AMERICANS ASK SHIPS FOR ORINOCO RIVER

WANT INTERESTS PROTECTED AND NAVIGATION ON THE STREAM KEEP UNMOLESTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Large American shipping interests operating in the waters of the Orinoco river again have requested the state and navy departments to send a warship up that river for the purpose of protecting their steamers and keeping navigation unobstructed.

The Marletta was sent up the Orinoco recently with very good immediate results, but now that no American warship is in that locality it appears that the disturbed situation which took her there is returning. The navy department desires to afford every possible and practicable aid for the protection of these trading interests, but it is not in a position to do so just at present, on account of the lack of ships in Venezuelan waters.

THE LETHARGY IN CUBA

A Native Worth Millions Lives In Poverty.

IGNORANT OF WEALTH IN SIGHT.

Professor Clark of the United States Labor Bureau Tells some New and Interesting Facts About the Cubans-The Simple Life of a Planter Described.

Cuba is perhaps the only country in the world within the borders of which resides a millionaire who lives in poverty and squalor, says the Washington correspondent of the Chicago Tribune.

"The home of a countryman in Puerto Principe province may be described as typical. It chanced to be a little apart from the bridge path at the edge of a forest. The house had been erected since the war and contained two rooms and an open shed, where cooking was done.

"In the shed a raised terrace of earth about three feet high and walled around with small logs held the fire like some rustic altar. The cooking utensils consisted of a frying pan and

a few tin dishes and kettles. The doors were of matting. One of the rooms contained a table of home construction, supported on posts driven into the ground.

"The sleeping apartment contained iron beds and hammocks. The yard and garden were fenced and contained yucca and yams, bananas, sugar cane and a few fruit trees.

"In the morning the boys of the family were up before daybreak," says Professor Clark, "and had a bushel of sweet potatoes dug by the time the others put in an appearance. A cup of coffee sweetened with cane sirup was drunk, and the men went to the woods to work till well toward midday, clearing land for a new banana patch.

"The head of this family owned 1,200 acres of fertile bottom land, probably a fourth of which was cleared. The remainder contained much mahogany timber, worth from \$50 to \$80 a log on the river bank.

"The fare upon the sugar plantations is better than that of the peasant cultivator in his own home. The usual rations are a pound of beef, a pound of rice or beans, half a pound of bread, besides coffee and sugar.
