### Holiday calendar

#### Free breakfast

Dimmitt merchants will once again be giving a free breakfast and displaying Christmas gift ideas at the annual Merchants' Christmas Breakfast, set for Saturday in the Castro County Expo Building. The breakfast menu of eggs, sausage, biscuits, juice, coffee and donuts will be served from 7:30 to 9:30 a.m. Booths displaying mer-

chandise from over 13 different businesses in town will be open until 11:30 a.m. "There is no charge for the meal, which is being donated by the merchants," said Chamber of Commerce Manager Dolores Heller. "We are asking that members of the chamber come down early Saturday to help prepare the food."

#### Nazareth bazaar

Sunday in Nazareth there will be an arts and crafts bazaar and a Thanksgiving dinner. The Nazareth Art Club will have its annual Arts and Crafts Bazaar from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the school cafeteria. Twenty-two booths will have displays ranging from woodcraft to pillows. Other items will include wood carvings, paintings, stuffed toys, covered baskets, home-baked goods and stitchery such as bibs, aprons and needle-

work. The cafeteria will open at 9:30 a.m. for set up of booths. Also Sunday, the Nazareth Christian Mothers Society will have a Thanksgiving dinner in the Nazareth Community Hall, with serving set for 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Meal prices will be \$4 for adults and \$2.50 for children under 12. The menu will include turkey and dressing, salad, vegetables and homemade pies.

The annual Community Praise Service sponsored by the Castro County Ministerial Alliance will be held Tuesday at 7 p.m. in the sanctuary of the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt. ## Runners win state

A "team effort" meant a team title Saturday for the Nazareth cross country team.

The Swiftettes ran their best times ever, placed five runners in the top 20, and won the Class 3A-2A-1A team crown in the UIL Cross Country State Meet in Georgetown.

"The key to the win," said Nazareth coach Joe Lombard, "was that we had so many runners bunched up together, everyone ran together as a team. It was really a team effort."

The Swiftettes had a team total of 27 points, followed by second place Yoakum with 67. Medina Valley was third with 91 points, and Abernathy finished fourth with 112. Leona Gerber paced the Swiftettes with an 11th place finish in 12:44. Shari Schilling ran 15th in 12:50, and Renee Ramaekers was 16th in 12:51. Debbie Schmucker and CeCe Kern finished 19th and 20th, respectively, both with a time of 12:53.

Swiftettes Gail Birkenfeld and Kelly Schilling finished 34th and 35th, respectively.

Lombard said this was the first meet in which all his runners clocked in under 13:00.

"They all ran their best times," he said. "Looking at times before the meet, two or three schools had better times than us, our kids just performed real well."

Nazareth won the regional cross country team title Nov. 5, by placing five runners in the top 20 for a point total of 48.

Gerber finished 5th in the regional meet with a time of 12:51. Shari Schilling finished 11th, Ramaekers 12th, Schmucker 14th, and Birkenfeld 17th.

The state championship caps off a perfect year for the Swiftette harriers. They won team titles in every meet they participated in this season, including meets at Amarillo and Plainview where they competed against mostly 5A schools.

## Dimmitt school board accepts audit report

The Dimmitt school board Monday night accepted a bid, voted to ask for bids on another project, accepted the annual audit report and appointed a textbook committee.

The audit report showed that the Dimmitt Independent School District has, as of Aug. 31, total assets of \$9,768,585 and total liabilities of \$1,178,348. Total revenues and expenditures were up from the balances shown in August 1982. Revenues were \$4,914,767 and expenditures equaled \$4,659,129.

The audit revealed that \$100,707 in taxes is delinquent from the 1982 tax roll, with a total of \$278,803

in taxes delinquent from the time the school district started.

#### Western Auto to close here

Walter Spinhirne announced this week that his Western Auto Store in Dimmitt will go out of business later this month, a victim of the farm economy and recession. Spinhirne said Nov. 26 will be the last business day for the Western Auto dealership which he started here in 1972.

