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# PORT OF SAN CARLOS SHELLED

## IS THE TARGET OF THE GERMAN CRUISER PANTHER

### FIRES SHOTS FOR ONE HOUR

The City Which Is About Twenty-One Miles From Maracaibo, Venezuela, Was Not Seriously Injured — Fort Returns the Fire and the Panther Finally Withdraws

Maracaibo, Venezuela, Jan. 19.—Fort San Carlos at the entrance of Lake Maracaibo, was shelled for an hour Saturday afternoon by the German cruiser Panther. The fort returned the fire with four guns and the Panther withdrew in the direction of Curacao.

Fort San Carlos is twenty-one miles from Maracaibo and commands the entrance to the lake of the inner bay.

The correspondent of the Associated Press here has received the following letter from General Bello, the commander of the fort: "Saturday afternoon at 12:30, Fort San Carlos was attacked and shelled, without any provocation on our part, without previous notification or the delivering of an ultimatum, by the German cruiser Panther, which tried to force the entrance. After a fight lasting an hour, during which the fort used only four guns, the Panther was obliged to abandon the fight and retreated in the direction of Curacao. The fort has suffered no damage and only three men were wounded."

There have been popular demonstrations on the streets here as a result of the shelling of the fort.

### TWO KILLED AND THIRTY INJURED IN FLORIDA

Gainesville, Fla., Jan. 19.—P. A. Chicago Great Western railroad struck a broken rail near a bridge west of here, left the rails, crossed the bridge on the ties and rolled down a twenty-foot embankment. Engineer J. D. Healy was killed and thirty persons were injured. The cars and the locomotive turned over and were demolished.

### THE TEXAS LAW MAKERS

Austin, Jan. 19.—Under suspension of the rules, the senate on Saturday passed the bill of Senator Davidson of Galveston conferring civil and criminal jurisdiction upon the county court of Matagorda county; also Senator Stafford's bill repealing the incorporation of Zavalla, Smith county.

About thirty minutes' time was consumed in discussing Senator Savage's resolution to allow senate secretary \$2.50 postage each month. It finally passed.

Appointments of governor were confirmed.

Senator Decker's bill fixing time for holding Forty-seventh district court was passed.

Senator Beatty's bill amending Beaumont's charter was passed.

Bill of Senator Savage making a change in method of printing so that linotype composition may be acceptable in state publications was referred to committee on printing. It was favorably reported later.

Senator Decker's bill fixing time for holding court in Thirty-first judicial district was passed.

A joint resolution amending constitution increasing term of all state and county elective officers to four years and increasing pay of legislators from \$2 to \$3 per day after first sixty days was introduced by Senator Faubion and referred to committee on constitutional amendments.

Adjourned until Tuesday.

The house passed senate bill appropriating \$20,000 for contingent expenses of the Twenty-eighth legislature.

A resolution expressing sympathy over the deaths of Congressmen DeGraffenreid and Sheppard was adopted and ordered spread on the minutes.

Mr. Terrell of Travis offered a resolution eulogizing and referring to the distinguished services of Hon. John H. Reagan on his retirement from office. Adopted by a unanimous rising vote.

**Mr. Lanham and Family Arrive.** Austin, Jan. 19.—Governor-elect Lanham and family have arrived and are stopping at the Driskill hotel.

### TO SOLVE LABOR PROBLEM

City of Mexico, Jan. 19.—It is believed that the decision of the management of the Chinese Commercial Steamship company to operate steamers direct between China and the Mexican port of Manzanillo will do much towards solving the problem of securing laborers in Mexico. The representatives of the company state that they can bring a superior class of Chinese laborers to Mexico.

The question of labor is becoming a serious problem in Mexico. Chinese laborers heretofore have been easy to procure, but the difficulty seems to be in securing a class of men who will retain their employment. The officials of the new steamship company insist that they can import a better class of men who will make steady workers. If the company is successful in doing this the question of cheap labor for Mexico will have been solved.

**Subcontract Let.** Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 19.—Subcontracts for constructing the Texas and Oklahoma railway from here to Coalgate, I. T., have been let. This is a Katy project and will cost \$3,000,000.

**Killed by Two Negroes.** Vinita, I. T., Jan. 19.—A white man named Warren Morris was attacked in his house at Fort Gibson and instantly killed.

