Voters to Decide Saturday If Ranger Is to Have Hospital

SCHOOLS, HOSPITALS AND CHURCHES... An Editorial

Check any index you choose, and these three ingredients are the difference between a living and dying community.

A town can do without a lot of things—but without either of these three vital elements, it ceases to be a thriving, living entity capable of growth.

Take away any one of these and the result is inevitable. These are basic. They are the links that hold a town's people together—keeping them pulling in the same direction, working for the same high goals.

Ranger schools are strong; providing solid education for our young people. Ranger schools have a great future.

Ranger churches are strong; providing for the religious strength of our people. Ranger churches have a great future.

Ranger's hospital needs our help. It's a time for rebuilding, renewing and revitalizing of our hospital facilities. That which was adequate 30 years ago is no longer sufficient in this age.

A big turnout of voters, enthusiastic support for Ranger's hospital Saturday, will be yet another vivid expression that all the people believe in the future of Ranger, and believe in keeping its foundations strong.

Polls Open 7 a.m., Close 7 p.m. At School Recreation Building

The Saturday, May 24 election gives the citizens of Ranger a choice to vote "for" or "against" the Ranger Hospital District, as authorized by the Texas Legislature, and the authorization to issue \$150,000 in general obligation bonds.

Polled will be open from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. in the Recreation Building. Both husband and wife may vote.

Included in the propositions will be the authority to levy a tax not to exceed 75c per \$100 assessed valuation. However, the anticipated tax is expected to average only 28 1/2c per \$100 valuation on property in the hospital district over a 20-year period.

The Ranger General Hospital board had, for some time, been working toward improving the facilities, but it was the withdrawal of Medicare provider funds on November 4, 1968 which brought about the emergency demanding that some action be taken.

Action by HEW in cutting off funds was verified in a written statement to the hospital board, setting out the long list of inadequacies in meeting minimum standards:

- (1) Inadequate floor space per bed in patient room, (2) Door to patient rooms too narrow to permit easy evacuation, (3) Some corridors do not lead to exits, (4) No facilities for washing of hands in patient rooms, (5) No outside exit from third floor, (6) Stairways and corridors not suitably constructed, (7) No emergency power available, (8) No fire doors on stair wells, (9) No fire sprinkler system, (10) No fire detection devices, (11) Inadequate heating and cooling systems to prevent spread of communicable diseases throughout the building and (12) Inadequate bath and toilet facilities.

Faced with these facts, the hospital board directed Doris Harris, administrator, to do all possible to correct these conditions. A large number of corrections have been made in the staff and administrative

However, major deficiencies in the physical plant could not be corrected without a new building.

Consensus from the community meeting in May, 1968 was that the Mayor should appoint a citizens hospital committee to undertake a study of the situation and make recommendations back to the city commission.

This opinion was reported to the hospital plan against HEW requirements to determine whether the present plant could be brought into compliance. After extensive

Study in depth, and consultations with hospital administrators and architects led to the conclusion that such a hospital plant would cost \$900,000 for building, equipment, and furnishings. This would include the central facilities from which expansion could be made, as needed, with considerable less cost per patient bed.

The citizens hospital committee made its report on findings at a called Town Hall Meeting in April, 1969. They recommended creation of the hospital district with taxing authority up to 75c on the \$100 valuation as the best way to get started.

They ask approval of the citizens of their financial plan for the hospital project which would include \$425,000 federal grant (Hill - Burton); \$75,000 donations by interested persons; \$250,000 in revenue bonds to be paid by the hospital; and general obligation bonds in the amount of \$150,000, the last to be decided at the election, and represents approximately 1/6 of the total cost of the hospital project.

Consensus among those working on the financing of the hospital is that with the passage of the \$150,000 bond issue at the Saturday, May 24 election, the remainder of the financing will be more readily available. The passage of the bond issue will be a show of good faith by the citizens themselves.

Further information from the citizens hospital committee shows that the boundaries of the proposed hospital district coincide with boundaries of Ranger Independent School District located in Eastland County.

What will this cost the individual home-owner? Example: A \$7,500 home, assessed at 30%, or \$2,250, at 31c tax rate (as set for the first year) will cost \$6.98 for the hospital district. Another example: 160 acres of land assessed at \$8.00 per acre (this is higher than average for Ranger Independent School District) will have for tax purposes, an evaluation of \$1,280. With the 31c hospital tax rate, this will cost the homeowner a total of \$3.97 for his hospital district.

