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PUBLIC NOTICE

All persons who wish to qualify to vote beginning February 1, 1967, must register with the County Tax office on or before January 31, 1967. In this county all persons between the ages of 21 and 60 years are required to register before they can qualify to vote.

Those persons who are over 60 years of age or who will become 60 years of age before any election they plan to vote in are NOT required to register.

New Residents of the State who have not been here the required length of time to qualify to vote and persons who will become 21 years of age after the January 31 deadline may register anytime during the year so long as they register at least 30 days before the election they plan to vote in.

It is suggested that if you will fulfil your residence requirement of 12 months in the State and 6 months in the county, or will become 21 years of age soon after the registration deadline, you should come ahead and register this month. We can mark your registration certificate to become effective on the date your qualifications are fulfilled.