**Negro Farmer Slain.** Ardmore, I. T., Jan. 19.—A negro farmer named Richard Gaines was shot and killed near Marietta.

**Yellow Fever Prevails.** Guayaquil, Ecuador, Jan. 19.—The board of health of Guayaquil has decided to close the port to steamers from Panama or Mexican ports. This measure was taken when it was learned that the steamer Acapulco had arrived at Panama from Mazatlan, Mex., where there is the plague. Yellow fever is causing from five to six deaths a day in Guayaquil.

**DEATH OF ABRAM S. HEWITT** Distinguished Citizen of New York Passes Away

New York, Jan. 19.—Abram S. Hewitt, former mayor of New York, and for many years representative in congress, died at 6 o'clock Sunday morning in his eighty-first year, after having been critically ill for ten days. With him at the moment of death were his wife, his three sons and three daughters.

Mr. Hewitt, who has been in feeble health for some months, was attacked with obstructive jaundice on January 8, and from the first it was realized by his physicians, Dr. E. L. Keyes and Dr. E. L. Keyes, Jr., that there was practically no hope of the aged patient's recovery. On the following Sunday it was thought Mr. Hewitt could not survive the night and the members of his family were summoned to his bedside, but his wonderful vitality kept him alive for a week longer.

# HURLS A LAMP IN HER FACE

## NEGRO WOMAN FRIGHTFULLY BURNED AT PARIS

### RESULT OF A QUARREL

The Lamp Was Lighted and the Flame Spread to the Woman's Clothing That Was Saturated With the Oil. She Will Probably Die—The Other Woman Arrested

Paris, Tex., Jan. 19.—Euna Robinson, colored, living on East Booth street, was frightfully burned. In a difficulty with another negro woman at her home, a lighted lamp was seized and hurled at her. The bowl of the lamp struck her in the center of the forehead and was shattered. The oil became ignited and ran in streams of liquid flame down her body, burning her from her head down to the waist.

All of the upper part of her clothing was burned off to the waist, it being impossible to smother the flames. The pigment of the skin, or cuticle, was burned off, leaving her face perfectly white. It is thought the woman is fatally injured.

Cornelia Dinwiddie was arrested and lodged in jail.

### Three Fatally Poisoned.

Fort Stockton, Tex., Jan. 19.—Misses Lou and Amy Ray of Santa Lucia, this county, are dead and their brother, T. J. Ray, is in a serious condition, resulting from poison, alleged to have been given by a nephew. The latter died at Colorado City after being arrested. He is supposed to have poisoned himself.

### Lacerated by a Mad Dog.

Navasota, Tex., Jan. 19.—In an effort to keep a mad dog from biting her daughter, Samantha Andrews, colored, was thrown down by the animal and flesh stripped from one shoulder. The brute's head had to be chopped off with an ax before he would release his hold.

### Lodge of Elks at Waco.

Waco, Tex., Jan. 19.—A lodge of Elks with forty-three members was organized here.

### Burglars Reap Large Harvest.

Greenville, Tex., Jan. 19.—Several houses were burglarized and jewelry and money to the value of \$1000 taken.

### MANY VICTIMS OF PLAGUE

Mazatlan, Mex., Jan. 19.—There have been 107 deaths from the plague since Jan. 1. The deaths on the 15th numbered seven and many new cases are reported. The number of wooden houses burned is 106. Two coaches in which plague stricken people sought to escape from the city will be burned. A young workman's mother died from the plague at the family house. Same sanitary inspectors entered the house and took possession of the corpse. The young man was sent to the department of observation. The man's wife and sister were absent at the time of the inspector's visit and afterwards disappeared, fearing to be taken to the lazaretto. That morning one of the women was found dead from the plague and the other has not been attacked by the epidemic, but has lost his mind.

### ENORMOUSLY RICH STRIKE

Gold Discovered That May Surpass the Klondike

Seattle, Jan. 19.—A special to the Times from Dawson says: A tremendously rich strike, the magnitude of which has never been equaled since Bob Henderson told his wonderful story of the Klondike, has been made eighteen miles north of a point on Tanana river, 300 miles from its source. The district is in American discovery.

Circle City has been depopulated, and a wild stampede of prospectors from all the surrounding country is in progress. As yet few have reached the discovered.

The original strike was made on Pedro, a creek running parallel with the Tanana, about eighteen miles from the river. This creek is streaked for miles. Dan McCarthy, a well known Dawsonite, made the discovery on Gold stream, a continuation of Pedro, which has proved to be the richest so far found.

