in the State; that we have an able and dedicated coaching staff; that we have some of the finest young men and women our State and Nation has produced and we are proud of you."

"You young people hear a lot of criticism these days. But may I say that this comes from a minority and most people in Ranger are appreciative of the tremendous contribution that you are making to our community and to life itself. It has not gone unnoticed that there are no riots or demonstrations on our campus — but rather a group of students and faculty working together for betterment of students, teachers, community. We are all very proud of you."

"And this brings me to the last bit of advice and a few thoughts, I would like to share with you," Coach Henderson said. "No matter what may be one's nationality, sex, age, philosophy, or religion, everyone wishes either to become or to remain happy. The definition of happiness is interesting. One of the best definitions is: 'The happiest person is the person who thinks the most interesting thoughts.'"

"An 'Open Mind' is one of the necessary qualities for success. Are the windows of your soul open for the fresh air and sunshine of truth to come in? Or are they shuttered by mental laziness or stagnated by that emotional congestion called prejudice?" Henderson said.

"Only the incorrigible fool says that progress is impossible, that everything has been invented, or that there is any limit to the conquests that super intelligence working in mankind can achieve."

"Keep your eyes and mind open; nothing that is good is impossible," Henderson concluded. Awards were presented to the 'Outstanding Athletes' of Ranger College by Dean R. B. Golemon. Receiving a trophy for 'Outstanding Basketball Player' on the Range-Anns team was Angie Lowrance; Gene Knolle was presented a trophy as 'Outstanding Player' on the Rangers basketball team, receiving a trophy for 'Outstanding Baseball Player' was Danny Ragland, and Walter Martin received a trophy for the 'Outstanding Golfer'.

FLOWER TALK

By OPAL MARSH
WILD LILY OF VALLEY

The light green Wild Lily of the Valley is one of the most beautiful wild flowers growing in America today. It has two to three light green, shiny leaves which are ovate-lance-shaped or broader, with a somewhat heart-shaped base.

The berries are yellow-white, spotted with madder brown until early fall when they turn a dull translucent pale red. This lovely flower is a familiar plant in nearly all woods, in generally moist places.

Become Safety Conscious, Asks County FB Head

"We must all become more safety conscious if we expect to reverse the upward trend of fatalities due to farm accidents," Jack Cozart, Eastland County Farm Bureau president, said recently. "All too often it takes the death of a friend or relative to make us more safety minded."

Statistics for 1968, compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics and forwarded to the Eastland County Farm Bureau by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, show a six-percent death increase for 1968 as compared to the previous year. Last year 297 persons in Texas died as the result of farm accidents. There were 280 deaths in 1967.

TFB Safety Director, Joe Sneedman of Waco said, "We're becoming less safety minded. With the rural population decreasing, we would at least hope for the number of deaths due to farm accidents to decrease at the same rate, but they are not."

Firearm accidents accounted for the greatest number of fatalities last year; forty-nine persons were killed. Other major causes of the 297 deaths were burns - 54, falls - 44, tractor accidents - 33, drowning - 33, and farm machinery other than tractors - 22.

Most of the increase for 1968 is attributed to the increase number of deaths due to falls and tractor accidents as compared to 1967. The only category that showed a marked reduction of fatalities was drowning. Thirty-three drowned last year, compared to 41 in 1967.

\$60,000 Program Set Up For 6-County Area

A \$60,000 Neighborhood Youth Corps Summer Work Program available to high school youngsters in this area has been approved and is scheduled to begin June 2, it has been announced here.

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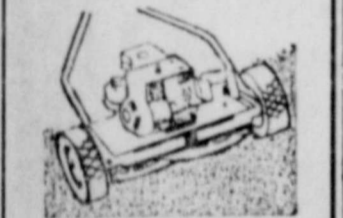

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

Screwworm Threat Is Great, Officials Report

All livestock owners are asked to be on the alert for screwworm outbreaks this year. The warning came from Dolph Briscoe, Jr. at an emergency meeting of the Screwworm Eradication officials and livestock men in San Antonio last Wednesday. Briscoe is President of the Southwestern Animal Health Research Foundation Board of Trustees.

Four Eastland County men attended the meeting. They were Oscar Schaefer, County Screwworm Committee Chairman; Doug Fry, President of the County Livestock Raisers Aen.; DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent and Bob Cohen, Asst. County Agent.

Before the screwworm eradication program began in 1962, screwworms caused Texas livestock men to lose 100 million dollars each year. Officials estimated the program has saved farmers and ranchers over 500 million dollars since it began in 1962.

Briscoe said there were 10,000 cases of screwworms reported last year compared to only 800 the previous year. There are indications that there may be even more outbreaks in 1969. There have been 60 screwworm cases during the first four months of 1969 compared to 49 cases on this date in 1968. Program officials said the large build-up of the costly pests was due

to a mild winter and a wet spring in South Texas and Mexico.

The Screwworm Eradication Program was initiated by livestock owners who contributed money to get the program started. Several ranchers expressed the opinion that stockmen were ready to give again if necessary to continue the eradication program. Briscoe said the program officials were asking for money at this time, but were asking for stockmen to do their part in keeping screwworm cases to a minimum. Ranchers were asked to observe their livestock closely, treat all wounds, send samples of all larvae collected to the Mission Lab, and spray all livestock.

Schaefer said plans were being made to alert all Eastland County livestock owners of the urgency of the screwworm situation.

Second Phase of I-20 Authorized By State Agency

The Texas Highway Commission has authorized construction of the second phase of an 11.1 mile section of Interstate Highway 20 on new location in Eastland, it was reported here.

The new section will pass south of the main areas of Cisco and Eastland and the present US Highway 90 between the two cities.

Approved was construction of base and surfacing for an expressway facility from 1.0 mile west of Cisco eastward to 0.6 mile east of State Highway 6, southwest of Eastland. Construction of grading and surfacing on the section was authorized previously.

Estimated cost of the work is \$3.2 million.


