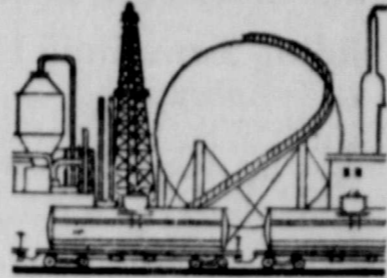

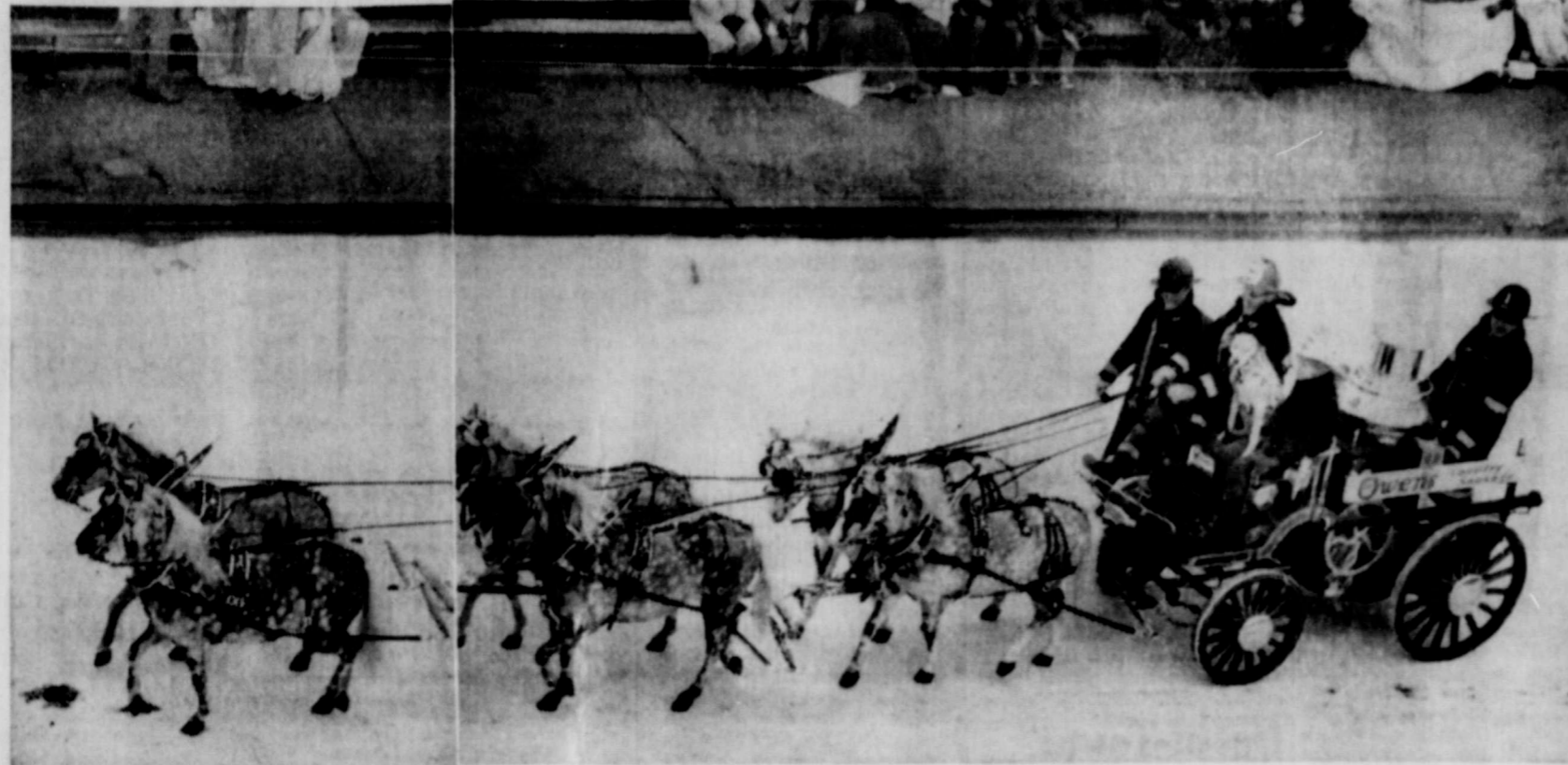

The Eastland County Commissioners Court is expected to submit a "general denial" of its part in alleged irregularities cited in a suit seeking to overturn the May 24 election in which Ranger voters approved creation of a hospital district and issuance of \$150,000 in bonds.

But Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey said he and the commissioners wanted to get an opinion from District Attorney Emory Walton, and Walton was in Abilene early this week in connection with other court procedures.

Hospital Efforts, Attitudes Affect Medicare Re-Instatement

Ranger General Hospital is in receipt of the following letter, dated June 19, 1969, from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland.

Administrator:

This is to inform you that pursuant to the order of remand issued by the hearing examiner on June 11, 1969, our order of October 14, 1968 terminating the Ranger General Hospital as a provider of services as of November 4, 1968 is hereby rescinded.

Our decision to take this action was made after an evaluation of the precautions currently being taken by the medical and administrative staff of Ranger Hospital to minimize hazards to patients and the cooperation and endeavors made to correct existing deficiencies. In addition, the action taken by the community of Ranger, Texas in approving by an election the creation of the Ranger Hospital District for the purpose of building a new facility indicates that the community supports your good faith and the efforts you are making to upgrade the level of care provided by the hospital.

Your continued participation in the Medicare program will be dependent, of course, upon your continued efforts to correct existing deficiencies and to remain in compliance with the Medicare conditions of participation.

Five Local Men Attending School In Abilene

Five Ranger men are enrolled in the Emergency Care Training School being conducted in Abilene, June 24-25-26.

Attending from the local fire department are Jimmy Ratliff, Arthur Canacho and M. A. Orr, sponsored by Killingsworth Funeral Home are Reed Campbell and Bill Ogden.

The school, conducted by the Texas Department of Health in cooperation with Taylor-Jones County Medical Society, provides a period of intensive training for ambulance attendants, police and law officers, firemen, industrial and first aid personnel and persons interested in immediate emergency care of the sick and injured. Firemen will receive special instruction in first aid at fire and disaster areas.

Instructors will include doctors and nurses of the Abilene area.

Two Men Plead Guilty In Federal Court Case

Two men snared in a pep pill dragnet by officers April 18 at Cisco and Eastland pleaded guilty Monday in Abilene federal court to illegal possession of amphetamines.

U. S. District Judge L. E. Brewster postponed sentencing until his September term of court here for Bobby Junior Housh, 40, of Cisco, and Ronald D. Westmoreland, 29, of Mineral Wells.

The pair could receive maximum penalties of a year in prison and fines of \$1,000.

Housh also still must face in September a three-count indictment of conspiring to smuggle pep pills into the U. S. from Mexico and aiding and abetting.

U. S. Atty. Eldon Mahon of Fort Worth requested that the same indictment against Westmoreland be dismissed.

The government plans to use Westmoreland's testimony against Housh. Defense attorneys Malcolm Shulz and W. L. Burke Jr. asked for the 3-month postponement because they had planned on both men being tried together.

A third defendant still is free. He is Gustavo Garcia Trevino of Ciudad Acuna, across the Rio Grande River from Del Rio. Mahon described him as the "key supplier" of pep pills into all the U.S. from Mexico for use as "no dose" tablets by truck drivers.

The three men were indicted in May by a federal grand jury in San Angelo.

Mahon said Westmoreland—a former civilian helicopter pilot at the Army's Fort Wolters base—made aerial trips from Ciudad Acuna to Eastland County delivering pep pills.

The U.S. attorney said Westmoreland's scheduled pay rate was \$800 per trip.

At the time of his and Housh's April 18 arrest, Westmoreland had been living in Cisco and made a couple of in-Texas deliveries from Cisco to Dickens and Lamesa, said Mahon.

'A Visit To America' To Be Placed In Ranger Library

The fact that Ranger's fame or infamy may have been rather wide spread came to light recently when Michael Herrington received from a long-time pen pal a copy of a thirty-five-year-old book purchased in a school fair in Johannesburg, South Africa.

