### Zogi The Magician Booked For Dimmitt Appearance Oct. 21

C. A. Frank, tour director of the Zogi TV Variety Revue playing at Dimmitt High School Auditorium on Thursday, October 21, at 8 p.m. under the sponsorship of the Dimmitt Lions Club says there is one question asked him quite frequently and worded like this: "If the Zogi Revue is such a big and lavish production, why is it playing such a small city as this, and similar ones?"

That is a good question, says Mr. Frank, and this is the way he answers it. During the past ten years, says Frank, thousands of theatres closed their doors due to the inroads of TV. The remaining theatres that have not been torn down and are still in operation, have been altered, especially on the stage, to take care of the demands of a wide screen and super sound. In most cases these new installations are permanent and not mobile, and allow no room for stage shows of any size. In many cases, dressing rooms are now used for storage of supplies and equipment. There are still some theatres in large cities suitable for large productions such as the Zogi Revue, but special permits to transport and unload equipment at their stage doors must be obtained from the city and transfer companies hired to bring the tons of equipment through the downtown city streets during the small hours of the morning, due to the ever-growing traffic problems. This has practically forced the few remaining road shows of any size to play the smaller cities and to play in civic centers and high school auditoriums, and in fact, most any place that will hold a large audience.

In spite of the fact that much special equipment must be carried to transform these auditorium stages into suitable areas for performing such an elaborate show, Mr. Frank feels that it is all worth while, since the show attracts large crowds at every performance, and the audiences get to see and hear a big city show. "That's show business", says Frank.



### Social Security Meeting Planned Tonight At 7:30

Second public meeting concerning new changes in Social Security law will be held at 7:30 p.m. tonight in the basement of Castro County courthouse. Dimmitt Lions Club are sponsoring the informational program.

Hal Geldon, District Manager of the Amarillo District office, says, "We realize there is intense interest in the 1965 Social Security Amendments and that many people did not have an opportunity to attend the first meeting."

The meeting will be open to all citizens of Dimmitt and the surrounding areas. Geldon pointed out that the regular visits to the community meeting is in addition to the regular visits to the Community by the social security representative. He suggests that persons wanting general information about the new Social Security Law attend this meeting rather than visit the social security representative during the day.

By attending this meeting, the person will avoid having to take time off from work and also having to wait an undue length of time to get the information from the social security representative during the day, Geldon stated.

According to information received Wednesday by Postmaster Ernest Davis, from J. Allen Dupree, Assistant to Regional Director, the Post Office Department is seeking competitive bids to build and lease the new post office building at Dimmitt.

The purpose of competitive bidding is to encourage the most attractive and economical offer to

the Government in line with President Johnson's economy program to achieve the best possible postal service at the least possible cost.

Under the Department's Lease Construction Program, the site selected at the northeast corner of the East Second Street and Belcher Street intersection will be assigned to the successful bidder, who will purchase the property, construct the building according to departmental specifications and lease it to the Post Office Department for a basic period of ten years, with options to renew the lease for an additional twenty years.

The Department's capital investment will be limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership with the owner paying the local real estate taxes.

Bidding documents will be available on or about October 20, 1965, and may be obtained from V. E. Bell, Real Estate Officer, P. O. Box 1386, Lubbock, Texas 79408. Mr. Bell will supply bidding forms, building specifications, lease provisions and other information.

Bids must be submitted to the Real Estate Officer before December 3, 1965.

### Dimmitt Schools Offer Adult Education Course

Dimmitt Schools have received approval from Texas Education Agency to operate an adult education program for this school term announces Paul Hilburn, superintendent of schools.

Program will operate for 24 weeks — 5 hours per week. Classes will be held two nights each week, 2½ hours each night. Plans are underway for classes to begin October 18. Classes will be at Junior High building. This program will operate on four levels and give adults an opportunity to receive a certificate of equivalency to high school diploma.

A meeting will be held in the new lunchroom of South Grade School, Monday, October 18 at 7:30 p.m. for all those interested in enrolling in adult education program.

Level I includes classes in reading, writing and arithmetic on level for those people who had less than three years of formal education.