**SEYMOUR DOES IT—**

**SEYMOUR (RNS)—**The new Baylor County Hospital at Seymour is expected to be ready for service about the first of July, according to Administrator Glenn Johnson.  
He said the Seymour Hospital Authority will employ a total of 70 in the housekeeping, nursing service, dietary, maintenance and administrative departments.  
There will be 15 private rooms and 17 semi-private rooms each with individually-controlled heating and cooling, electric beds, and individual closets and bathrooms.  
A communications system has been installed between the nursing station and the patient rooms which will give the nursing staff a closer check on each patient. Each room has been arranged to give a commanding view of the city or the surrounding countryside.  
The surgical section of the hospital will consist of two operating rooms, one delivery room, one labor room, a recovery room and a central sterilization department. These areas will have the latest equipment for the convenience of the patient. There will be a cardiac unit and a four-bed intensive care unit. The emergency room will be equipped with two tables and a small waiting area with comfortable chairs inside the emergency room entrance.  
X-ray and laboratory departments are located in the center of the hospital for faster service to both patients and the out-patients. There are convenient dressing rooms for out-patient examinations.  
The dietary department consists of a large modern kitchen with a modern dining room for those employees who use the cafeteria.  
The main lobby will contain the administrative section, waiting area, the Ladies' Auxiliary snack bar and a small chapel overlooking an interior garden. All corridors will be carpeted to keep down the noise.  
The parking lots and entrance drives will be paved, curbed, guttered, and well lighted.  
The expense to the patient will be kept in line with other hospitals in this area, and room rates will be just as reasonable as possible, Johnson said.

This hospital will be put into operation without any tax money from the people of the city or Baylor County, and no taxes are to be levied. Revenue from the hospital will be used to retire the revenue bonds. This money is borrowed from Housing and Urban Development, a government agency, which does not enter into the operation of the hospital. When the bonds are retired, the hospital will be the property of the City of Seymour.

The people from this county and neighboring counties will have access to the most modern and well equipped hospital anywhere in the state, he said. The value of the plant and property will be about \$1,000,000.

**SEYMOUR DOES IT—**

**SEYMOUR (RNS)—**The new Baylor County Hospital at Seymour is expected to be ready for service about the first of July, according to Administrator Glenn Johnson.  
He said the Seymour Hospital Authority will employ a total of 70 in the housekeeping, nursing service, dietary, maintenance and administrative departments.  
There will be 15 private rooms and 17 semi-private rooms each with individually-controlled heating and cooling, electric beds, and individual closets and bathrooms.  
A communications system has been installed between the nursing station and the patient rooms which will give the nursing staff a closer check on each patient. Each room has been arranged to give a commanding view of the city or the surrounding countryside.  
The surgical section of the hospital will consist of two operating rooms, one delivery room, one labor room, a recovery room and a central sterilization department. These areas will have the latest equipment for the convenience of the patient. There will be a cardiac unit and a four-bed intensive care unit. The emergency room will be equipped with two tables and a small waiting area with comfortable chairs inside the emergency room entrance.  
X-ray and laboratory departments are located in the center of the hospital for faster service to both patients and the out-patients. There are convenient dressing rooms for out-patient examinations.  
The dietary department consists of a large modern kitchen with a modern dining room for those employees who use the cafeteria.  
The main lobby will contain the administrative section, waiting area, the Ladies' Auxiliary snack bar and a small chapel overlooking an interior garden. All corridors will be carpeted to keep down the noise.  
The parking lots and entrance drives will be paved, curbed, guttered, and well lighted.  
The expense to the patient will be kept in line with other hospitals in this area, and room rates will be just as reasonable as possible, Johnson said.

This hospital will be put into operation without any tax money from the people of the city or Baylor County, and no taxes are to be levied. Revenue from the hospital will be used to retire the revenue bonds. This money is borrowed from Housing and Urban Development, a government agency, which does not enter into the operation of the hospital. When the bonds are retired, the hospital will be the property of the City of Seymour.

The people from this county and neighboring counties will have access to the most modern and well equipped hospital anywhere in the state, he said. The value of the plant and property will be about \$1,000,000.

