CLAY SPEAKS OF INJUSTICE TO CITIZENS

GEORGIA SENATOR ON THE SUBJECT OF COURT MAR-TIAL OF SOLDIERS

(By Associated Press.) Washington, Feb. 10.-In the senate Monday Mr. Carmack spoke on the Rawlins resolution calling on the secretary of war for certain courtsmartial. He charged that murders in the Philippines by soldiers had become so common that they would bear investigation, and that their answer was entirely satisfactory to "our noble, generous and humane secretary of war."

He also criticised the president for "never having heard of the Captain Brownell case, after having announced his intention of probing crimes in the Philippines."

Mr. Kean spoke on the statehood bill for a short time, when he yielded to various senators who indulged in dehate over the question of the influence of the Mormon church on politics.

Mr. Elikins also spoke at length in defense of the claims of New Mexico to statehood. He read the Republican and Democratic platform; praised the Democrats for trying to keep their pledges, while the Republicans, he said, had not been able to keep faith nor discharge their obligations with respect to statehood.

Mr. Elkins declared that the national conventions interpret the wishes of political parties and not those of individuals. The thirty-three Democrats and seventeen or eighteen Republicans, he said, favored the omnibus bill, while thirty-eight Republicans opposed it. and he wanted to show that the minority was obstructing the passage of the

Mr. Clay of Georgia likewise decared an injustice was being done the people of Arizona and New Mexico on account of the statements made regarding their Mormon population. At the present time he said there were about 1300 Mormons in New Mexico. and 6500 in Arizona, while, according to the census of 1890, Idaho had 14,972 and Utah 118,201. He believed it was wrong to charge the people of New Mexico with being repudiationists. polygamistic and ignorant. If given the opportunity, he said, they would present the identical constitution prepared by them in 1889, declaring against bigamy and polygamy.

FIFTEEN SLAIN IN THOUSAND CONSTABLES

TWO HUNDRED FILIPINOS DE-FEATED JUST OUTSIDE OF MANILA

(By Associated Press.)

Manila, Feb. 10.-A force of 100 constables under Inspector Keithly Sunday defeated 200 insurgents near Mariquina, seven miles from Manila, after a severe engagement in which Inspector Harris and one man of the constabulary were killed and two other men of the constabulary were wounded. The enemy left fifteen dead and three wounded. Inspector Harris' home was at Atlanta, Ga.

The body of insurgents formed the main force of the irreconciliable General San Miguel. The constabulary was divided into three detachments which were scouting in the Maraquina valley. The detachment commanded by Inspector Harris came upon the enemy Inspector Harris came upon the enemy, who were in a strongly intrenched position. Inspector Harris fell at the detachment of constabulary, although out numbered, held its position until Inspector Keithly with the main force arrived, when the enemy were put to rout. Their headquarters was captured and burned and the constabulary seized the records of General San Miguel, who asserts that he succeeded to the command of the insurrectionary forces when the other generals surrendered. He has only a handful of men under him and his operations have been of no consequences. The wounded Americans are all severely injured.






