### LEMONS NOT LOWER SAY LOCAL DEALERS

Reports From New York of Glut in Lemon Market Are Apt to Be Misleading to Retailers

"New York, Aug. 12.-The appraiser at this port has sold for the government in the last three weeks, 100,000 boxes of lemons because the importers declined to pay duty on them. Most of the lemons imported have come from the Mediterranean ports and the amount has been greatly increased within a few years. They used to come in sailing vessels, but now they come in steamers, which bring larger cargoes. Caldwell; W. S. Brashew, Springfield; MAKING MONEY OUT OF OATS Oklahoma Farmers Have a Large Crop

> and Price is Good. Guthrie, O. T., Aug. 15.-"We have a phenomenal oat crop in the territory adjacent to El Reno," said Henry Lassen, the Canadian county miller. "The yield is from 75 to 100 bushels

per acre. The acreage is large. This is owing to the fact that many acres of wheat were killed last winter by freezing and other causes. The farmer was forced to plow up this wheat and plant the ground to something else. In most cases this acreage was put in oats, and this increased the number of acres over former years. The number of South Italians, the least desirable from that kingdom, rose from 65,600 in 1899 to 152,900 in 1902. The number of Poles rose from 28,400 to 69,600. The number of Slovaks rose from 15,800 to 36, 900. The number of Croats and Slovenes rose from 8600 to 30,200. 
