Washington, Sept. 4.—The report of Colombian Government Tries to Bag Carroll D. Wright, commissioner of labor, on the anthracite coal strike, was made public today. CONDITION OF COTTON. The Average Is Lower in Texas Than for Many Years.

Washington, Sept. 4.-Sixty-four points, the present unprecedented low average of the condition of cotton, which is two-tenths of a point lower than the condition on Sept. 1, 1896, is due mainly to the reports from Texas and Alabama, in both of which states the prevailing conditions are nothing less than disastrous.

The average for Texas is 3 points lower than at the corresponding date it 1895 and 1901, and is the lowest ever reported for that state. In Alabama also the crop is the poorest ever known. Georgia reports 9 points below its ten year average; the condition figures are 1 point below the corresponding average in 1899 and 1900. The condition in Louisiana is the same as in September, 1900, or 6 points below its ten years average. Mississippi reports 7 points below its ten year average, but its condition is still 8 points above that at the corresponding date in 1900; South Carolina is within 1 point of its ten year average and North Carolina, Tennessee and Arkansas are 2 points, 7 points and 1 point



GUARDS TAKE PART

It Is Not Known Whether Any One Was Killed-The County Officials Cannot Get Men to Assist in Keeping the Peace

Bramwell, W. Va., Sept. 4.-The sitnation in the Flat Top coal field is yet size. alarming. Wednesday night at Simmons Creek as the non-union miners were leaving the mines, a volley was fired at them supposedly by the strikers hidden on the mountainside. The guards returned the fire. So far as is known no one was injured. The officials et Simmons Creek and other operations in the Flat Top field have asked the county and state authorities for protection, but the county authorities need officers at so many different points it seems impossible for the sher-Iff to find men enough whom he can deputize to preserve order. More than half the men deputized in the past week or two by the sheriff as deputies refuse to act in that capacity. It is said that whole prosecutions will result from this when the next criminal court convenes as the sheriff seems much enraged at the poor support being given him. As yet Governor White refuses to send any troops to this field cotwithstanding many appeals are made datily.

The fire in the Pocahontas mine continues to rage although two large streams of water have been pouring into the pit mouth for two days. The mine officials fear explosions in the mine as the result of the fire and it is difficult to get men who will push enough into the interior to fight the fire. Advices from the Elhart field are to the effect that probably 100 strikers returned to work there Wednesday. chiefly Hungarians, who cannot speak a word of English. It is more than likely the strikers will endeavor to prevent them again entering the mines and trouble may result in that field.