Level II will include reading, health and nutrition on basis for those who have completed less than 6th grade education. Level III will include same courses as Level II but will be for those who have completed up to 8th grade education.

Level IV will be for those students who did not complete high school education. Classes will be offered in typing, English, math, etc.

Tuition, books and supplies will be furnished free of charge for the first three levels. Level IV will be on a tuition basis plus books and supplies. This level will operate for two hours, two nights a week for 12 weeks to make an equivalent of one semester. Last 12 weeks will be second semester. Classes will be offered in any high school courses where there is an enrollment of 10 or more students. Tuitions for these high school courses will be \$25 per semester or ½ unit.

### Adult Modern Math Course To Be Taught

An adult modern math course will start Monday, October 18 at 7:30 p.m. in Room 6 of the Junior High School building. Class will be taught by Mrs. Jim Hamilton and will continue for 14 weeks. This is an informal class and no exams will be given to students. The school will lend the books to those participating in the course.

### Dimmitt Schools Receive New Federal Allotment Under Act

Dimmitt Schools again were among the first schools in the state to prepare and submit to Texas Education Agency a proposal for allotment of funds under the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965.

Dimmitt Schools were allotted 366 educationally deprived students under this act. This was based on 1960 federal census which at that time showed Dimmitt to have 27 percent of students who are educationally deprived children.

An educationally deprived child as defined under this act is a child that is operating one or two years below his chronological age.

A survey was taken last week to identify the number of these children now attending Dimmitt Public Schools. The results of this survey follows:

There are 667 educationally deprived children in the Dimmitt Independent School District. Eighty-six percent or 580 of the children are reading one or more grades below grade level based on standardized tests.

Seventy-six percent or 507 of educationally deprived children have difficulty because of two languages spoken in home and at school.

Forty-five percent or 303 of the children are urban and have difficulties getting to school in bad weather.

Seventy-one percent or 476 are from homes that have inadequate housing.

Twenty-eight percent or 191 were absent two weeks or more during last school year.

Some students are absent as many as 66 to 74 days in one year. Dimmitt schools have one 14 year-old boy in the second grade and many migrants' children who have not attended school for as much as 1½ years.

Sixty-five percent or 438 of educationally deprived children have repeated a grade one or more times.

Six percent or 41 have physical handicaps.

Eighty-seven percent or 581 have little or no reading materials in the home.

Fifty-eight percent or 381 of educationally deprived children live in homes that are overcrowded and have inadequate study facilities.

As a result of this survey and school proposal, Dimmitt schools have been allotted \$71,366.34 under Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965. Dimmitt Schools have also been allotted \$3,826.65 under Title II of this act.

These funds are to be used to correct the deficiencies in educationally deprived children.

As result of these allotted monies, Dimmitt Schools plan to add a library and librarian to South Grade School, employ school nurse to serve the two grade schools, and employ seven additional teachers to work toward improvement of the reading and language program.

Part of the money will be spent for materials and equipment for above programs including setting up complete library facilities at South Grade School.

According to Paul Hilburn, 54 percent of the first grade students are Latin Americans. Allotment was determined by multiplying the number of child assigned to school district by \$194.99.

City bond election calling for \$100,000 recreation facilities went down in defeat Tuesday by a narrow margin in a record turnout of city voters.

A widely-discussed issue, the bond election drew a total of 584 voters. There were only 500 ballots printed and in the afternoon of heavy voting, more ballots had to be printed to accommodate the voters.

There were 317 votes against and 267 for the recreational facilities. A margin of 50 votes defeated the issue.

The Recreation Center proposal called for a nine-hole golf course, and regulation size Little League and Pony League baseball parks.

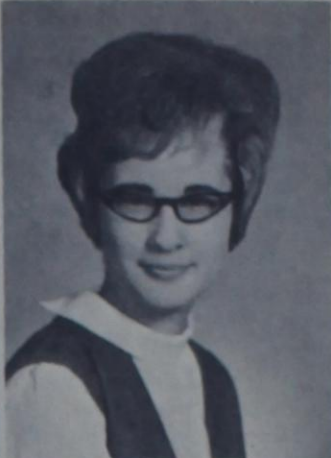

In the truck was a case of dynamite, containing about 20 sticks and a box of 20 electrical blast ring caps. The explosives were picked up by highway patrolmen and taken to Dalhart where they were buried in an isolated field.

