

MINISTER BOWEN IS IN CHARGE

He Stands Close to President Castro and He May Be the Means of Bringing Venezuela and the European Countries Together - The Department Is Aware of His Attitude

Washington, Dec. 10.-Before the British minister and German charge left Caracas these officials requested Mr. Bowen to take charge of the interests of their countries in Venezuela. Inis request will be granted, as there is no warrant for a declination in such cases and the United States legation at Caracas will extend protection to British and German subjects when called upon, until a normal state of affairs is restored.

This is not likely to be the end of Minister Bowen's activities, for from the tenor of some of the communications he has made to the department, it is inferred that if he sees an opportunity to use his good offices as a mediator between President Castro and the British and German representatives he will promptly avail himself of that opportunity. The state department is not encouraging him in this attitude, preferring to avoid all entanglements, but being on the spot and willing to do what he can to prevent a crisis. Mr. Bowen may be allowed measure of discretionary power.

aware of the intention of the British and German governments, having been sounded in advance and it sees no reason to interfere at this stage if at all. It was reported that the state department had already been fully advised as to the progress to be adopted by the British and German governments touching Venezuela, that the incidents of Monday at Caracas caused so little stir in official circles and it was stated that the subject was not even mentioned at cabinet meeting Tuesday. So the attitude of our government just now is one of waiting. An official, not long returned from Venezuela states that to the best of his judgment the sum of \$5,000,000 will probably cover the claims upon which the ultimatum issued Monday were based. The principal claim is that of the German railroad built at a cost of \$10,000,000, on which Venezuela guaranteed 7 per cent interest, a figure reduced in 1895 to 5 Also outstanding is a large foreign indepteaness, but whether or not the claims of these bondholders are includhere. 



H. E. Crowley, one of the most prominent and extensive cattle owners and big shippers at the Fort Worth stock yards, is in the city. Mr. Crowthat market. These five cars were but a portion of a shipment of seventeen cars, the remainder of the consignment being sold at the Fort Worth

Mr. Crowley is a hearty admirer of the local stock yards and the division of his shipment demonstrated to him that the Fort Worth market is the most profitable to all shippers in this section of the country. He realized a saving of twenty-five pounds per head in shipping to Fort Worth, and the cattle sent to Kansas City were exactly that amount lighter when they arrived at their destination. The conditions of the ranges about Midland, says Mr. Crowley, for cattle grazing are excellent and the recent rains gave the grass a good stimulant and the land could not be more favorable to cattle raising in his section of he country than at present.
