## Director and Committeemen For Water District Are Named Tuesday

A very light vote was cast in Castro County Tuesday when qualified voters selected County Committeemen and a Director for the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1. A total of 56 votes were cast at the polling places at Nazareth, Hart, Dimmitt and Jumbo and giving the nod to the nominees whose names appeared on the ballot. They were: Willis Hawkins, Director; Posey Cunningham, E. L. Ivey and G. I. Clingsmith Committeemen.

Elections were held throughout the district, which includes all or parts of thirteen counties and nineteen incorporated cities, for the purpose of electing county committeemen and members to the permanent board of directors.

Garden club members from all over the state are expected to attend the annual Garden Club Conference at Texas State College for Women January 17 and 18.

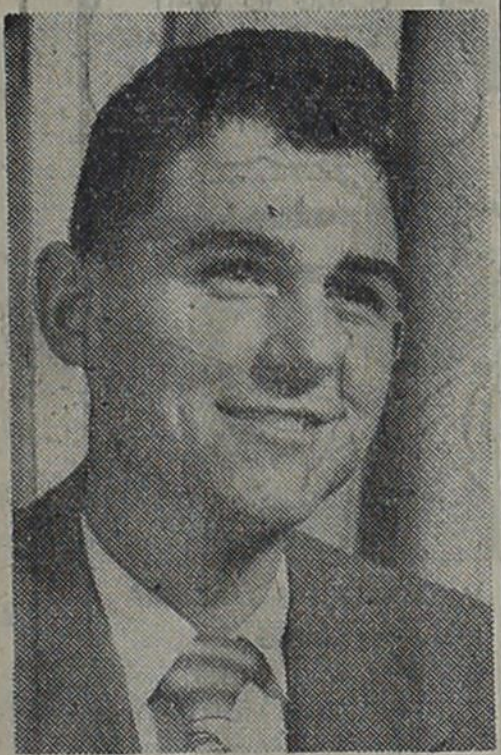
This year's conference will consist of addresses by well-known authorities on gardening, clinics, panel discussions, social gatherings, and entertainment programs by TSCW students, as well as tours of the college campus.

Among the principal speakers will be Dr. Gustav A. L. Mehlquist, research horticulturist for the Missouri Botanical Garden in St. Louis, Mo.; Professor A. F. de Worthe, head of the Department of Floriculture and Landscape Architecture at Texas A & M College; Mrs. G. C. Spillers, president of the National Council of Garden Clubs; Robert P. Ealy, professor of landscape design at Oklahoma A & M College; Fred R. Brison, professor of horticulture at Texas A & M College; Fred W. Westcott, director of the Rural Arts Department at TSCW; and Jack Finney, city planner and architect of San Antonio.

Subjects for the discussion will range from the growing of vegetables and house plants to civic development program planning, modern trends in landscaping gardening and new trends in horticulture.

## Local Garages Are Preparing To Check Cars Under New Law

Two Dimmitt motor companies have been designated as checking agencies for cars under the new safety law, and expect to receive their authorization soon. Much of the work of checking cars can be done with standard garage equipment but for part of the work specialized checking equipment will be required. The Dimmitt Motor Company is installing approximately \$2,000 worth of new equipment for the checking of brakes, toe-ins, lights, etc. They will be prepared to check cars as soon as the proper forms and supplies are received from the State Department of Public Safety.

The Castro Motor Company has also applied for approval as a checking station but have not received the necessary supplies to start car checking operations.

A fee of \$1.00 will be made for checking cars, with 25 cents going to the state for supplies. Under the safety law all cars must be checked by an authorized checking agency before the car can be registered for the coming year.

## Father Boeckman Died In Amarillo Saturday Night

Rev. Gregory Anthony Boeckman, pastor of Holy Name Catholic Church, Happy, for the past year and a half, died in St. Anthony's Hospital at Amarillo early Saturday night.

Death came a few hours after Father Boeckman suffered a heart attack. He was 51 years old.

A native of Cassella, Ohio, Father Boeckman was the youngest member of a large family. When a young man, he worked several years as a railway agent in order to earn funds for his seminary education.

