\$2,785 In Merchandise Taken In Montgomery Ward Burglary

The Montgomery Ward store in Ranger was burglarized sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning, according to a report by the Ranger Police Department.

Manager of the store, George Kloss, stated that \$2,785.97 in merchandise and firearms were taken in the burglary.

Eastland County Sheriff Lefty Sublett stated that he received a call at about 7:45 a.m. Tuesday that the store

had been broken into. It was reported by the sheriff that the burglar, or burglars, entered through a window on the west side of the building.

Takers in the burglary was three transistor radios, portable TV, portable record player, two large size windshirts, four pairs of gloves, eight small and medium sizes of briefs, 83 pairs of socks, six sweaters, ten shirts, and nine large size shorts. Timex watches, and polaroid cameras.

Also taken in the burglary were 23 shotguns and rifles valued at \$1,568.

No lead to the burglary has been reached according to Sheriff Sublett. The Ranger Police Department is working with the Eastland County Sheriff's Department on the burglary.

Although the defense came through with a commendable performance, allowing only one sustained scoring drive (the other three Cisco TD's were a result of two long passes and one punt return), the offense was unable to find the goal line again.

The Ranger offensive efforts were brightened only by outstanding performances on the part of two or three people. Gerald Tate caught David Barr's 22 completed passes for 119 yards, and Jerry Smith produced 85 yards on the ground in 14 carries.

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



Stockmen and farmers were greatly concerned, all over west Texas, over weather conditions in 1934. There had been signs of rain over and over, but no rain came to break the drought over that area.

Ranchers and others who took pride in being able to forecast the weather in the past said, "The signs are simply failing to run true this year." Among signs the old timers had faith in and vowed had never failed ran like this, "To hear a rain crow cooing was a sure sign of rain. If metal plates and dishes sweated, look out for rain soon. Fog in the morning always brought rain. A steady southeast wind will bring rain in 36 hours. If stars are dim there will be rain immediately. Strong perfume from flowers indicate rain. If the sun goes down back of a cloud on Wednesday it will rain before Sunday." There are dozens of other signs of rain too numerous to enumerate, but none came true in 1934.

When income tax return blanks were first being issued no one understood what it was all about, the story of a small town business man who returned his income tax forms to the treasury department with the following letter must have caused a stir in the Internal Revenue Department. Years ago Leopold Schepp, a millionaire, he left most of his fortune to be devoted to American boys and administered in such a manner as to do the boys the most good. 

CROP REPORTS NEEDED FROM FARMERS - During the last half of October some 35,000 farmers received crop questionnaires from Cary Palmer of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Accurate estimates are of great importance to producers for providing an accurate picture of Texas agriculture. Each farmer receiving a questionnaire is urged to fill it out carefully and return it promptly to the Agriculture Statistician.

PEANUT, COTTON, FEED GRAIN - We are in the process of completing 1970 peanut allotments, cotton allotments and yields and feed grain bases and yields. Details of each of the programs for 1970 will be announced as they are received. The final date for filing applications for the transfer of 1970 cotton allotments is December 31, 1969. Watch the mail for your notices of allotments, yields and program details.

DIVERTED ACRES USE CHANGE - There is a major change in eligible crops for 1970 on diverted acres. The planting of sweet or forage sorghums WILL NOT be authorized on diverted acreage beginning with the 1970 sign-up program.

FOREIGN JOB OPPORTUNITIES

Work this summer in the forest to Germany, on construction in Austria, on farms in Germany, Sweden and Denmark, on road construction in Norway, in industries in France and Germany, in hotels in Switzerland.

Well, there are these jobs available as well as jobs in Ireland, England, France, and Holland. These jobs are open by the consent of the government of these countries to American university students coming to Europe the next summer.

Every year the program has been expanded to include many more students and jobs. Also, many students have made application for next summer jobs. American-European Student service (on a non-profitable basis) is offering these jobs to students for Germany, Scandinavia, England, Austria, Switzerland, France, Italy, and Spain. These jobs consist of forestry work, child care work (females only), farm work, hotel work (limited number available), construction work, and some other more qualified jobs requiring specialized training.

The purpose of this program is to afford the students an opportunity to get into real living contact with the people and customs of Europe. In this way, a concrete effort can be made to learn something of the culture of Europe. In return for his or her work, the student will receive his or her room and board, plus a wage. However, students should keep in mind that they will be working on the European economy, and wages will naturally be scaled accordingly. The working conditions-hours, safety, regulations, legal protection, and work permits will be strictly controlled by the labor ministries of the countries involved.

In most cases, the employers have requested especially for American students. Hence, they are particularly interested in the student and want to make the work as interesting as possible. They are all informed of the intent of the program and will help the student all they can in deriving the most from his trip to Europe.