He said his future plans are not definite, "but we plan on staying in Dimmitt if we can."

"About 40 percent of the delinquent taxes will be collected within the second year they are delinquent," DISD Business Manager Gene King told the board.

## Swifts meet Wheeler in Bi-district game

The Nazareth Swifts, coming off their best game of the year, travel to Memphis Friday night to face the Wheeler Mustangs in a Class A Bi-District football match-up. The Swifts and Mustangs each sport 9-1 records coming into the game.

Nazareth earned the right to advance in the state playoffs with a 33-14 slaughtering of the Sundown Roughnecks Saturday.

The McLean Tigers fell victim to an explosive Wheeler offensive attack led by Darren Grimes, who scored on runs of 59 and 24 yards for Wheeler. The Mustangs prevailed 34-6 in the contest Friday night.

"They are a big team," said Nazareth coach Ken Cole. "They play very physical football and they are strong up the middle. Their defense is probably a little better than their offense."

Once again fans can expect to witness a defensive game Friday night. Cole believes his team has come a long way this season. "We have developed a momentum that has helped us in the last three or four weeks. We have improved a little each week. Sundown was the best game that we have played this season."

The Swifts amassed a total of 385 yards on offense against Sundown and forced seven turnovers. Last week's Harris Rating System ranked Nazareth 22nd and Wheeler 16th.

Nazareth won its first ever playoff game in 11 man football with the victory over Sundown. Friday's Bi-district clash is set for 7:30 p.m.

## Dimmitt man, 2 youths injured in accidents

A Dimmitt man and two youths were injured this week in accidents.

Holden Bland was listed in good condition Tuesday, in Lubbock Methodist Hospital, following a fall from the roof of a house last Thursday afternoon in Dimmitt.

Justin Roberts, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Roberts, was listed in satisfactory condition at St. Anthony's Hospital Tuesday. He was hit by a truck Friday while crossing Bedford Street.

Esquel Parrar, 4, was treated and released Saturday at Plains Memorial Hospital, after being hit by a pickup in the 100 block of S. Broadway.

Bland slipped and fell from a roof last Thursday onto a cement driveway. He was draining an air conditioner on the roof at 806 W. Bedford. While climbing onto the roof, his

Goodpasture Inc. of Dimmitt will re-open for "turnaround" on Nov. 28, with production scheduled to start in early January.

"Turnaround" is a plant overhaul, which is required annually for efficient operation of the equipment, said plant manager Owen K. "Pete" Stewart.

"We will recall all who were laid off (in early August), when we re-open on Nov. 28," Stewart said. "For those who don't return, we will hire to fill

their positions." Goodpasture laid off 35 workers in early August and kept on a crew of eight persons until inventory could be reduced enough to resume production.

The plant will resume full production in early January of its products, nitrogen fertilizer solutions.

"I really don't know how many of our original workers may come back. Some of them don't know themselves. We won't know until the 28th for sure."

## Grain release is approved

A House-Senate conference committee approved a plan Tuesday to release federally-owned grain to drought stricken ranchers.

"It got through Congress," said Carl King of the Texas Corn Growers Association. "It has one hurdle left. Reagan has to sign the bill."

King said he felt Secretary of Agriculture John Block would urge President Reagan to sign the bill.

The legislation to release the grain was tacked onto the 1983 dairy price support bill. The grain release plan was the most argued issue in the eight hour meeting Tuesday.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and Sen. Jesse Helms, chairman of the Senate conferees, refused to accept the Jones amendment on transportation Tuesday, King said. That amendment would have forced

the government to pay transportation costs on the grain, which was estimated would cost \$75 to \$80 million.

Farmers who buy the grain will have to pay transportation, but they will be allowed to buy the grain at 75 percent of the loan rate or about \$2 per bushel, plus a discount for low grade grain.

Two local elevator operators said as far as they knew, there is no grain in Castro County which would go to the ranchers if the measure is approved.

"Mainly 26 million bushels in Plainview," King said he felt would be sold to the ranchers first.

