


Dr. Lockwood and three assistants started up the Wilson trail upon burros, packing upon one beast a litter such as is used by the Red Cross ambulance corps.

He then called attention to the fact that on Dec. 10, 1901, the representatives of Emperor William had brought the matter of Venezuela's debts and her appartnt indifference to them to the attention of the secretary of state. The German ambassador in his letter gave the department complete information from the German standpoint of the position of his government. He said for years Venezuela had failed to pay interest on a debt to German citizens of about \$5,000,000 contracted in the construction of a railroad.

A Tack In His Throat.

Cecil Hull, a fifteen-year-old boy of Denver, was seized with a violent fit of coughing the other day which lasted for three-quarters of an hour, at the end of which time he coughed up a brass carpet tack a half inch long which he had swallowed when a child of four. Efforts were made at the time to remove it, but without success. For eleven years he has had bronchial trouble, which lately had become so severe that fears were had for his life. Since the tack was removed he has been steadily regaining his health.

Three Toed Horses.

The remains of five fossil horses have been discovered in the far west by the exploring party sent out on the William C. Whitney fund for the American Museum of Natural History in New York. These are of the three toed horses, doubtless the hipparion, found in Dakota pliocene by Hayden, Marsh, Cope and others. The species has only been known from fragments of the skull and legs, but this new find includes one nearly complete skeleton. besides several skulls, five fore legs and ten hind legs.


