STATES AND FLOWERS

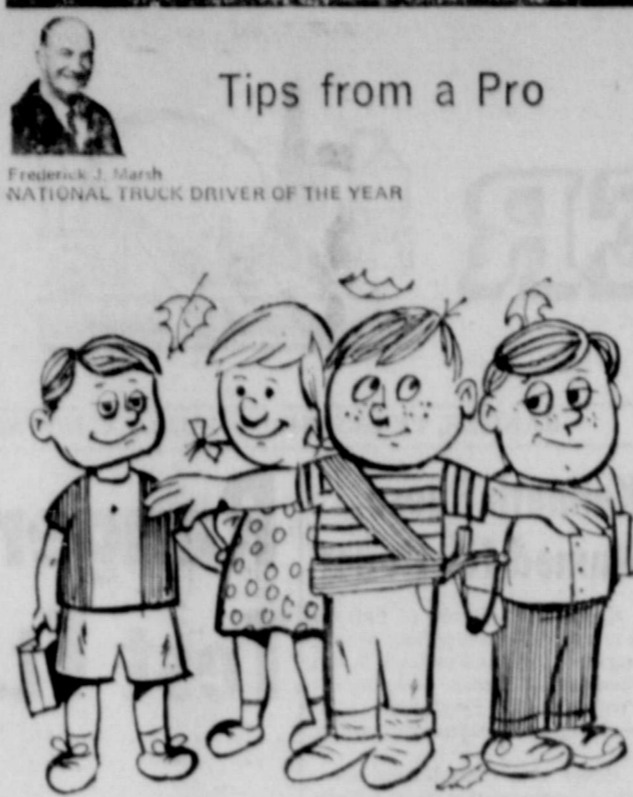
Do you know what flower is your official state flower? In almost every state, legislation has been passed approving a state flower.

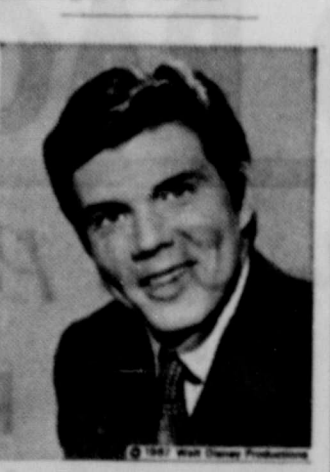