Father Boeckman was ordained a priest of the Amarillo diocese in ceremonies in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Amarillo, on May 6, 1928. Bishop R. A. Gerkin officiated.

Father Boeckman served as assistant at Sacred Heart Cathedral from June, 1928, to July 1929, and during the same time was procurator of St. George's College, Amarillo. He was assigned to a Lubbock pastorate in July 1929, and remained there until July, 1932.

From Lubbock, Father Boeckman moved to Olfen, Texas, serving there until January, 1942. He then was assigned to the Holy Family Catholic Church at Nazareth. He served at Nazareth from June, 1942, to May, 1950, when he went to Happy.

A rosary service was scheduled to be held in Boxwell Brothers Ivy Chapel at Amarillo Monday evening.

Requiem mass was celebrated at 9 o'clock Monday morning in the church at Happy. A similar mass was said in the Catholic Church at Tulia at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning. Funeral mass was said at Nazareth at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Wallace Funeral Home of Tulia directed arrangements at Tulia and Nazareth. The body then was taken to Amarillo and then to Coldwater, Ohio, for burial.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Paul J. Froning, of Coldwater.

## Bobcat Band Completes Busy First Semester

## '52 March of Dimes Opens Drive Here For Entire Month of January

The 1952 March of Dimes opened in Castro County today with the avowed objective of putting the fight against polio on a "pay-as-you-go basis" after four successive years in which the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has gone into debt fighting the only epidemic disease still on the increase in America.

## Ft. Worth Press To Sponsor Essay Writing Contest

"During the last four years," said Mrs. R. B. Boren, County campaign director, "the nation has experienced its worst polio years in history. Many people are not aware of this great increase because polio cases have been widely distributed rather than concentrated in specific areas. But 1951 marked the fourth consecutive year in which the March of Dimes has had to go into debt to pay for the care of polio patients needing help.

"The estimated deficit at the end of 1951 is \$5,000,000. Thus the 1952 March of Dimes will be mortgaged for this amount before any money may be set aside for scientific research or for contingencies that lie ahead next summer."

The campaign director revealed that whereas in previous years the average annual incidence of polio was about 10,000 cases, that figure has been tripled in the last four years, bringing the annual average to 30,000. The four-year case total, Mrs. Boren said, was 132,000—more than all the polio cases reported during the previous ten years.

"The tremendous obligations facing the National Foundation," Mrs. Boren said, "have forced us to double the March of Dimes campaign period. It will extend from today throughout the entire month of January as we endeavor to raise enough money to wipe out the 1951 debt and avoid incurring another for 1952.

"Our committees have been formed earlier than ever before. We want every citizen in the country to play a part in making this March of Dimes the greatest ever conducted."

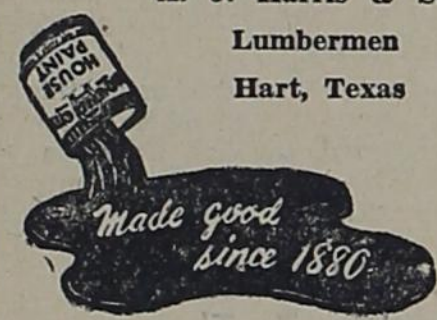

## THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW that the last session of the Legislature passed a new election code?

The last session of the Legislature made extensive changes in the election laws of the State of Texas. The whole field of the election laws was re-codified into two hundred forty-eight paragraphs, covering a booklet of one

hundred ten pages. Listing as one of the necessities for the new law, the Legislature stated that this re-codification was necessary because of the "near breakdown of the election machinery of the State."

Many changes in the old laws were made, and many new safeguards around the sanctity of the ballot were placed in the new election code.

This new law begins by saying "The aim in adopting this code is to state in plain language the laws governing the nomination and election of officers and of holding other elections, to simplify, clarify and harmonize the existing laws in regard to parties, suffrage, nominations, and elections, and to safeguard the purity

of the ballot box against error, fraud, mistake and corruption, to the end that the will of the people shall prevail and that true democracy shall not perish from the Lone Star State."

