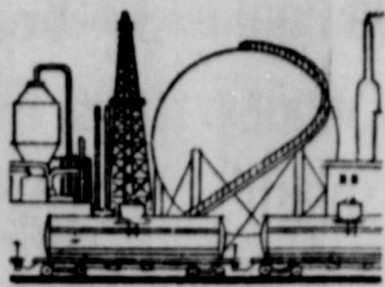

RANGER IS IN DEBT! AN EDITORIAL

Debt is a problem which plagues individuals, co-operations, communities, states and nations. We hear much about the national debt and, in the payment of taxes, are doing our share.

On the home front, the problem of a 30-year debt must be solved—immediately.

In 1940, the City of Ranger became voluntarily bankrupt. That year, \$576,200.00 in bonds were refunded and in 1946, \$72,840.00 for a total indebtedness of \$649,040.00.

Between 1940-1945, a total of \$45,400.00 in bonds were retired; between 1945-1960, none and from 1961 to 1968, \$159,300.00 leaving a total indebtedness of \$444,340.00.

This is not to commend nor to criticize; not to say what should or should not have been done, but what must be done NOW! All bonds are due on March 1, 1970, approximately eight months from today. Since it is the responsibility of all citizens, all are encouraged to offer suggestions as to a feasible solution to the dilemma.

Interested local citizens are urged to join Ranger City Commission in a meeting to be held at 7:00 p.m. Monday, June 9, in the Ranger Room of First Federal Building. Help to find ways and means toward the worthy and highly desirable goal — A DEBT FREE RANGER!

Public School Lunchrooms Get \$6,500 Worth of Food

The Ranger Public School Lunchrooms received \$6,500.33 worth of food the past school year from the State Department of Public Welfare Commodity Distribution District at Brownwood. This is considered the wholesale value of the donated food.

The schools received 200 pounds of dry milk valued at \$79.92; 400 pounds of rice at \$48.96; 2,000 pounds corn meal at \$156.00; 2,638 pounds of lard at \$38.72; 5,600 pounds of flour at \$436.80; 864 pounds of rolled oats and wheat at \$181.44.

12,000 pounds dry beans at \$132; 2,112 pounds of country butter at \$1,647.36; 1,560 pounds of process cheese at \$920.40; 48 gallons peanut butter at \$109.04; 42 gallons canned sweet potatoes at \$44.10; and 54 gallons tomato paste at \$47.94.

48 gallons canned green beans at \$41.20; 108 gallons canned corn at \$104.04; 54 gallons canned peas at \$47.97; 120 gallons canned tomatoes at \$104.40; 7 gallons canned apricots at \$50.40; 54 gallons canned pineapple at \$75.60.

18 gallons canned grape fruit sections at \$21.60; 42 gallons prunes at \$45.50; 60 gallons peaches at \$57.80; 60 pounds honey at \$18.80.

864 pounds of frozen turkeys at \$421.20; 960 pounds of frozen cut-up chickens at \$336.00; 1,042 pounds of frozen boneless beef at \$408.00; 120 pounds of raisins at \$23.40; 990 pounds of frozen pork at \$398.70.

Prices of meals would have been considerably higher Supt. James R. Clark said had this free food not been received.

Request for More Deputies To Be Made Monday

Open Meeting Is Set For 10 A.M. Monday

Formal requests will be made to the Eastland County Commissioners Court Monday for more help for the County Sheriff's Department.

In a concerted effort, individuals and organizations have indicated that they will attend the 10 a. m. meeting on the second floor of the courthouse when the commissioners hold their regular semi-monthly meeting.

Stimulating the current push for more sheriff's deputies has been the recent jail breaks in which five prisoners escaped and the resulting kidnappings, armed robberies and man-hunts. Three of the five prisoners have been re-captured and returned to County Jail cells.

Among the most spirited is the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse. Mr. Sam Kimmell of Cisco will be spokesman for the group and will be accompanied by Captain T. C. Fambrough and Secretary and Treasurer Alvin Kincaid. Eastland Attorney Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. will also be a speaker, requesting extra sheriff's help.

Any number of individuals, including members of the Eastland Jaycee Club also are expected to attend. The meetings are open and the public is welcome.

Also expected is Sgt. Jerry Matthews of the Texas Department of Public Safety, whose men assisted in the man-hunts and investigations, conducted by Field Deputy Loy Williams. Sheriff L. E. Sublett was injured in the second break and has been hospitalized, leaving Williams, Office Deputy Ott Williams and Jailor John Shook to carry on the work of his department.

Among the data to be given commissioners is the fact that, compared to Eastland County, sheriff's departments in adjoining counties virtually have an army of helpers. For example, Brown County with a population of 22,000, the sheriff serves six towns with three outside deputies, one office deputy, one jailer, one matron and four autos.

