



### NOW ONLY AWAITING J. P. MORGAN'S RETURN

MANAGEMENT OF NEW STEAM. SHIP COMBINATION BEING ARRANGED

New York, Aug. 14.-With the arrival bere next week from Europe of J. P. Morgan and President Griscom of the International Navigation company, broker and general commission dealer, conferences are expected to begin to 107 East Seventh street, Fort Worth, arrange the details of management for Texas. the new steamship combination as far as this side is concerned, the details abroad being virtually completed.

The present plan, it is understood, is to operate the separate lines as at present until Mr. Morgan and his associates secure out and out control of the properties.

In England the head office will be in London. It is understood that the Right Hon, W. J. Pierrie will be chairman of the British central board. After Jan. 1, it is the present intention, according to a reliable source of information, to abolish the separate boards and to manage the entire British business of all the lines through the executive officers under the direction of the central board.

It is expected that the British arrangement will be duplicated to a very large extent on this side with Mr. Griscom as chairman of the central board. Spirit of Unrest.

New York, Aug. 14.-The resignation of the Duke of Devonshire from the council has not yet been announced but is expected with confidence by well informed politicians before October, says the London correspondent of the Tribune.

New York, Aug. 14.—Inquiries have been made by the Tribune as to the stock of Anthracite coal on hand at several cities in the east with the following result:

New York city dealers say the supply here has been practically exhausted for weeks. The railroad companies have been able to deliver only a few thousand tons a day recently, and much of it is known as washed coal. Retail price of coal in Jersey City is \$9 a ton, delivered or \$8 at the yards and orders are taken only conditionally. The dealers have agents out purchasing wherever they can find coal.

The following simplified method for the restoration of drowning persons and of those who have lost consciousness through asphyxia or any other cause was developed by Dr. J. V. La-Paris. It has proved efficacious in many cases. In one cited, of a child who had been submerged for nearly fifteen minutes, the return of breathing was accomplished in ten minutes. 1. As soon as the drowning man open his mouth. If the teeth are clinched, separate them with the fingers or by means of any hard object-The following report of the live e. g., a piece of wood, the end of a cane, the handle of a knife, of a spoon or of a fork.

2. Firmly seize between the thumb and the first finger of the right hand the end of the tongue, using your handkerchief or any piece of linen to prevent the tongue from slipping; then repeatedly, rhythmically and with decision pull it from the mouth and relax it alternately, at the rate of at least twenty times a minute, imitating the cadenced movements of expiration and inspiration.

3. At the same time introduce far back into the throat the first finger of the left hand, pressing upon the base of the tongue, so as to induce vomiting, and thus free the stomach of the water or food which incumbers it.

4. This treatment, the most efficacious known method of bringing back the respiration, must be begun without the slightest delay and persistently continued for a half hour, an bour or more. At the same time all the usual remedies must be applied. Most important are the removal of the clothing, friction over the whole body, pressure upon the anterior part of the chest, the restoration of the bodily heat and, where it is possible, the application upon the region of the heart of compresses of very hot water. The same method may and should be applied, in the same manner, in all cases of asphyxia and of syncope (loss

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
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

What is regarded as an achievement of the twentieth century has been reported in the reduction works of the Lake Superior Power company of Sault Ste. Marie. It is the manufacture of sulphurous gas-which is taken from nickel ore-into liquid or sulphuric acid. This has never before been done in commercial quantities. The product also is of a quality much superior to that made in the ordinary way, being marketable at \$100 per ton, while the other is worth only \$30.

The process by which it is made is one of compression and expansion, an Invention of E. A. Sjostedt, the chief metallurgist of the company, and he has been working on it ever since the reduction works were first built.

Thirty tons of the liquid were made, it is said, in one day. When the same company found a process by which the sulphur separated from the nickel ore | tric light. could be saved, it solved the problem which had long baffled the leading scientists of the world, and the Soo plant is now the only one in the world where that natural product is not wasted in separation.

The gas taken from nickel in the roasting furnaces is used in the sulphite mill, where, with steam, it is turned into the digesters and used in "cooking" the pulp chips in the manufacture of sulphite pulp.

Scientists are interested in a German expedition which is on its way to Africa. The party has set out on a search for a mammoth bird which, it is rumored, may be in existence in the heart of Madagascar. Epyornis is the name which has been given the creature, from the Greek "atpys," tall, and "ornis," bird. It is believed that the creature approaches in size the great prehistoric birds, and yet it is believed to have lived in large numbers within fairly recent times on the island of Madagascar.