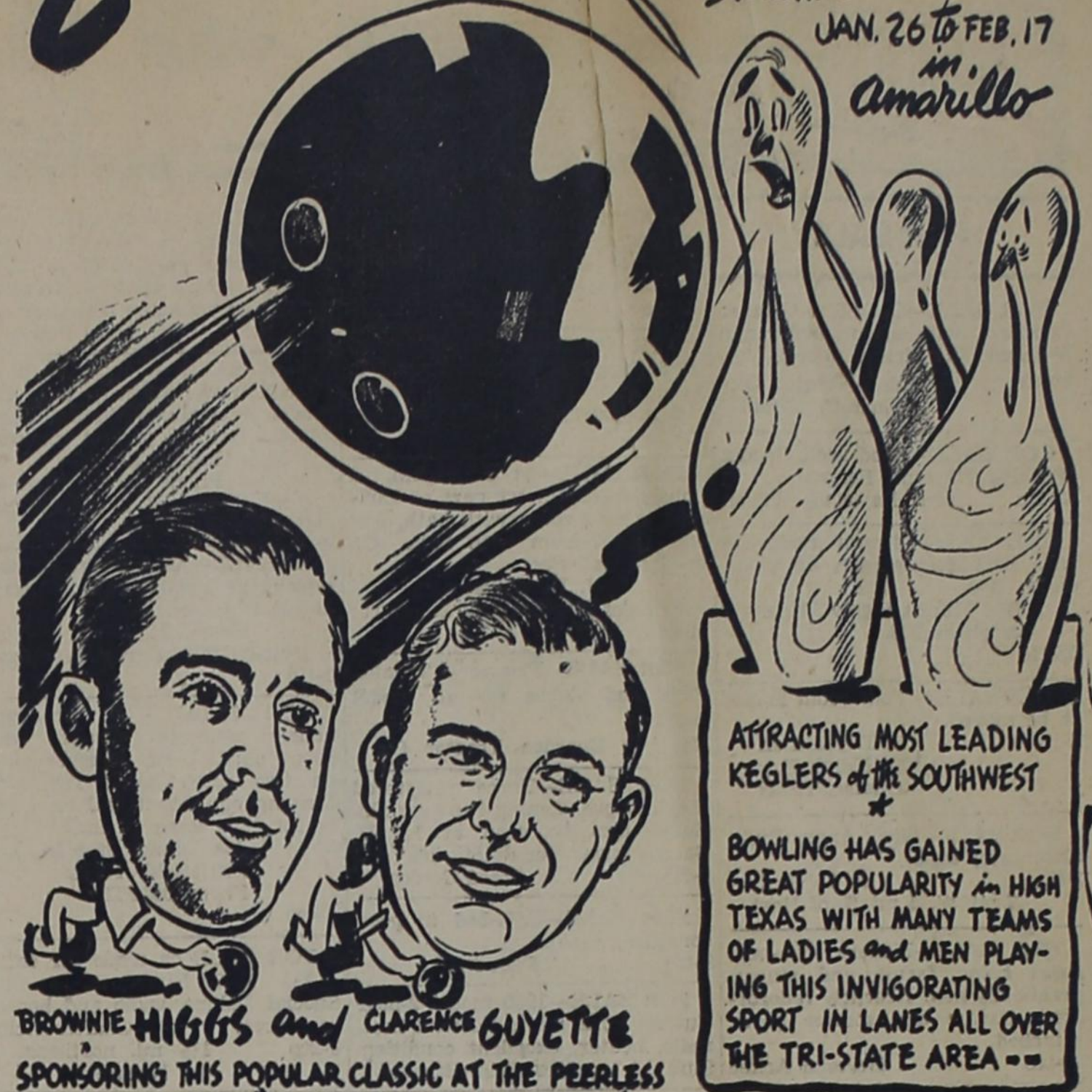

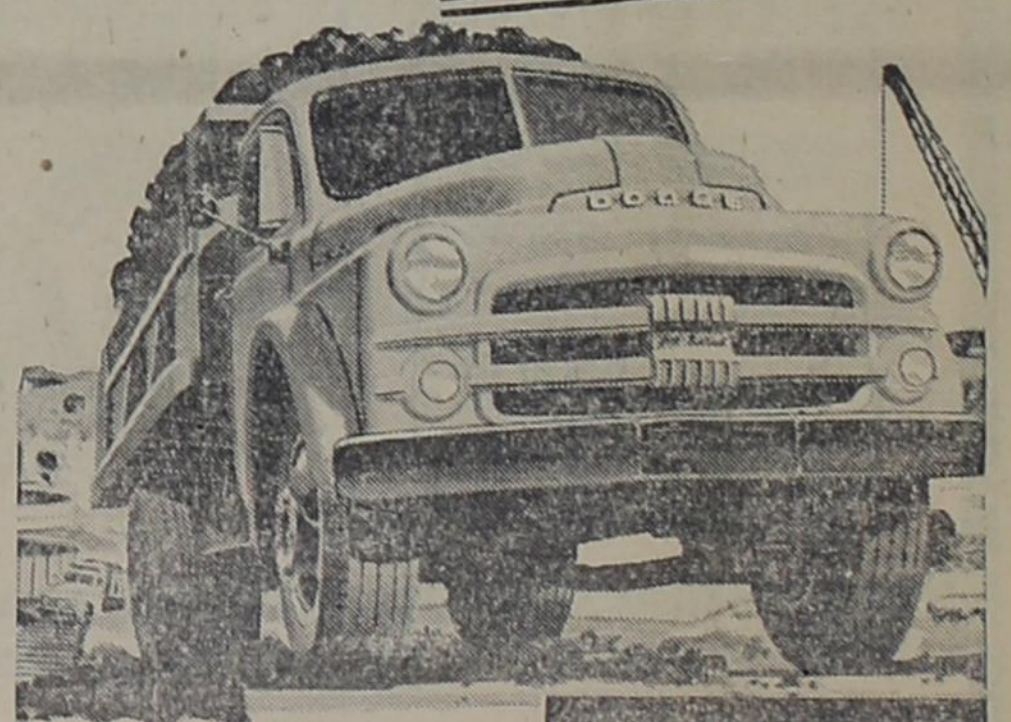

### Health Talks

The chances are that those resolutions you are trying so hard to carry out were all aimed at making your life and the lives around you a bit more pleasant during the coming year. You may have resolved not to worry so much, not to yell at the children, to really stay within a budget, to try to find more things to laugh at, to do little helpful things for people—in some way or other your resolutions are designed to make life a song instead of an offkey existence.

A song is made up of seven tones, those old familiar do, re, mi, fa, so, la, ti's. Whatever key you live in, you still use those do-re-mi's for your living. And one of the best ways to keep in key, in proper tone, to make your life a song is the eating of the essential foods.

It seems a far cry from food to resolutions but without the proper instruments you can't have any kind of a song. You know that if you don't eat enough food, you get dizzy, weak, and your thoughts get rather flighty. You know that when you eat too much food, you get headache, stuffy, heavy, and your poor old mind seems not to function too well.

Eating improper food does not create as obvious symptoms as undereating or overeating but sooner or later the effects will show up someplace in your system. You yell at the kids, you get highly nervous and worry about yourself and world situations, you take a dim view of things, you don't feel good enough to want to help yourself or others—in fact, you make resolutions with the turn of the year to try to overcome your shortcomings.

A proper diet is not a cure-all. It is the first essential in helping you to help yourself, however, mentally and physically. And the first resolution you should go to work on this year is the establishment of a proper diet; your other resolutions might fall into place automatically if you're feeding yourself the instruments which enable your body to tune up in key.

Those seven basic foods fit right into those seven basic tones that make up music. Anything else you add to your diet may offer variation in your song of life, but you have to start with the basic seven.

First you have "do", the musical equivalent of bread and cereals which are the first requirement in a diet. You need dough, whole grain cereals, in some quantity every day, no matter whether you're drastically overweight or not. If for some reason of health these "do" ingredients must be eliminated from your diet, your doctor will substitute a food which contains the same substances in a manner in which your body can use properly.