Comanche county (population, 10,000) four towns, help besides the sheriff includes two outside deputies, one office deputy, one matron three cars and one jailer.

Palo Pinto County, 45,000 population with seven towns, has six outside deputies, one office deputy, one matron, one jailer and seven cars. Shackelford County, 4,900 population, two towns, two outside deputies, one office deputy, one matron, one special deputy and four cars.

Stephens County, 8,000 population, one outside deputy, one matron, two cars for two towns.

Callahan County, 9,000 population and four towns, three outside deputies, one office deputy, one matron and four cars.

Coleman County, 12,000 population, two towns, two outside deputies, one office deputy, one matron, one jailer and three cars.

Beginning with the July billing, it is necessary that the City Sanitation Department raise its fee for trash pick-up 25 per cent with a minimum of 50c per month increase on all commercial accounts. All residence will be increased 50c.

Trash Pick-up Fee To Be Increased 25% July 1

The above requirement is to take care of the extra cost of labor, equipment and converting the uncontrolled dump ground to a controlled landfill refuse disposal ground, as required to meet the regulations of the Texas State Board of Health.

ONE OUTSIDE DEPUTY

The Eastland Sheriff has one outside deputy, one office deputy, one jailer, one matron and two cars, serving eight towns and several communities in a county with a population of approximately 20,000. One deputy remains in the courthouse office at all times to answer the phone, deal with the public and take care of book work and run the radio.

The Jailor deputy remains at the jail as does the Jail Matron. During all trials one deputy remains in the District Court as bailiff.

WIVES MUST HELP

When transporting prisoners, the sheriff's department must take them alone or have wives to help.

Sheriff Sublett is responsible for calling persons for jury duty and since the first of the year, 218 have been called for jury duty, two grand juries called and 18 person picked up for petit jury duty.

The following is the number of citizen citations the sheriff department has served or posted since Jan. 1:

69 civil citations, 64 sheriff's foreign citations, 48 probate citations, 125 criminal warrants, 10 trips to Wichita Falls State Hospital, plus numerous trips transporting persons from other counties, states and to state pen. Plus 87 investigations of thefts and burglaries.

The number of prisoners placed in the Eastland County Jail since Jan. 1 — 132.

In addition there are hundreds of calls for investigations of disturbances, prowlers and family squabbles.

The county's May 31 financial statement shows that the county carries \$17,560.10 in the jury fund and \$50,000 on time deposit in a local bank.

THE GORDON SPOT

By DeMarquis (Doe) Gordon

Did you know that it takes several years of evaluations before a new tomato variety can be released? The plant breeders of the Texas Agricultural Experiment station breed tomatoes to meet a specific purpose. Then the promising varieties are grown and evaluated all over the state.

Charles Marshall of Eastland is one grower who is cooperating in this evaluation of new tomatoes. Dr. A. L. Harrison of Yokum has been trying to develop a tomato that will be disease resistant and will produce well during the summer. He sent me seeds of five varieties that are known only as Y255, Y220-2 and other such numbers.

Marshall, his wife and two boys — Charlie and John, will keep accurate records on such things as number of tomatoes produced per plant, size of tomatoes, dates of first and last picking, occurrence of diseases, etc.

This same evaluation is done by growers in 240 other counties. If a new summer producing tomato is released in the future, we will remember that the Marshalls contributed to its development.

Cooperating growers also assist with the evaluation of other varieties and chemicals. Chester Marrs of Ranger is testing the value of four different fungicides to control pecan diseases.

A pecan grower in Rising Star used the same fungicides last year and found that

trees treated with fungicide produced as much as 60 pounds more pecans per tree than the untreated trees.

We call these demonstrations. Others who are conducting demonstrations of various kinds this year are R. L. Lewis, Merford Lewis and J. R. Grimshaw of Desdemona; Fred Perkins and Ike Hickman of Rising Star; Hardy Browder of Gorman; and Edwin Schaefer of Cisco.

Summer is almost here and many farmers and ranchers will be hiring boys and girls to fill in for the critical labor shortage during the summer months. But before employing such youth, certain requirements must be met under the Fair Labor Standard Act as amended in 1968.

Employers must abide by Labor Requirements when hiring youth under 16 years of age other than the owner's or operator's own children.

This law states briefly that youngsters under 16 cannot be hired to operate or ride a tractor; operate or unclog combines, haybalers, hay conditioners, forage harvesters, post-hole diggers, power driven saws; or work inside a gas-tight forage on grain enclosure or in a yard, pen or stall occupied by a dairy bull, boar or stud horse.

These standards do not apply when a youngster under 16 is employed by his parents on a farm owned or operated by such parent.

An employer can be fined up to \$10,000 for willful violation of the Labor Act.
