Bulldogs Whitewash Dublin 34-0 Friday Night to Close Grid Season

Friday night the Ranger Bulldogs put together 156 yards rushing and completed six passes for 138 yards to whitewash the Dublin Lions 34 to 0 in the final football game of the 1969 season in Bulldog Stadium.

Ranger received the opening kickoff on their own 35 yard line only to strike about three yards in three plays before they punted to the Lions.

From the way the first series of downs for both teams it looked as though the Bulldogs would really have to play ball to stay with the Lions. After the Lions could not move the ball and punted the Bulldogs took possession of the ball with a first and ten from their own 39 yard line.

It took the Bulldogs only five plays to get their first touchdown of the evening as Quarterback Raymond Jimenez gave the ball to Robert Garcia as he ran around the left side of the line for 32 yards and a score. Jimenez kicked the extra point to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 lead early in the first quarter.

The Bulldog defense again held the Lion offense after the TD kickoff and took possession of the ball on their own 49 yard line. Jimenez mixed his play calling with Mike DeLos Santos, Roger Rutledge, Tom Fox and a 15 yard pass completion to set the Bulldogs up for another touchdown.

A 22 yd. pass from Jimenez to end Richard Williams was complete to put the Bulldogs ahead 13 to 0. Jimenez kicked the extra point.

Early in the second stanza of play the Bulldogs tallied again on a 33 yard pass from Jimenez to end Larry Williamson. Again the extra point conversion by Jimenez was good.

It was on the next series of downs for the Bulldogs that Tailback Tom Fox, III got the necessary yardage he had been working so hard to get to give him 4,000 yards rushing in his high school career. Before the game started Fox needed only 34 yards to hit this all-time record. He carried the ball six times in the first half of play for a total of 26 yards. Fox received an injury in the Glen Rose game last week and was unable to start Friday night. Also for Fox, before the game Friday night he had a total of 380 points for his career.

The Bulldogs started on the Dublin 44 yard line as Garcia, Tom Fox and Mike DeLos Santos picked up 24 yards to set the Bulldogs up in scoring position.

A 24 yard pass from Jimenez to Garcia set the Bulldogs up on the five yard line as DeLos Santos ran the ball over for the score. Again the extra point conversion by Jimenez was good to put the Bulldogs ahead 28-0.

Midway in the final quarter the Bulldogs took control of the ball and at this time Tom Fox got another touchdown to put his scoring record up to 386 points for his high school career. The Bulldogs moved the ball over, under, around, and through the Dublin defense to put the ball on the five yard line with a first and goal to go. It took three plays, with two of the plays being incomplete passes, for Fox to drive over for the score. The extra point try failed.

Then the show started. The Bulldog tackles and guards told Coach Charlie Smith, "Look man, this is our last game of the season and we have done a good job in the Bulldog line, so why not let us carry the ball this time?" Coach Smith gave his consent after some thought and sent Tom Fox in to do the quarterbacking. big 235 pounder Dennis Kennedy, 188 pounder Gene Bilby took the ball and really did some fancy foot work but being good linemen that they are, they found out that the backfield was not their game.

So now the Football Season of 1969 is over. The Ranger High School Bulldogs are to be congratulated for the fine sportsmanship they have shown this season.

Mrs. Don Allen and family.

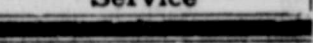