"Hopefully, Reagan will give some indication as to what he will do by the end of this week or the first of next," King said.

If the President signs the bill the grain should be released immediately.

## Byrnes adds Chrysler, unveils volume plan

Stan Byrnes Motor Co., Dimmitt Ford dealership, this week also became the authorized Chrysler Corp. dealer for a territory that includes both the Dimmitt and Hereford trade areas.

At the same time, owner Stan Byrnes unveiled a new marketing program which he hopes will make him the highest-volume car dealer in the Panhandle-Plains region.

Known as the "49 Over" plan, the new sales program will market all vehicles — regardless of size or price — for \$49 over factory invoice.

Byrnes is announcing the new sales program in a regional newspaper today, including the Amarillo and Lubbock dailies.

To carry out the sales program, Byrnes is increasing his sales staff from three to 10, and is installing dealer-direct

phone numbers in Lubbock and Amarillo and toll-free 800 numbers for Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Byrnes said the "49 Over" program, which combines concepts used in personal-contact, mail-order and phone-sales marketing, is aimed mainly at the person who plans ahead when buying a new car. The program's success, he said, will depend on high-volume sales and dealer savings in inventory costs.

"Most of our sales will be by custom order, with a six to eight-week delivery time," he said. "This will cut our floor-plan cost (the interest paid on unbought cars in inventory)."