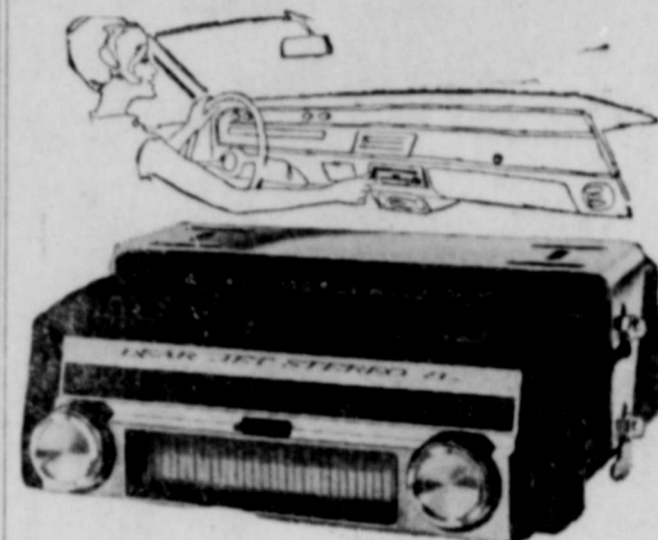

Yes, there are many wealthy people in our community who can afford to pay additional taxes a Hospital District would create. Especially if this tax money would help their business. These people DO NOT PAY, they PROFIT!

What about those who depend on a retirement check? These people have earned these checks and are already paying for medicare out of their check. Is it right that we force them to pay out more of this check for a hospital? These people DO NOT PROFIT, they PAY!

Have we been led to believe that a tax district is the ONLY way our town can offer the medical care the people who PAY deserve? The truth is there are many other ways. Both Eastland and Cisco will, or already are, providing this care without FORCING or FOOLING the Social Security check holder to PAY, while the wealthy PROFIT.

**HOSPITAL vs. SCHOOLS!**

Attention, Taxpayers of the Ranger Independent School District! I repeat: Attention, Taxpayers of the Ranger Independent School District!

A vote against the creation of a Hospital District, and a tax on each property owner in the District, is NOT a vote against adequate hospital facilities that will enable the residents of the Independent School District of Ranger to secure Medicare payments for those citizens who are now, or may later be, eligible for Medicare protection.

Hospitals are totally unlike Public Schools which must depend on taxes for their existence. Hospitals are paying institutions. They charge a substantial fee for their service. Taxpayers must support the Public Schools which have no other means of support. But why should Taxpayers be called on to support a hospital which does have other means of support?

At the present time, there are five operating hospitals in Eastland County. Not one of these institutions was built by creating a Hospital District or by levying a tax on the property owner.

If this has been done successfully five times in Eastland County, why can it not be done one more time?

Think carefully, Taxpayer, before you vote on May 24th.

Next year our city will be taken before a Federal Court. In 1940, we could not pay the bonded indebtedness we owed, and were at that time put under a Federal Court order to pay this debt in 30 years (1970). In those 30 years we paid only 20% of this debt and are now short \$444,000. In plain talk, we have VIOLATED a Federal Court order. THIS IS A DEAD SERIOUS MATTER! Lawyers say we will be lucky if our city taxes are only DOUBLED in 1970, next year.

Every public school building we have in Ranger is over 40 years old. This debt of almost \$400,000 will be paid in another 25 years. Do you think the buildings will make it? Do we as proud citizens of Ranger WANT them to make it?

Our college picture is not too different. While they have a nice plant, only a few in our community are benefiting and many are paying. We owe \$475,000, in bonds and are behind in current bills over \$30,000.

With the shape our schools are in and since the last "blanket" raise was some 10 years ago, with inflation we can bet a school tax increase is "just around the corner".

Regardless of the facilities we offer in the way of schools, hospitals, city, etc., additional taxes discourages oil companies that are here, retired folks that are here, and businesses that will come here. Remember, this is not the LAST chance to build a hospital, only the FIRST proposition that has been offered.

**WHAT IS THE COST?**

Only \$9.00 per year? Only 30 years? Tax may never be collected? Don't you believe it!!

On a house rendered at \$3,000 at 25% of value, the proposed Hospital District could tax you up to \$91.00 per year. Not for just 30 years but from NOW ON. This is more than most individual monthly retirement checks. A dear price to pay because we did not seriously consider another way to provide the medical care some of our citizens need.

As for as the tax being collected, we have heard this cry before in connection with the Water District; yet the Tax was levied and we are still paying it.

Just as important is the cost to our PRIDE. When will we realize that the 2.5 million dollars of bonded indebtedness our community owes now is a JUST DEBT that we are not paying as we promised to do and to add an additional \$400,000 is NOT progress but a disgusting disgrace!!

