**Organization Helps Prevent Mouth Disease**

HOUSTON, Texas, May 5—Announcement of a new organization to help prevent mouth disease by spreading information to local dentists and through them to the public has been made at the University of Texas School of Dentistry by vice-president and dean, Dr. Frederick C. Elliott.

The organization will be composed of the Dental School's faculty members, lay representatives and dentists chosen from local districts throughout the state. Objective of the group is to spread information to local dentists and through them to the public regarding reliable methods for control of dental decay and periodontal disease (pyorrhea), for prevention of mouth tumors and for prevention and treatment of all mouth diseases that effect the general health and well-being of the people.

The Dental School will provide each district dental society with a list of speakers who will discuss various phases of the preventive program. Lay and dental leaders will also be brought to the Dental School for short courses, and information will be made available to lay groups in each district.

**Local State Land For Sale**

AUSTIN, May—State Land Commissioner, Bascom Giles, states there is still public land for sale in Texas.

However, not much of it, as Texans measure land. Less than one per cent of the once colossal public domain is available to high bidders as the unsold acreage has dwindled to a total of 1,025,875.70 acres. (The total acreage of the state is 172,687,000.)

The unsold land includes 94 acres in Castro County.

Not all of the million acres can be purchased, Giles explains. The domain is administered by the School Land Board, of which Giles is chairman.

"No school lands within five miles of oil or gas production can be sold," Giles points out. When there is sufficient de-

mand, the School Land Board authorizes the sale of specified tracts. A public sale as advertised and information about the tracts supplied by the General Land Office upon request.

Sale is by sealed bids. The high bidder, if conforming with all regulations, is the new owner.

The terms are 20 per cent down with 40 years to retire the balance at five per cent interest. The Permanent School Fund retains one-sixteenth free royalty in all oil production and one-eighth free royalty in sulphur production.

**Grasshopper Control Needed**

Texas farmers are being warned that they can expect one of the most serious invasions of grasshoppers in history this year. Only the cool weather in April has slowed the invasion, as hoppers need warm days to hatch.

Grasshopper control couldn't be too difficult this year as the result of new insecticides which are available in sufficient amounts to battle the insects.

There's been a change in grasshopper control tactics in the state this year. The practice of wholesale distribution of poison bait for the hoppers has been stopped.

New poisons brought that about reported R. L. King, County

Agent. Insecticides recommended for control are toxaphene and chlordane.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture recommends 1.5 pounds of toxaphene per acre when applied as a spray or two pounds of toxaphene per acre when applied as a dust.

One pound of chlordane per acre is recommended.

Chlordane and toxaphene applied as sprays give higher initial kill and continue to kill over a longer period of time than the same dosage of dusts.

The Department of Agriculture's new grasshopper control publication says these two insecticides give better control and longer control than the old bait method.

When using a dust, one and one-half pounds of chlordane or two pounds of toxaphene per acre is recommended.

These dosages have given good initial kills and have lasted on plants from one to three weeks under a wide variety of conditions.

These dosages of these two chemicals are recommended for general use by farmers. Slightly lower dosages can be used against newly hatched grasshoppers but if some eggs are still unhatched and long continued killing action is desired, the dosage should be made of the recommended strength.

A slight increase in the strength of both dust and spray may be necessary late in the season when the grasshoppers are maturing.

Mr. King, points out that even these new insecticides, strong as they may be, can't do the job unless they are applied properly and at the right time.

They may be used in ground dusters or sprayers of various types or from airplanes. However the equipment used should be accurately adjusted so that rate of application can be controlled.

Too much of the materials, besides being wasteful, increases the danger of residue. And too little insecticide is also wasteful because it will not prevent damage.

King warned farmers planning to use chlordane or toxaphene to use proper precautions in handling and using them. Like most insecticides, they are poisonous to man and beast.

The farmer using the insecticides should determine the location of dangerous infestations of grasshoppers near crops which could be damaged.

Hoppers can be found on roadsides, creek banks, field margins or idle land bordering cultivated fields.

Spray or dust these infestations when the main hatch is completed, which should be within the next ten days, or when the young hoppers start moving off the hatching grounds.

King said grasshoppers which damage row crops usually hatch in the field margins. Timely spraying or dusting will destroy them before they move in on cultivated fields.

A word of caution to farmers who have legume planted and who plan to use these insecticides on cotton or other crops was sounded.

Bees are necessary in fertilizing legumes. Chlordane and toxaphene kill bees. So use these sprays or dust early in the morning before bees are working or the bee crop will suffer.

A bad grasshopper infestation can do tremendous damage.

But the entomologist say there's no reason to suffer this damage this year since these poisons can be used safely and efficiently for control.

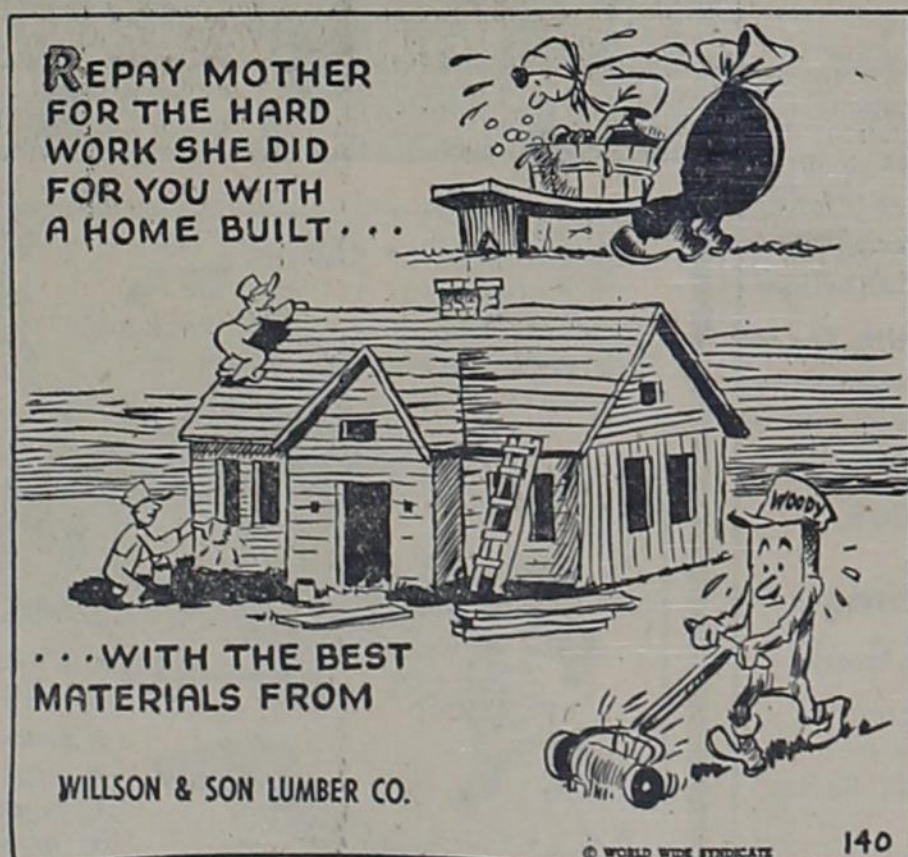