The next note of the scale is "re," which might be translated into food as the fruits, tomatoes or raw cabbage that belong in your daily diet. All fruits are included in this bracket and since there is always some fruit on the market, it shouldn't be a hard spot to fill. When you get tired of fruits, you can always switch to tomatoes or an occasional serving of cole slaw or some other raw cabbage dish; but you need some of this "re" group everyday, and it wouldn't hurt to include two servings of "re."

Milk could be the "mi" in the musical scale of living and pota-

## Sports Afield

By Ted Kesting

Generalized comparison of one type of boat construction with another is hard to make. But let's talk about canvas-covered boats today.

In a general comparison of the durability of canvas-covered craft with other constructions account must be taken of the fact the average canvas-covered boat is lighter. To be fair to them a comparison should be made with other craft of equal weight.

And boating expert Willard Crandall points out that there are even variations in canvas-covered constructions. There seems no question that some of these are enough different so they should not be judged under the usual rules for canvas-covered boats as to use, upkeep and so on.

When you are considering a canvas-covered boat, one of the first things you should ask is how it will stand up in rough use, as in snag-filled water. Canvas can be ripped if you hit something sharp enough fast enough.

By snag-infested waters I mean those with a welter of submerged bushes, logs and even trees in waters above a dam, or in a swamp. Occasional stumps or brush along a shore are not considered a snag area.

How about repairs on canvas boats? There will be upkeep work, sooner or later, on a canvas-cov-

er boat. But, and here's a point of importance which is too commonly overlooked, canvas-covered boats can always be well repaired and usually simply. Amateurs sometimes cover old wood boats that are flat or V-bottom, or of some heavy construction that is quite unsuited for canvas. No factory that I know of would use canvas in this way. But the fact that amateurs will try such stunts in efforts to hold together an old leaky boat does not add to the reputation canvas-covered boats have with the layman. It's too bad, because they are good boats.

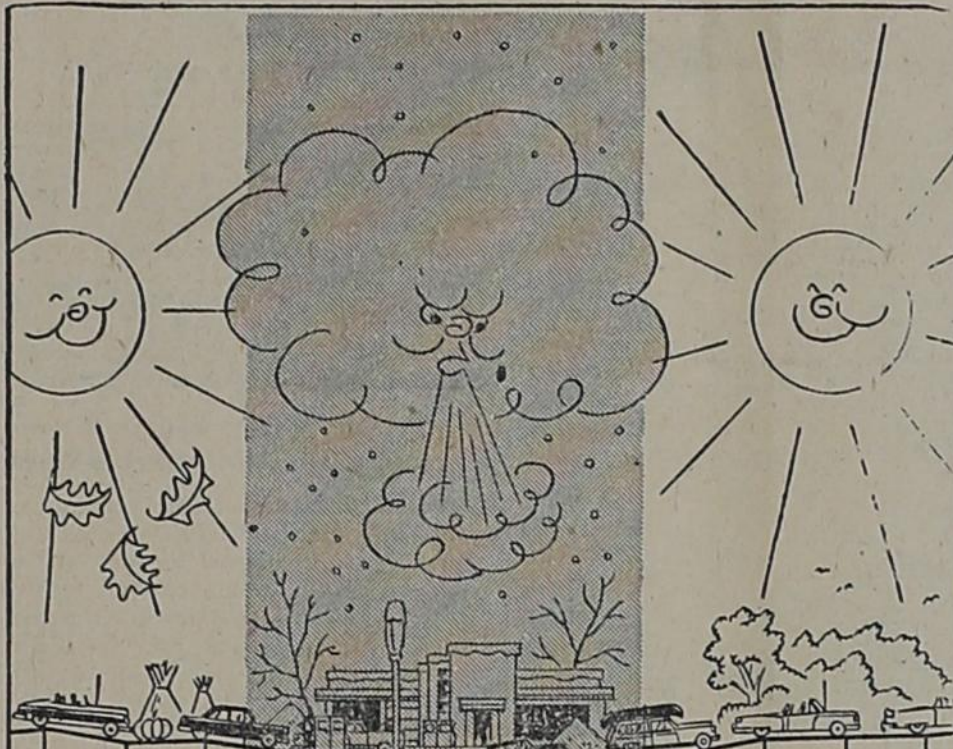