A two-man ordnance detachment from Amarillo Air Force Base was called to service and arrived in Dalhart shortly before midnight. The blasting caps were brought into Amarillo and harmlessly detonated on the air base firing range Saturday. The dynamite was thrown into Rita Blanca Lake near Dalhart.

Funeral services for Mrs. Sanford were held in Clovis, N. M. under the direction of Sherwood Mortuary. The body was taken to Douglas, Wyoming for another funeral service and burial.

Cost per serving is the most realistic guide to economy when buying meat. Beef cuts vary in the amount of bone, fat and other waste; these factors will in turn affect the amount of servings per pound of beef.

Cuts such as the blade or round bone chuck, the rump, heel of the sirloin and the bottom round steak are less-tender cuts of beef and usually cost less than tender steaks and rib roasts. The less-tender cuts also vary in amount of waste and cost per serving. Those carrying the cheapest price tags are not always the most economical.

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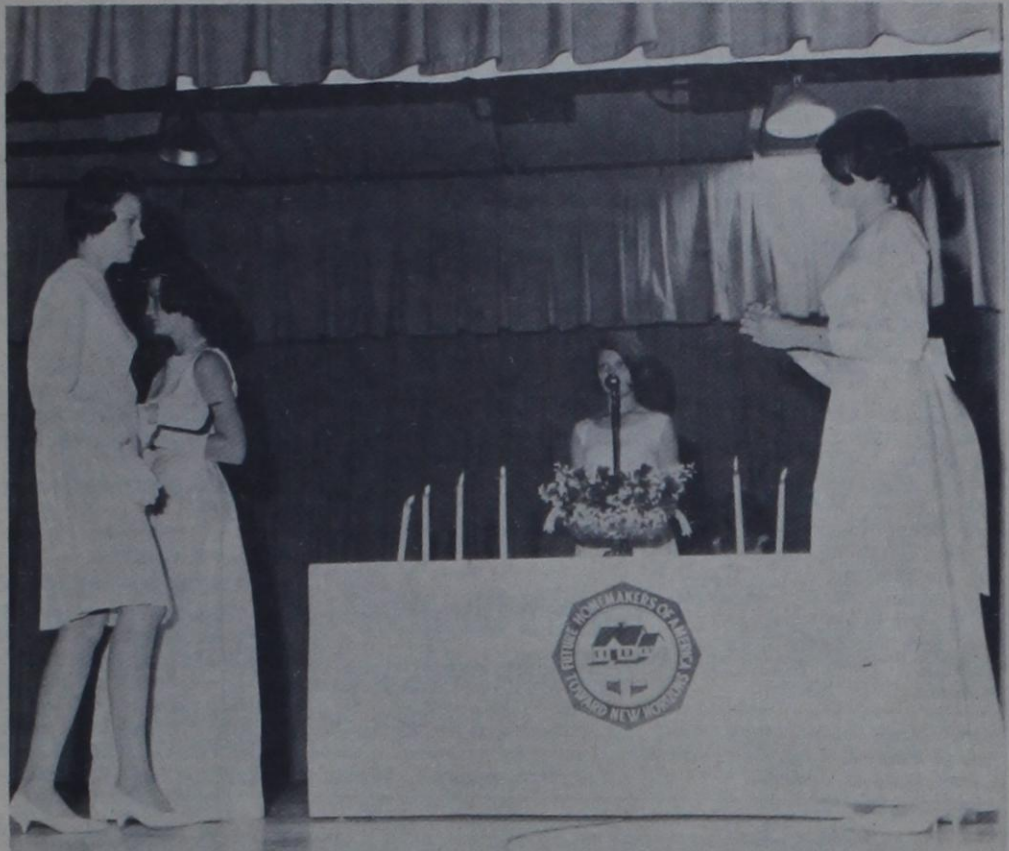

