LONDON, Sept. 29.—A special despatch from Rome says that the death roll resulting from the recent hurricane that swept over the Island of Sicily is increasing daffy.

Six hundred bodies are now awaiting burial and everywhere are piled decaying heaps of the dead. The sight is appalling and lack of adequate means for prompt interment causes a grave fear that an epidemic will break out among the living.

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## BONE FOUND TO BE AFFECTED

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ANOTHER OPERATION ON PRESI-DENT ROUSEVELT'S LEG

#### NO ALARM IS NECESSARY

Good Drainage of Wound Secured and Physicians Say Recovery of Patient Will Now Follow Rapidly

(By Associated Press)

Washington, Sept. 29 .- Another operation was performed Sunday on the abscess on the left leg of President Roosevelt. In the former operation a simple needle was used to relieve the mouble, but Sunday the surgeons with s knife made an incision into the small cavity, er osing the bone which was found to be slightly affected. The president's case has been progressing satisfactorily, but it is believed by the physicians that the further operation made Sunday will hasten his complete recovery. While none of the doctors ere willing to be quoted, they give the most positive assurances that there is not the least cause for alarm, and say, on the contrary, there is every indication of a speedy recovery, that the area of the bone affected is very slight and will not result in an impairment of the president's limb and that there is no evidence whatever of any matter that would produce blood poisoning. They confidently expect that the president will be on his feet within a reasonable time with his robust constitution to assist recovery will soon be

Dr. Newton Shaffer of New York who long has been acquainted with the Roosevelt family and has attended the president's children at various time and who is also a well known one specialist joined the president's physicians in their morning consultation at 10 o'clook.

The president stood the operation very well and subsequently expressed his satisfaction at the successful re-

Dr. Rixey the surgeon general of the navy, performed the operation assisted by Dr. Lung, the president's regular physician. Dr. O'Reilly who also was present with the other physicians is the surgeon general of the army and heretofore has been consulted regarding the care. Dr. Edward R. Stitt. another of those present, is in charge of the naval museum of hygiene and medical school.

"Dr. Newton M. Shaffer of New York foined the president's physicians in consultation this morning at 10 o'clock. The increase in local symptoms and a rise in temperature rendered it necessary to make an incision into the small cavity, exposing the bone, which was found to be slightly affected. Thorough drainage is now established and the physicians feel confident that recovery will be uninterrupted.

HOW THE PACKING HOUSES HAVE GROWN UP TO NOW

#### WEEK'S ADVANCE IS GREAT

Main Buildings of Each Plant Completed and Machinery Being Installed-New Buildings Under Way-Details of Construction

To a visitor who has not been in the packing house district for a week a great advance in the matter of construction is very much in evidence. The red brick walls of the new Live Stock Exchange are growing steadily, a considerable part being up for the first story. The viaduct over the tracks is being roofed and the stringers are laid on the overhead driveway from the foot of the yards as far as the main avenue passing between the Armour and Swift properties. Beyond that the piles are already in place for quite a distance. All this is on the stock yards premises. The Armour Plant

The main row of buildings of the Armour plant is erected ready for the windows and doors and inside work is being done, machinery and pipes being placed, etc. Of the eastern row the walls of the southernmost, the lard refinery, are well up towards the top of the fifth floor and nearly ready for the roof, and the others are well ad-

Other machinery is being placed in the cooling rooms and slaughter house. Electricians are busy also wiring the buildings.

Stin another argument is offered that the parent cannot prepare a suitable lunch at the breakfast hour for their children to subsist on until the regular supper hour, and that when they come home at about 4 o'clock their appetite demands that \$6115. they have another cold lunch or wait till supper. If they are permitted to indulge in a cold lunch at 4 o'clock at \$1915. their appetites are spoiled for the regular supper meal, and so it goes-their digestion is impaired and their health injured by reason of the regular irregular hours of eating. The suggestion is made that one hour or an hour and a half should be given, and all the children who care to do so, or wnose parents desire that they should do so, can go home.

Superintendent Hogg Interviewed A Telegram representative called on Superintendent Hogg Saturday morning and explained the foregoing protests to him and asked him for an expression on the question. He said, in substance, that this question had been given serious consideration by the board, not only this year but for all years. They had weighed the proposition in all its various phases and had tried hard to adopt a plan that would be the best for all interested. He said that school boards all over the country had been confronted with the same vexed question, and none had been able to settle it satisfactorily for everybody-though, in his opinion, the present system came nearer satisfying all concerned than any yet tried. He said that ne believed nine-tenths of the patrons would prefer that their children would not come home at the noon hour-especially those residing any distance from the schools, "and,"

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
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