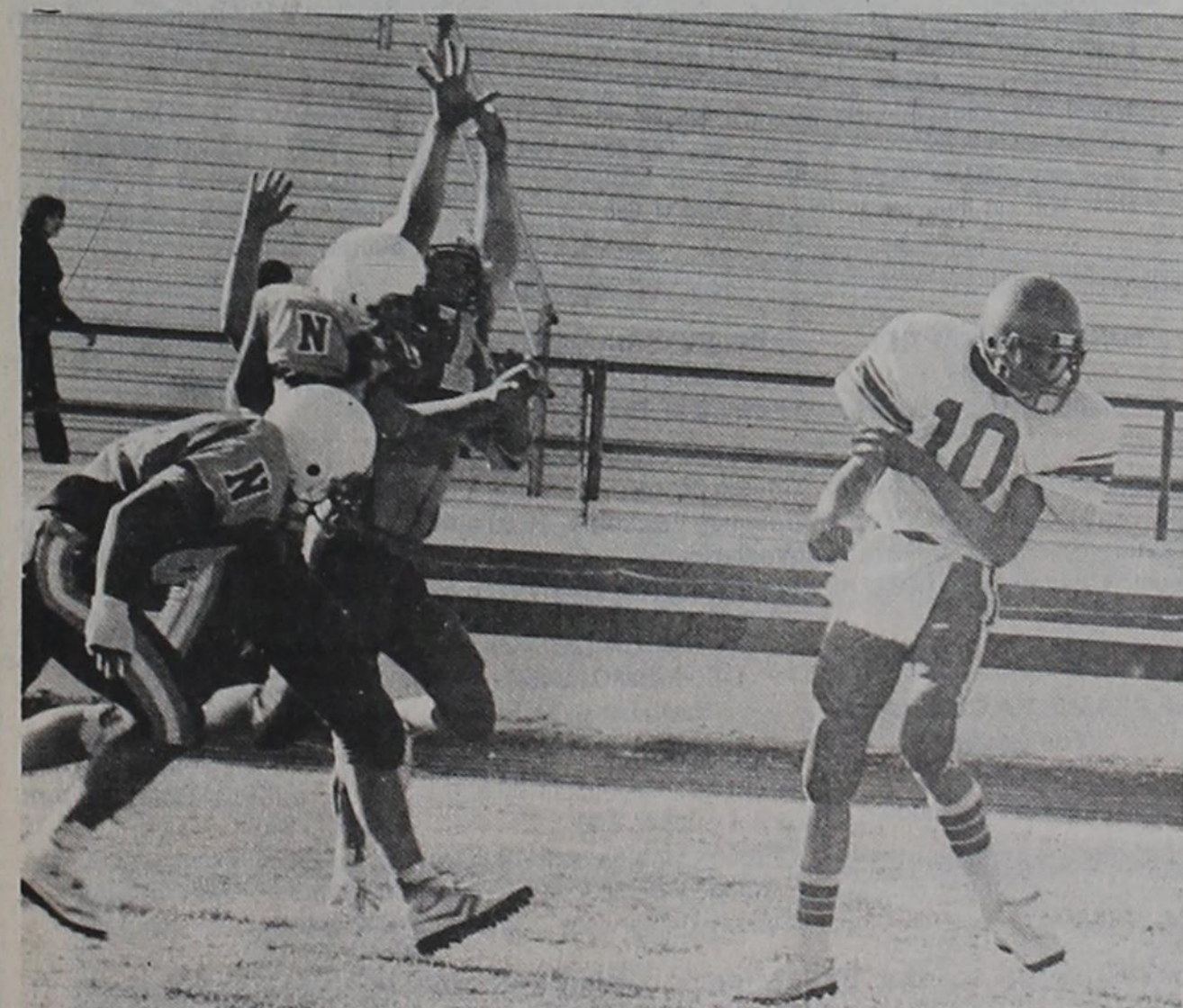

**Nine make All-Regional Choir**

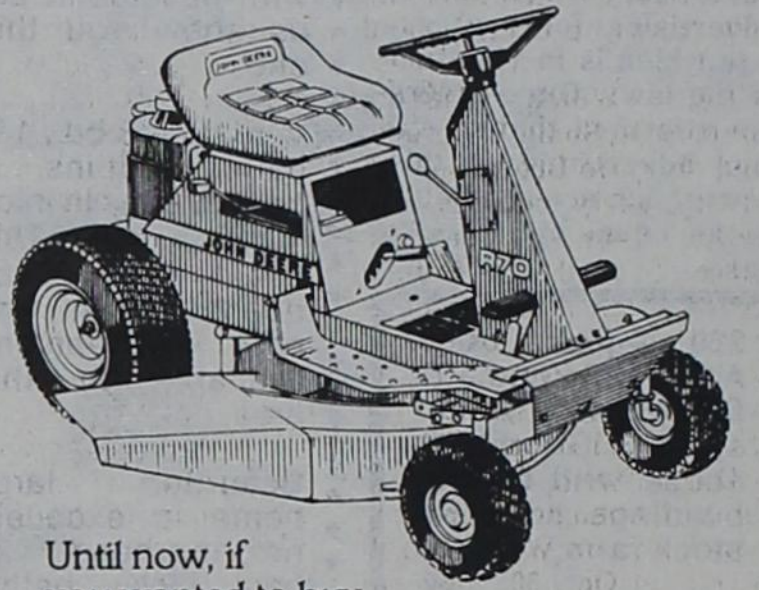

Ordinance No. 386 also states that if the property owner fails to abate this problem within ten (10) days of the 2nd publication of this notice (within a ten (10) day period in any newspaper in Dimmitt, Texas, the City of Dimmitt may take appropriate action to abate this problem, and it further states that all expenses associated with this abatement may be assessed to the property or real estate in question. The City of Dimmitt is hereby taking this opportunity to fulfill its legal requirements in accordance with the terms and conditions of City Ordinance No. 386. The City of Dimmitt will take appropriate action to resolve this problem in a timely manner.

## Swifts smother Sundown in zone playoff

The underdog Nazareth Swifts turned seven Sundown turnovers into a 33-14 shellacking of the previously unbeaten Roughnecks in a Class 1A Zone playoff game Saturday in Plainview.

The Swifts, underdogs by 2, 8 and 10 points in three polls, converted four Roughneck bobbles into scores and were leading 33-0 early in the fourth quarter. The Swifts second team finished out the game allowing two Roughneck touchdowns.

The stalwart Swift defense forced four fumbles and three interceptions as they held the Roughnecks to 205 yards, 145 yards below their average.