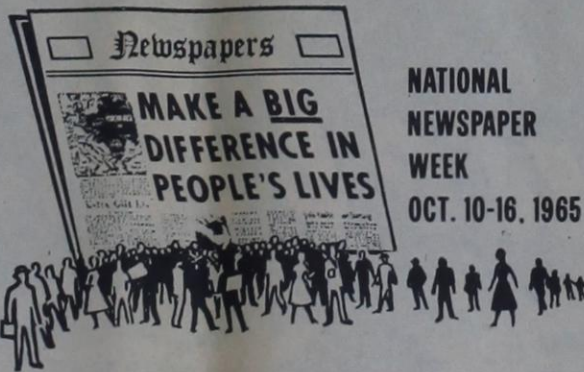

Accent on Health

J.E. PEAVY, M.D. Commissioner of Health Do you enjoy sitting down to a tender juicy T-bone steak? Most of us do and most of us eat our meat feeling secure that its quality is good, and that someone is looking out for our safety and good health. This is true, two divisions of the Texas State Department of Health are directly concerned with the meat you eat — the Food and Drugs Division and the Veterinary Public Health Division. For example, butcher shops and meat-cutting tables are checked by investigators for evidence of meat-borne diseases. This falls under the routine duties of a score of Texas' food and drug inspectors. The Veterinary Public Health experts' work begins while the animal is on foot and leaves off where the food and drug personnel take over. Not only does the staff maintain a surveillance program of zoonoses — diseases of animals transmissible to man, — but it goes a step further. At present 207 establishments participate in the State's inspection program. Of these, 164 use the square stamp, and 43 use the State of Texas outline stamp. Not only has the meat that bears one of these legends been inspected for wholesomeness, but

likely to have accidents. They those who are daring active and apt to move quickly. They are often poorly coordinated and try to do things they are not yet capable of, says Mrs. Yates. Equipment is seldom dangerous — in itself — in a supervised situation. It's the way children use it that makes it hazardous. For example the child who uses a broom for a gun instead of to sweep with, the boy who prefers to stand on his chair rather than sit on it or the child who jumps on a jumping board while others are using it — are the children most likely to have accidents. A pre-school teacher who knows the children in her group can generally pick out the ones most

the conditions under which the meat was processed were carefully observed for proper formulation and sanitation. If the meat you eat has passed inspection it will bear one of three stamps. The stamp will be square, indicating state approved municipal inspection; or an outline of Texas, showing State or Federal inspection. Of course the two-by-two inch square stamp can't be shown on every piece of meat or on hamburger, but your meat-market man can tell you whether the meat was inspected or not. But you as an individual, have a responsibility, too. Yours is to look for the stamp on the meat certifying wholesomeness and ask your butcher about it, too. Make it a point to check the quality of the meat you eat — help the many public health workers who are trying to protect and promote your health.

Home Economic Briefs

A good breakfast will help a dieting teen remain healthy and still lose weight. Miss Louise Mason Texas A&M University Extension foods and nutrition specialist, stresses the advantages of starting the day right. Recent breakfast studies show that a skipped breakfast only accentuates teen-agers' hunger, causing overeating at later meals. A good breakfast will help eliminate the urge to nibble between meals Miss Mason adds. Eliminating potential poisons in the home will help prevent a needless tragedy, says Mrs. Patsy Reynolds Yates. The Texas A&M University Extension family life education specialist emphasizes the danger to young children if household poisons such as insecticides, bleaches and cleaning agents are left within reach. Young children curious and prone to explore, will put anything in their mouths. Aspirin a common household medicine, was the leading offender in a 1961 study of child poisoning.