The travelogue entitled "A Visit To America" was written by a Scotsman, A. G. Macdonell, and published in 1935. The author has a witty style that is especially entertaining. The book offers several possible motives for reading besides his brief (perhaps too frank) mention of Ranger. His observations on American sports, including the public's frenzied interest in the World Series and a hilarious analysis of a football game between Princeton and Williams, are especially marked with his clever sense of humor. Anyone who has actually traveled parts of America, or would like to, would enjoy reading his observations on both the well-travelled and the less-travelled spots. Something of an extra bonus is the contrast between what he observed and considered important about the American way of life in the 1930's and what most of us would consider to be true at the threshold of the 1970's. The majority of his travel was done by train (probably the only reason that brought him through Ranger) which is itself a by-gone era.

The book was sent as a gift to Herrington by his correspondent friend Miss Tullia Cornelius of Johannesburg, South Africa, who has had the book for some years since first acquiring it and thought that some Ranger library might like to add it to their collection as it is an edition for sale only in the Commonwealth.

"A Visit To America" was presented to Mrs. Kenneth Jameson who will place it in Ranger High School Library.

Bond Sales Total \$8,015

During the month of May cash sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Eastland County totaled \$8,015, according to Mr. J. V. McWhorter, area chairman. Sales for the five-month period totaled \$173,542 and this is 58 per cent of the 1969 goal of \$300,000.

Sales in Texas during May totaled \$14,994,457 and the January-May sales were \$77,653,923 — 44 per cent of the state's goal of \$176.5 million. Investment in Freedom Shares during the month reached \$1,055,276 as compared to \$812,641 during the same period of 1968. The January-May sales totaled \$4,942,031 as compared to \$3,919,422 during 1968.

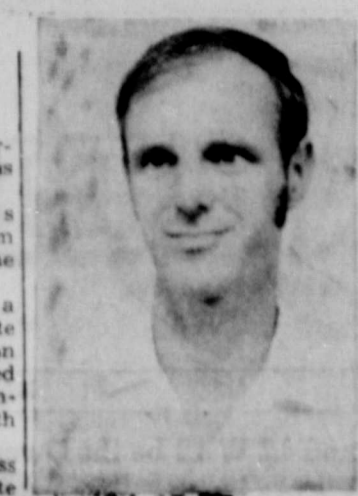

Lawmen's School Being Planned by Commissioners

Under discussion by the Eastland commissioners during their Monday morning meeting was their sponsorship of a training school for law officers, to which they also expect to give formal approval. If approved, the school will be taught by law enforcement experts under the direction of Texas A&M University Police Training division, of which Ira E. Scott is chairman.

The two-week school will be paid for by Eastland County, with a cost of \$300 for the two weeks of courses in prisoner handling, jail procedures and courtroom demeanor. Classes will be held for two hours daily, with the experts on hand later for consultation.

Judge Bailey said attendance cannot be made mandatory, but he expects most of the law enforcement officers at the county including county and city lawmen, to attend "at least some of the classes." Working schedules will not permit all lawmen to attend all classes.

There will be no cost to individual lawmen or the agencies for which they work, Bailey noted. He said he also hopes other area law enforcement officials will attend the courses, since the county will pay a flat fee for the school, rather than a per-man tuition. Successful completion of the school would "go a long way toward satisfying training credentials to be required by law in 1970," Bailey said.

Also in connection with law enforcement in the county, the commissioners are studying the possibility of making constable posts full-time jobs, rather than the present part-time jobs situation paying \$125 a month. Commissioners noted that present manpower of Sheriff L. E. (Lefty) Sublett could be used more in law enforcement duties, by allowing constables to serve court papers, fill in as bailiffs for court sessions, and make some out-of-county trips (such as returning prisoners or transporting patients to state hospitals.)