Chris Gerber led the Swift offensive attack as he rushed for 109 yards and two touchdowns.

The first quarter was a defensive battle with Nazareth getting only two first downs and 22 yards offensively. Sundown was only able to garner one first down.

The turning point of the

game came about at the 9:39 mark in the second quarter. Nazareth's Billy Huseman recovered an Andy Emory fumble at the Swifts own 33 yard line. Nazareth's offense still wasn't clicking and they were forced to punt it back.

Tragedy struck the Roughnecks again with 7:49 remaining in the half. Sidney Gerber became the recipient of an errant Rocky Winn pass. Gerber's interception gave the Swifts possession on Sundown's 32 yard line. Nazareth's scoring drive was thwarted when Rocky Boaz picked off a Johnny Schmucker pass in the endzone.

Sundown wasn't allowed to celebrate for too long, however. On the ensuing play, Chris Gerber picked off another Winn pass with 4:05 left in the half. A yellow flag thrown at the spot of the interception had the Swifts worried, but the infraction was offensive interference. Nazareth took possession at midfield. Chris Gerber picked up a quick 10 yards to set up Nazareth's first score which he would also get. With just under 2:00 left in the half, Gerber ran 10 yards for the touchdown. Johnny Schmucker nailed the PAT to give the Swifts a 7-0 lead.

On Sundown's first play of the next possession, quarterback Winn was stripped of the football by Nazareth's Francis Kern.

Billy Steffens fell on the ball and then Schmucker and Company came out to operate on the Roughneck defense again. Schmucker connected with Ricky Backus for a 32 yard gain down to the Roughneck 13. Eric Wilhelm took over and wound up in the endzone to give the Swifts a 14-0 lead after Schmucker added the PAT. The time remaining in the half was 1:20.

Nazareth's defensive domination continued as Wilhelm picked off a third Winn pass with :09 remaining in the half. Schmucker completed a pass to Sid Gerber with :04

left, and then attempted a 28-yard field goal, but it was wide to the left. The score at the half remained Nazareth 14, Sundown 0.

Sundown lost the ball for the sixth time in the game when Ricky Backus recovered a fumble early in the third period. Three plays later Chris Gerber raced 37 yards for the score. Schmucker again hit the PAT and the score was 21-0.

Francis Kern forced the seventh turnover of the game when he fell on a fumble to give the Swifts possession on their own 32 yard line. The third quarter ended with Nazareth on the Roughneck's 4

yard line threatening to score. Five seconds into the final period, the Swift threat turned into a reality as Johnny Schmucker exploded up the middle for a 4-yard touchdown run, extending Nazareth's lead to 27-0.

Roger Schulte gave the Swifts their final score when he rushed 27 yards for the touchdown with 9:00 left, to give the Swifts a comfortable 33-0 lead.

Sundown's only points were scored when Nazareth's second team defense was playing. The first tally came with 4:50 to play. Winn hit Jerry

O'Briant with a 12 yard toss in the endzone. Jaime Villarreal added the PAT to narrow the deficit to 33-7.

The Roughnecks attempted an onside kick, but it did not go the required 10 yards, and Nazareth took over on their own 42. Sid Gerber took over at the helm for the Swifts and maneuvered his team down to the three, but an illegal motion penalty put the possibility of another 6 points out of reach.

Andy Emory gave the Roughneck's their final score as he outran everyone for a 79-yard touch-