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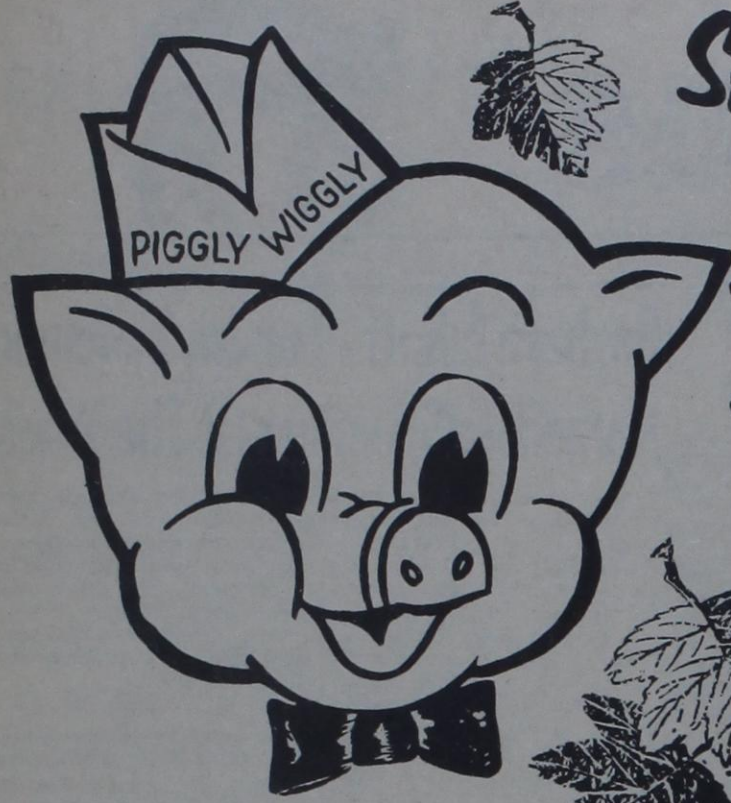

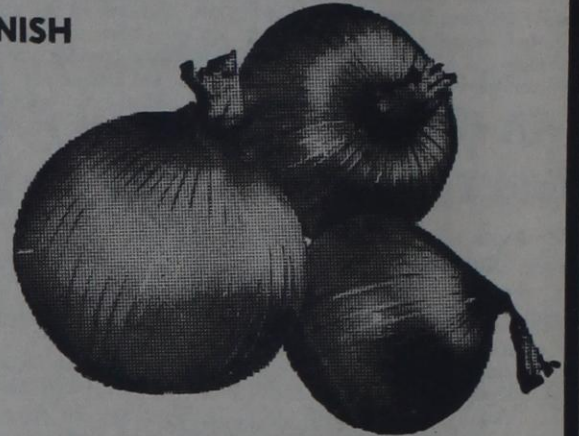

Two new developments by scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, flame-resistant cotton fabric and fire-retardant paint may prevent many fire-caused tragedies.

Last year, fires in homes caused 6,300 deaths. About 2,000 of these people died when their clothing caught fire.

Already on the market are cotton sheets, curtains, and work clothes that are flame-resistant. Most ordinary articles of clothing for the family can be made of flame-resistant cotton. They will cost more than untreated clothing, but the protection provided will be invaluable — especially for children.

A fire-retardant paint can be the difference between a small fire easily put out and one spreading rapidly through a house. USDA has developed a paint that can be applied with either brush or roller, like an ordinary paint.

When exposed to flame, it develops a thick, carbon-containing layer that acts as an insulating barrier. First developed for outside use, it is now being tested by paint companies for interior use.

You can help your children do better in studies and school games. Back your children up with a good nutritious breakfast every day, and you'll be starting them off right in the morning and encouraging them to develop a habit valuable to them all their lives.

Good breakfasts don't just happen. If breakfast is a problem at your home, try to solve it by careful planning.

If family members eat at different times, or if a child must be left to eat alone, keep ready-to-eat foods handy or provide foods that take little preparation. Include plenty of fruit, juices and ready-to-eat cereals in your food eggs and fix bacon to leave for

the latecomers. Every minute counts for mothers who work. Prepare frozen or fresh fruit juice the night before. Chill canned juice overnight. Buy pre-cooked sausage or ham. They'll take only minutes to heat through for serving. Serve cold sliced meat or cheese as an alternate for eggs.

Devise a menu that appeals to children, if they aren't interested in breakfast. Try mixing fruits, such as berries and sliced peaches, for a tempting flavor change. Have a variety of fruits on hand, and let the youngsters choose a favorite to go with their cereal.

