Caracas, Jan. 5 .- The report that President Castro proposes to abdicate or resign the presidency of Venezuela is untrue. The correspondent of the Associated Press saw the president with regard to this matter Sunday. The president laughed when questioned and said thoughtfully:

"You are at liberty to say that I have foughtduring two years to retain the supreme power which wasinvested in me by the people of Veneruela. I will no more abdicate than I will resign. The Motos revolution without assistance from foreign powers will soon be a past story."

The course pursued by the allied powers in maintaining the blockade of La Guawra has caused astonishment among the foreign residents of this city. 





### TREE SWALLOWS UP GREAT ROCK.





These spurs are the outgrowth of the metacarpal bone, and arise from the anterior part of the two extremities of this bone. The upper spur is the larger and is





### Chinese Art Of War.

# Experiment With Ruler.

If you desire to obtain a vivid idea of the force of atmospheric pressure try the following simple experiment Place an ordinary wooden ruler on a table

in such a manner that half of it will project beyond the edge of the table, and then over the table and the portion of the ruler thereen lay a smooth sheet of paper.

Now, if you strike the exposed part of the

ruler it will in nine cases dut of ten break in half, and yet the sheet of paper on the table will neither be raised nor moved in the slightest from its position. The simple reason is because the atmospheric pressure exerted on the paper is more than sufficient to counterbalance the force of the blow which is struck at the ruley. By means of simple experiments like these one can learn a great deal of science.

First strike the three lines hard with the open palm of your hand. Now look at your palm and you will find the three lines distinctly marked on it.


