NOT ONE KILLED BY ENGLISH RAILROADS

London and Southwestern Railroad, H. W. Campbell remarked that if the company did not adopt American methods it was simply because what was conomy in one country would be rank extravagance in the other. The officials had experimented with large freight cars and they were found quite unsuited for their requirements.

Regarding the passenger traffic, Mr. Campbell said, while the length of the railroads in the United States was nine times greater than those of Great Britain, the latter carried twice as many passengers, or about eighteen times as many per mile of railroad.

The returns of accidents, Mr. Campbell further remarked, were considered unusually instructive. Not a single passenger was killed in Great Britain during 1901, whue 249 were killed in the United States that year, and 476 passengers were injured in Great Britain in 1901, against 4,129 injured in that year in the United States.







Speculation Rife Regarding Changes to Be Made-Talk of Transfers Among Higher Officials-Object is to Save Expenses. Rock Island Will Be Saved Cost of

Fort Worth railroad men believe the report from New York that the Rock Island has secured from the Southern Pacific a half interest in the Houston and Texas Central. As a result they expect soon to see evidences of Rock Island control, and a number of changes among the higher officials of the last named line will

That the Rock Island should secure the Houston and Texas Central is natural, they say, because then the Moores would have their line to Galveston. Should the Rock Island build such a line it would probably parallel the Houston and Texas Central and would be a useless expense

if the latter can be secured. along," said a railroad man. "There have even been several rumors that the deal was completed, but the report from New York yesterday seems to be the most authentic yet.'

Houston and Texas Central men, in particular, are speculating as to the efect that the deal will have. They beleve there will be a few changes among the higher officials, but fust what they will be they do not venture to forecast.

"High officials are expensive men," said a railroad man, "and the fewer of them a system can have the more it can save. switchmen are all asking more pay and the railroads are slowly granting their demands. They have got to make up in ome way, and cutting down the number of high officials is at least one way. That's one reason for these consolidations.