Breakfast can be brighter for everyone if you can plan and serve food that everyone likes.

In this 20 months, the first family, by continuing to save at the same rate as the installment payments, could accumulate cash enough to buy another major item, such as a TV set or room air conditioner.

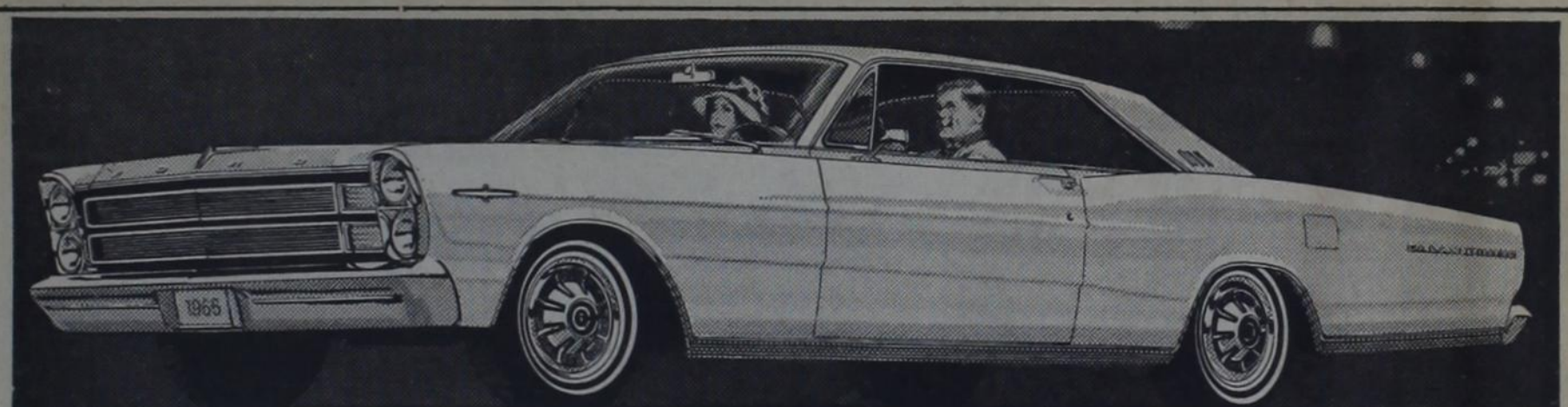

## Gary Calhoun Serves Aboard USS Coral Sea

USS CORAL SEA (CVA-43) (FH-TN) Sept. 29 - Fireman Apprentice Gary L. Calhoun, USN, son of Mrs. Bob Slay of 304 NW 4th St., Dimmitt is serving with the Seventh Fleet in the South China Sea aboard the attack aircraft carrier USS Coral Sea.

Coral Sea has been operating longer than any combatant ship currently deployed with the Seventh Fleet and has engaged in nearly all naval air support and strike missions in Viet Nam since the first retaliatory strike over North Viet Nam in February against the Don Hoi military supply depot.

Since then, Coral Sea has operated almost continuously at sea. On Sept. 23, Coral Sea logged her 149,000th arrested landing since commissioning - more landings than any other aircraft carrier in the U. S. Navy.