MORMONS ARE TAKING A HAND

INTERESTED IN THE TRIAL OF HOOPER YOUNG FOR MURDER

MOST SENSATIONAL CASE

Alleged That He Lured Mrs. Pulitzer to His Rooms and Then Drugged Her and Cut the Body to Pieces. He Was of Mormon Faith and the Church Influence Will Be Exerted for Him

(Special to The Telegram.) NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—With the Molineux trial still fresh in the public memory and the Louis Disbrow murder trial just closed, still another notable murder case, and one of absorbing interest to criminologists, will come up for trial next week.

This is the case of William Hooper Young, a grandson of Brigham Young, who was indicted in October last charged with the murder of Mrs. Anna Nelson Pulitzer, a woman whom he is accused of having lured to his rooms in West Fifty-eighth street.

The crime was one of the most brutal the police have been called upon to deal with since the Gudensuppe murder. For some time prior to his alleged commission of the crime Young had been occupying a room in the luxurious apartments of his father, John W. Young, a promoter and capitalist of wealth and high financial position, and who was at the time absent in Europe on business. The son had the reputation of being a ne'er-do-well, drifting from one occupation to another and living at various times in Utah, the state of Washington and various other parts of the country. Evidence collected by the police, strengthened by the confession alleged to have been made by Young after his arrest, goes to show that the young man took the woman, with whom he had had some previous acquaintance, to his rooms on the night of the murder and there drugged her and then proceeded to cut up the body in the most diabolical manner. The remains were then taken in a trunk across the North river, where they were thrown into the shallow waters of a canal. The body was found next day weighted down with a hitching weight. The first clue to the identity of the murderer was furnished by a Jersey liverman, who identified a photograph of Young as the man to whom he had hired a rig the day before and who also identified the hitching strap and weight as his property. A visit to the Young apartments furnished ample evidence of the commission of the crime. About the same time the Chicago police discovered a trunk which had been shipped to that city by Young and which contained the dead woman's clothes and valuables. For two or three days the New York police scoured the city in search of the young man. Before the end of the week he had been captured in Connecticut in the disguise of a tramp. It is alleged that he made a full confession to the police, but implicated another person in the actual murder. The authorities, however, refused to credit the story of an accomplice, as all the evidence tended to show that Young alone committed the crime and hid the body.

The relatives of the accused, who are leaders in the Mormon church, will bring to his defense all that their wealth and influence can command. The finding in Young's room of writings and Biblical quotations on "blood atonement" has suggested that the

300,000 ACRES NEAR AMARILLO NOW ON THE MARKET

SMALL STOCK FARMERS

These Are Taking the Place of the Big Ranchmen—The Mill Iron Property, It is Said, Will Be Cut Up—It Is Owned by the Continental Land and Cattle Company

AMARILLO, Tex., Jan. 16. — The Potter county grand jury adjourned last Thursday, after being in session for six weeks. They reported six felony cases and seventy-five misdemeanor cases, this being an unusual number for this county.

All the Panhandle counties which have held local option elections during the past year have gone dry with one exception, that being Dallam, the county in which Dalhart is located.

The largest ranches in the Panhandle are being put on the market and sold to small ranchmen and stock farmers. It is estimated that there are three hundred thousand acres of land contiguous to the Choctaw railroad, between here and the Oklahoma line, that are now on the open market.