1. Have you been lead to believe that a hospital is all that can or will be built? Not only a hospital but medical and dental clinics, rest homes, blood banks, and training centers.

2. Have you been told that the hospital board of directors has the power to sell or lease any or all of this complex for no more than one (\$1) dollar or lease for no more than (\$1) one dollar per year?

3. Have you been told that your tax evaluation will never be raised? Not only can it be raised there is no provision to stop the tax once the bonds have been paid but will continue as long as the hospital district exists.

4. Did they tell you that the bonds would be paid off in twenty years? No they did not it was only proposed but the bill gives forty years to pay. From Rangers past history which of the two do you think that the board of directors will choose. I would predict that the final payment of the bonds will be in the year 2010 rather than the proposed year 1989.

5. Have you heard that one of our major industries is planning to move out of our tax district and take about thirty families employed by them. If this election carries this company will be taxed approximately another eight thousand dollars and force them to move. The property owners that remain will have no choice but to have their taxes raised to make up this eight thousand dollars. The city, school, county and water district taxes would also be raised to compensate for this tax loss.

6. Have you been told that this is the only way to build a new hospital? There are five hospitals in the county that were built without a tax district.

7. Have you heard that the present hospital does not meet the standards of Medicare and Medicare was discontinued on this reason only? If this is the case why has the Gorman Hospital been returned to the Medicare approved list as it is also an old hospital.

8. Did you hear that the new hospital estimated cost would be only nine hundred thousand dollars. Cisco is almost ready to start building their hospital and using their actual bids and cost to figure the cost of the new Ranger Hospital one will find that an additional four hundred thousand dollars will be needed. There should be a simple solution to cover this minor error.

Just raise the taxes and sell more bonds.

### Gorman Hospital Bill Is Studied At Austin Meet

Delegations from Desdemona and Carbon of Eastland County appeared before a Texas Senate Committee in Austin Tuesday night to protest their inclusion in the proposed Gorman Hospital District. A bill creating the district has been passed by the house and now is before the senate.

Don Estes, Gorman rancher, told the Senate group that the House bill by Burke Murgrave did not include provisions that it originally contained. The house bill calls for separate elections in each of the Carbon, Desdemona and Gorman school districts on the

hospital question. Clyde Lewis of Desdemona appeared and asked that his community be left out of the district.

Ross Wilson of Gorman, head of the South Eastland County Hospital District, appeared in support of the bill. He cited a newspaper straw vote indicating that a big majority of the people favor the matter. He said about \$60,000 has been raised in the district for the hospital, which would replace the Blackwell Hospital and Clinic at Gorman.

Gorman business men appeared to support the measure as important to community growth.

Sen. Tom Creighton, a D Rep. Musgrove spoke to assure the groups that their purpose was to provide legal details of the district in keeping with the wishes of the people.

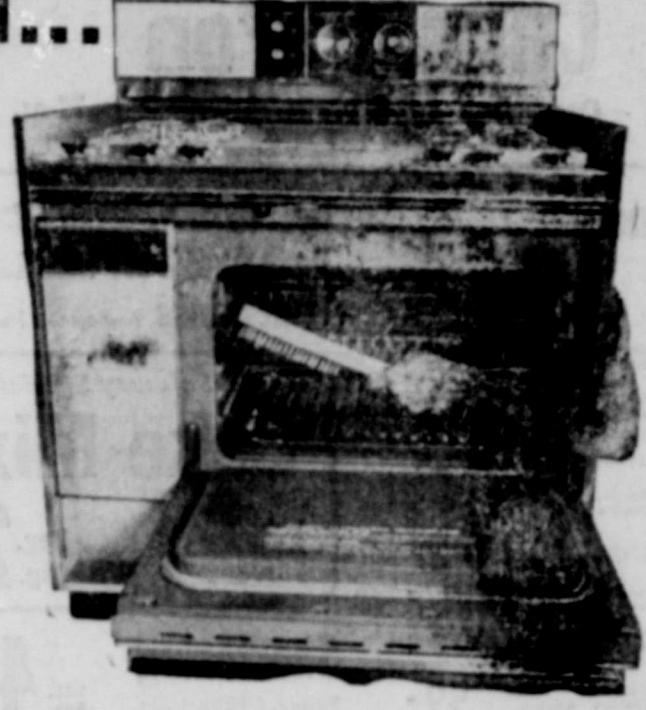