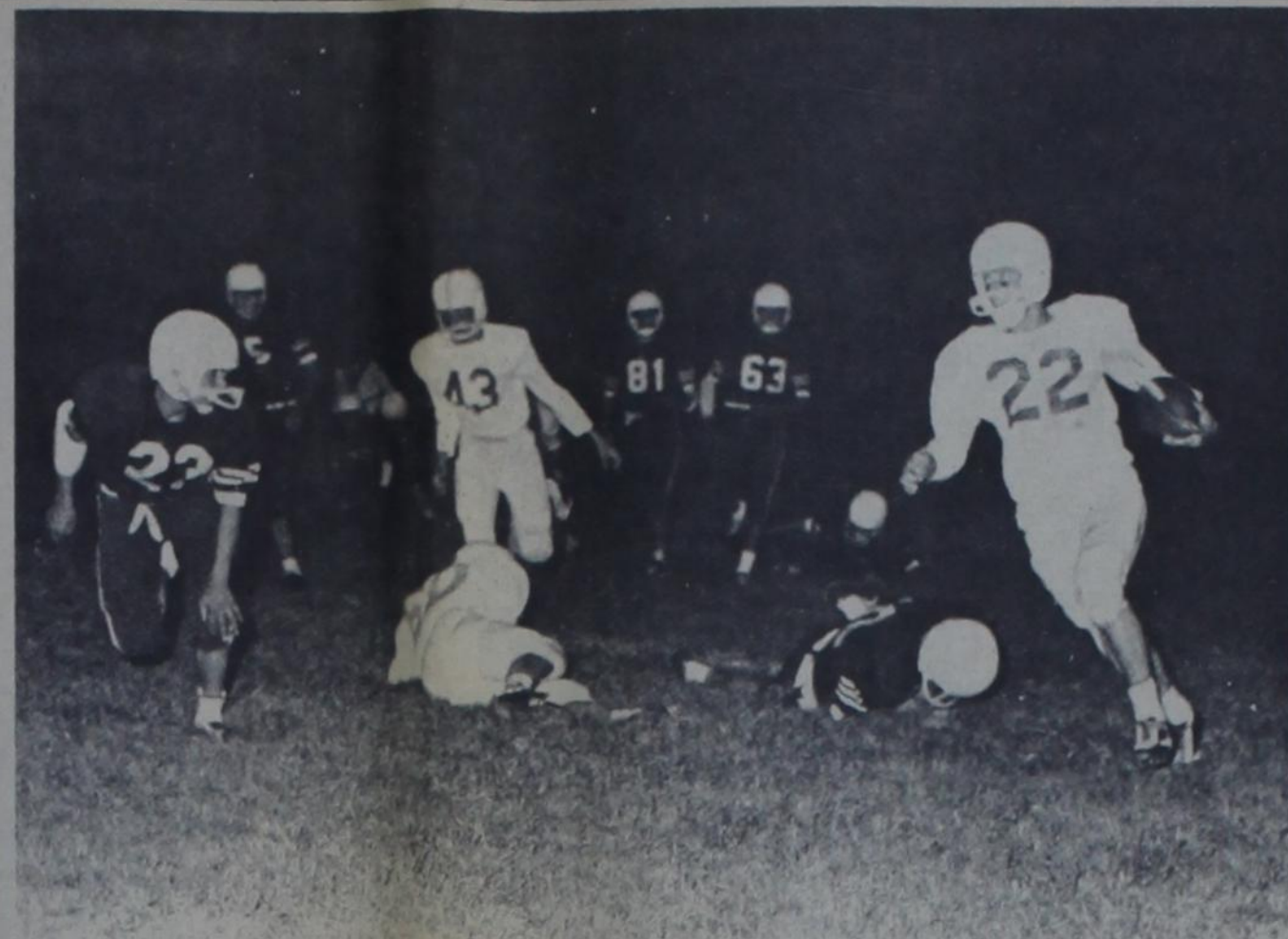

# Nazareth Swifts Topple Hart Longhorns, 44-14

Nazareth, led by halfback Gerald Brockman, who scored two touchdowns and rushed for 78 yards, ripped the Hart Longhorns 44-14 last Friday in Hart. Brockman caught a pair of touchdown passes from quarterback Marvin Hoelting, going 35 yards for one and 43 for another. The Swifts led from the start of the battle, using primarily a ground attack throughout the game. Nazareth piled up an amazing total of 291 yards of rushing offense plus 134 yards through the airways, for a total offense of 425 yards.

The Swifts held a 26-0 lead at halftime and added 18 points the final half while Hart mustered 14. Nazareth could add only a pair of extra points on a run, as the Swifts continue to have trouble getting conversion attempts. Ten different rushers were employed by the Swifts with Hoelting totaling 119 yards to lead in individual

ground gaining. Brockman piled up his 78 yards in the first half as he saw very little action in the final stanza.