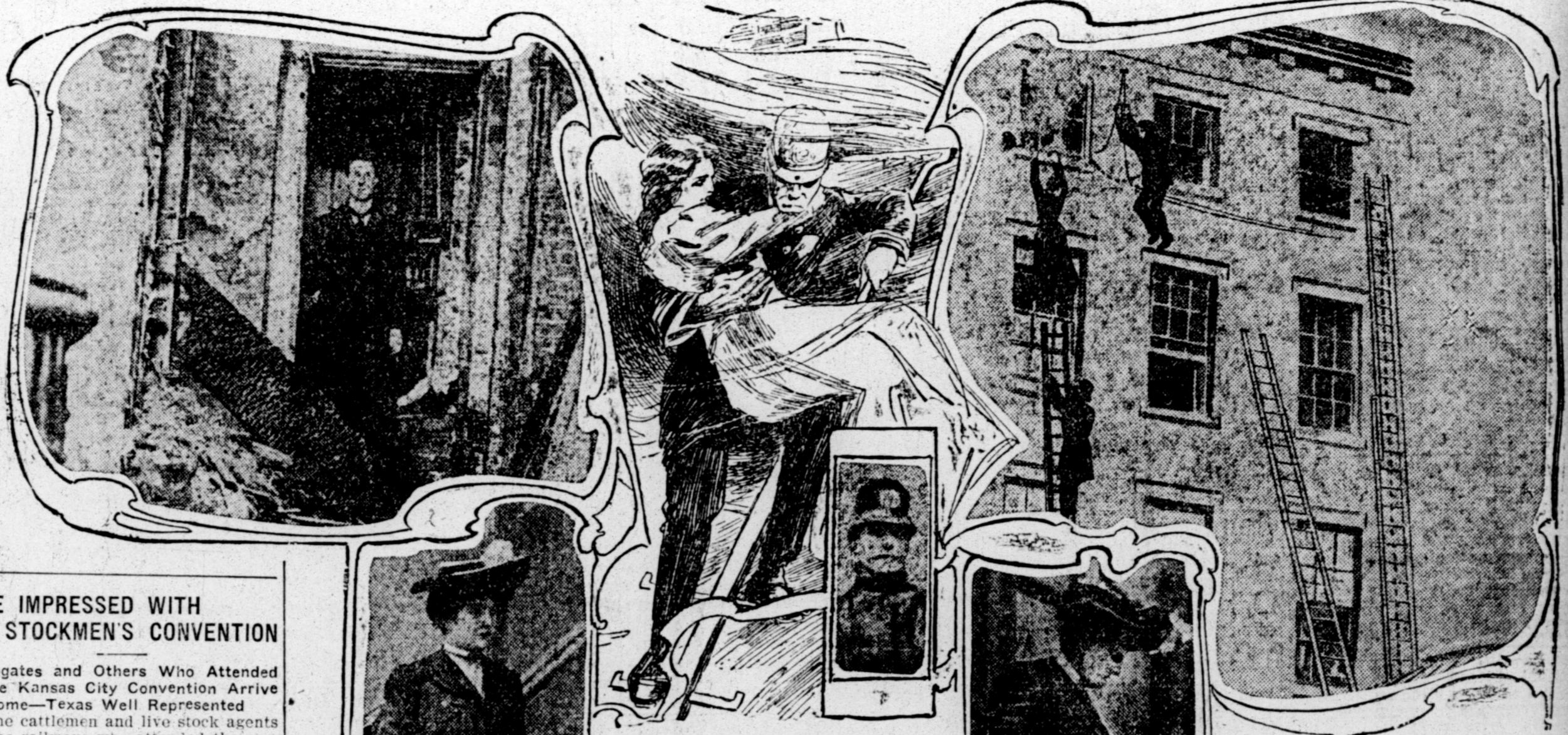

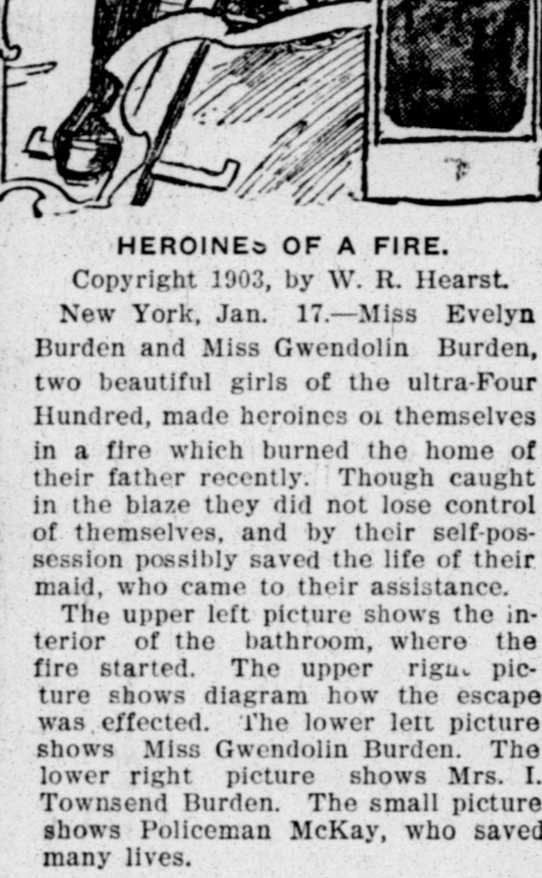
