PROGRESS OF CONSTRUCTION

HOW THE PACKING HOUSES HAVE GROWN UP TO NOW

WEEK'S ADVANCE IS GREAT

Main Buildings of Each Plant Completed and Machinery Being Installed—New Buildings Under Way—Details of Construction

To a visitor who has not been in the packing house district for a week a great advance in the matter of construction is very much in evidence. The red brick walls of the new Live Stock Exchange are growing steadily, a considerable part being up for the first story.

The main row of buildings of the Armour plant is erected ready for the windows and doors and inside work is being done, machinery and pipes being placed, etc.

The cattle drive at the north end, leading to the top floor of the slaughter house is about two-thirds done.

The refrigerator machinery is arriving, four more cars having just come in and is being installed, while iron columns for the smoke house were being unloaded from the cars yesterday.

Stone masons are at work on heavy slabs of rock for caps to the foundations for the engines. One of the negro laborers let a rock fall on his right hand Saturday, cutting off the end of the middle finger.

Masons are finishing up the top of the walls on the north and west sides of the northernmost building in the main row of the Swift plant, and the excavation for the smoke house, which is to stand still north of that, is being shaped up for the laying of the foundations.

In the boiler house, whose high walls have reached the top, with the roof going on, one boiler is ready, bricked up and connections made. Another one is nearly ready, and the brick work and pipes for two others are nearly completed.

Iron storage tanks are now being constructed. Two large ones thirty feet in diameter and four small ones fifteen feet in diameter, the fuel oil tanks, eighteen feet high and thirty feet in diameter, are practically completed.

A temporary installation of some electrical machinery is being made, rendered necessary by an accident to a casting which dropped and was broken while in the hands of the builders.

The big cattle chute is being given a coat of paint—a railroad brown. Another of the wells was completed yesterday, reaching a depth of 320 feet. The stretch of ground to the northward of the buildings has now been cleared of all the pens and fences, and is ready for construction work to begin.

Materials received Saturday consisted of four cars of brick, one of iron columns, one of ice machinery, and three of other machinery. Two cars of salt were also received.