Ricky Gerber broke through on a one yard plunge early in the second quarter for the Swifts' first tally. Nazareth had marched from its own 22 with the bulk of the yardage accumulated on a pair of long gainers by Hoelting on the quarterback option play. Good blocking led the way as Hoelting went 33 and 28 yards on the option for first downs. Brockman got a pair of conversion markers as he skipped around left end for the extra points.

Hart gave the Swifts good field position after the Longhorns couldn't move the ball against the tough Nazareth defense. From the Hart 45, the Swifts moved for a score in four plays, one a 25 yard gainer by Brockman on a pitchout around left end.

Gerber marked up his second touchdown on a six yard scamper on a second and one situation. The Swifts extra point attempt was good but a penalty nullified it. On their second try for the conversion, the Swifts kick was short. Nazareth increased its lead to 20-0 shortly after Gerber's touchdown jaunt. Hart couldn't move against the Nazareth forward wall and the Swifts rushed in to nail the ball carrier behind the line. The Longhorns attempted a pass on third and 12 but defensive end Clyde Venhaus batted the jump pass down and then caught it at the Hart 35. Hoelting went to the air for only the second time late in the second quarter. The quarterback's first pass was overthrown but his next one was on target to Brockman who sprinted 35 yards for another tally. Hart now trailed the Swifts 20-0 after Nazareth missed its extra point attempt.

With less than three minutes left in the first half, Hoelting fired a distance shot of 43 yards to halfback, Brockman. Nazareth thus held a 26-0 halftime lead.

Hart took the second half kickoff back to the Longhorn 33, but could get only five yards in three rushing plays. Donald Braddock who was all over the place on defense in the battle, blocked the Hart punt on a fourth down. From the Hart 48, the Swifts moved in for another score in four plays. Ricky Gerber took a Hoelting pass 42 yards for the touchdown, giving Hoelting his third straight touchdown pass. The marker gave the Swifts a 32-0 lead.

The third quarter also saw a pair of exciting plays which took place in a span of one minute. Safetyman Hoelting grabbed off a Hart jump pass at his own 25 and then raced around left end with the entire left side of the Nazareth line in front. Hoelting went 75 yards on the interception for Nazareth's sixth touchdown. Hart, however, came right back

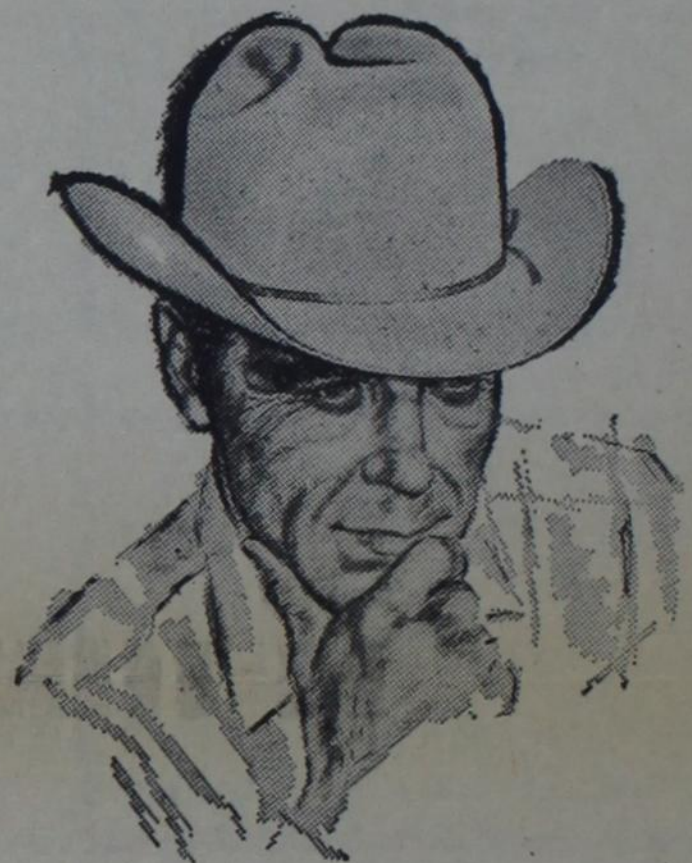