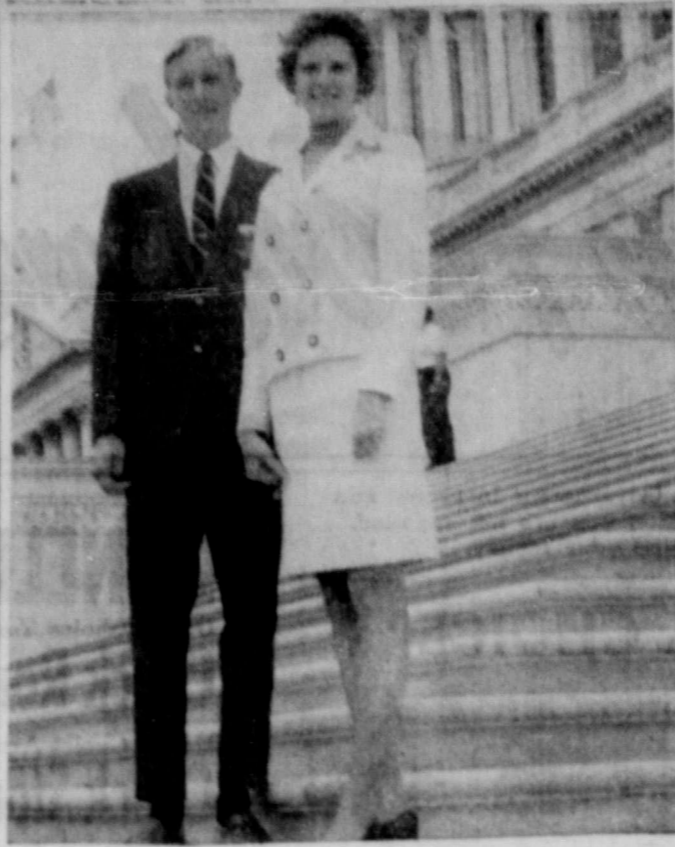

Vacation Safety Quiz Covers Multitude Driving Emergencies

Suppose during your vacation trip an oncoming car veers into your lane and hurls toward you. Which two of the following four actions do you take?

1. Blow the horn.
2. Apply the brakes.
3. Steer as far right as you can.
4. Switch to the lane the other car should be in.

In all but the rarest circumstances, moves 1 and 3 are

other driver up, and a right steer is more likely to provide escape than braking or turning into the oncoming traffic lane.

If you haven't tested your safety sagacity lately, maybe you should tune up for holiday driving with these additional questions:

True-False
1. In case of a blow out, take

your foot off the accelerator immediately, then pump the brakes.

False. Ease up on the gas gradually, not abruptly. Wait until the car slows naturally before braking gently.

2. If your car, heavily loaded for a trip, seems easier to steer than usual, your tires need more air.

False. You should move some of the heavier items farther forward.

3. It is sometimes better to steer toward an object in the road instead of trying to miss it.

True. If your choice in an emergency is between hitting a moving vehicle or a minor obstruction in the road such as a rock or animal, choose the latter. If the object is small enough, straddle it rather than

swerving to avoid it.

4. A light rain is often more dangerous to drivers than a heavy rain.

True. A light shower makes highways slicker than a heavy rain because road oil and grease "float" on the surface of the moisture. A downpour washes them away.

5. On turnpikes, rear-end collisions are the most frequent type of accident.

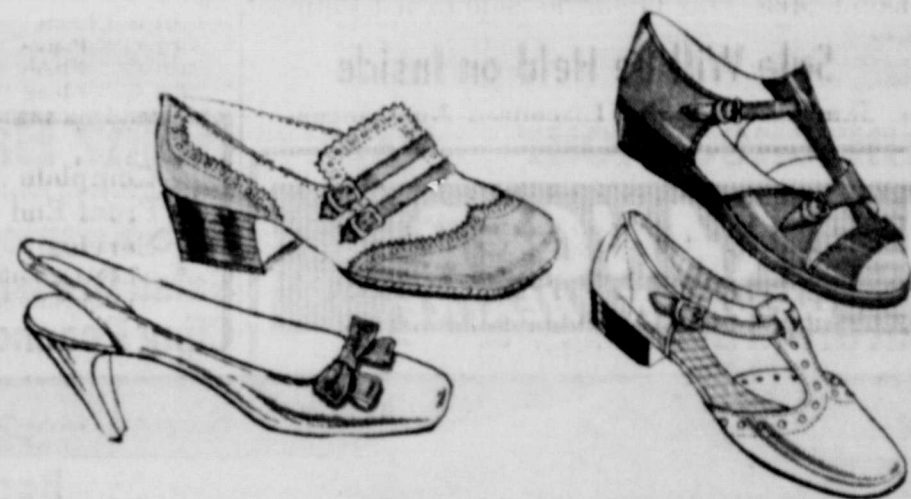

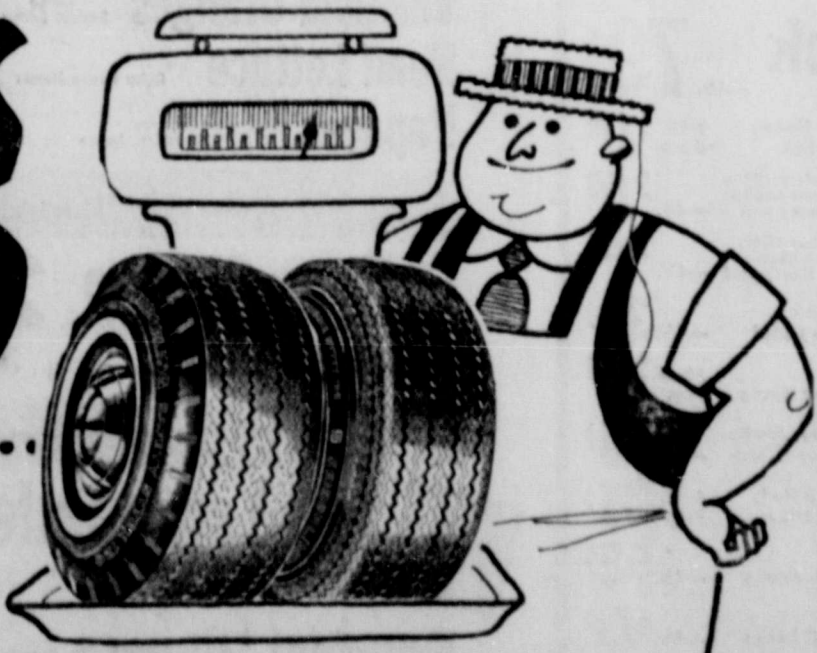

Eastland Is 1 of 30 Counties In Industrial Study Program

Eastland is one of 30 areas of the state to be involved in an intensive three-year study of the structure of the economy.

Hardin-Simmons University's Bureau of Economics and Business Research will begin conducting interviews with selected firms at communities in Eastland County between

now and next fall. "The study is an Input-Output analysis," said Dr. Jim Vinson, head of the H-SU bureau. "It is a technical analysis of the interrelationships between industries. It is a statewide accounting system which will illustrate the sources of supplies of Texas industries, as well as the total market."

The project is being conducted through the Division of Planning Coordination of the Governor's Office. Counties involved in the

Early Filing, Proofs Will Speed SS Pay

"When will I get my first check?"

University of Texas, Texas Tech, Texas A&M, the University of Houston, the University of Texas at El Paso, University of Texas at Arlington, and Pan American University.

That question is high in the mind of each applicant for social security retirement, survivors, or disability insurance payments, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager.

New claims for cash payments have averaged about 100 a week in this area since the first of the year, he said. However, the time between filing an application and getting the first check varies from a few days to a few months.

"A worker who is planning his retirement should

make his claim two or three months before he retires," Tuley continued. "Everyone should always make his application in advance of reaching age 65 to avoid the loss of any Medicare benefits, whether he's retiring or not."

"Also, an applicant can save time by furnishing exact information at the time of

file," he explained. "For example, the applicant who brings proof of his date of birth and a copy of last year's income tax return, or Form W-2 (Statement of wages, and Taxes), will speed final action."

Tuley summed up with this admonition: "Help us to help you by making advance preparation. For further details, see a social security representative in Abilene or check his travel schedule to your area at your post office."