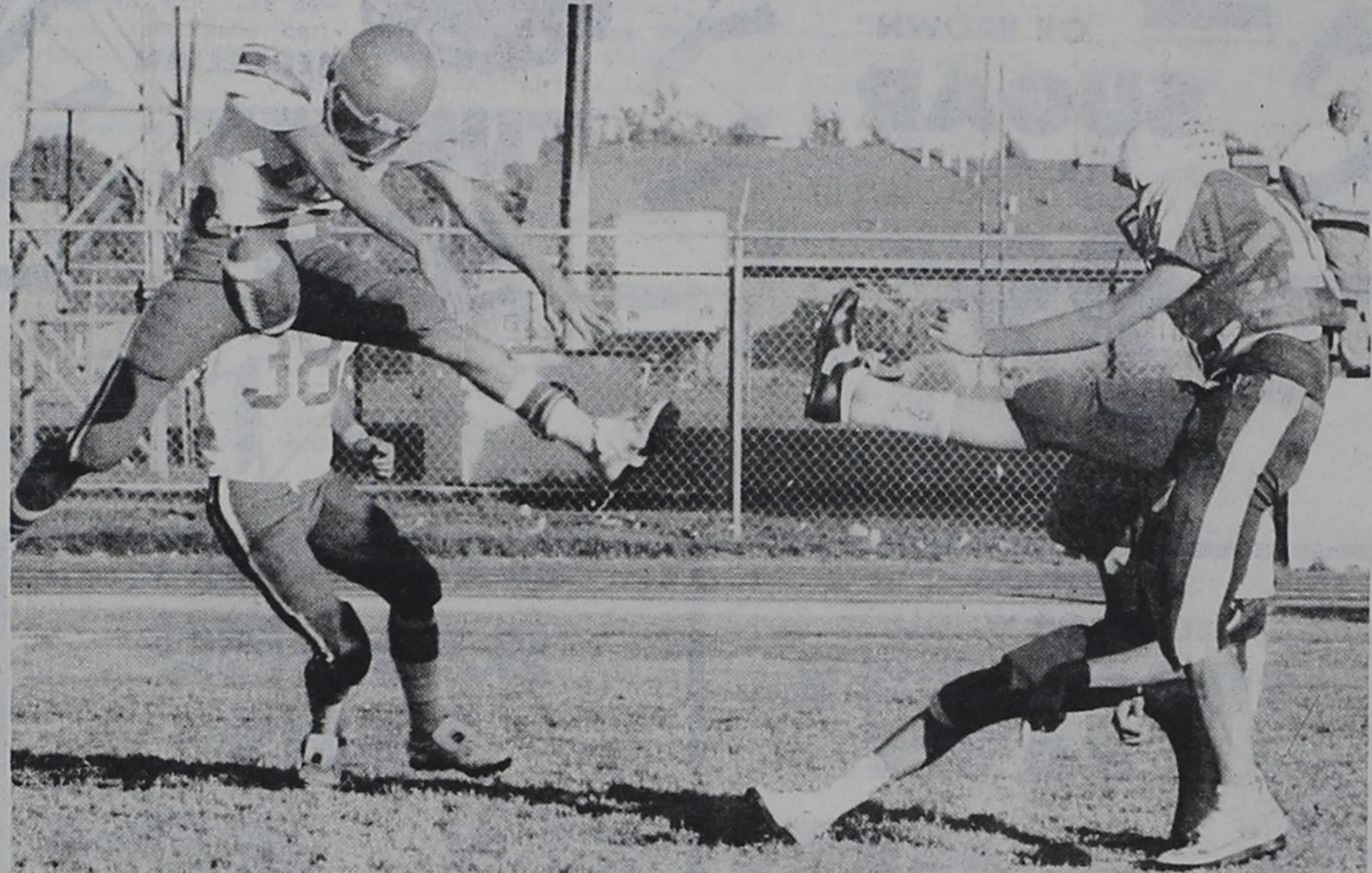
down. Villarreal added the PAT to make the final score 33-14.

"I was very pleased with the way the team played," said Nazareth coach Ken Cole. "I believe this was the best game overall that we've played this season."

According to Cole, "Sundown just was not prepared for the level of play we presented."

Nazareth improved their record to 9-1 and Sundown finished the season at 10-1. The Swifts will travel to Memphis Friday night to face the Wheeler Mustangs in a Bi-District matchup at 7:30 p.m.

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
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# Basketball preview

"We lost five seniors last year, but I feel like we will have some good ones to replace them," McDonald said. "And the juniors are going to be a coachable group."

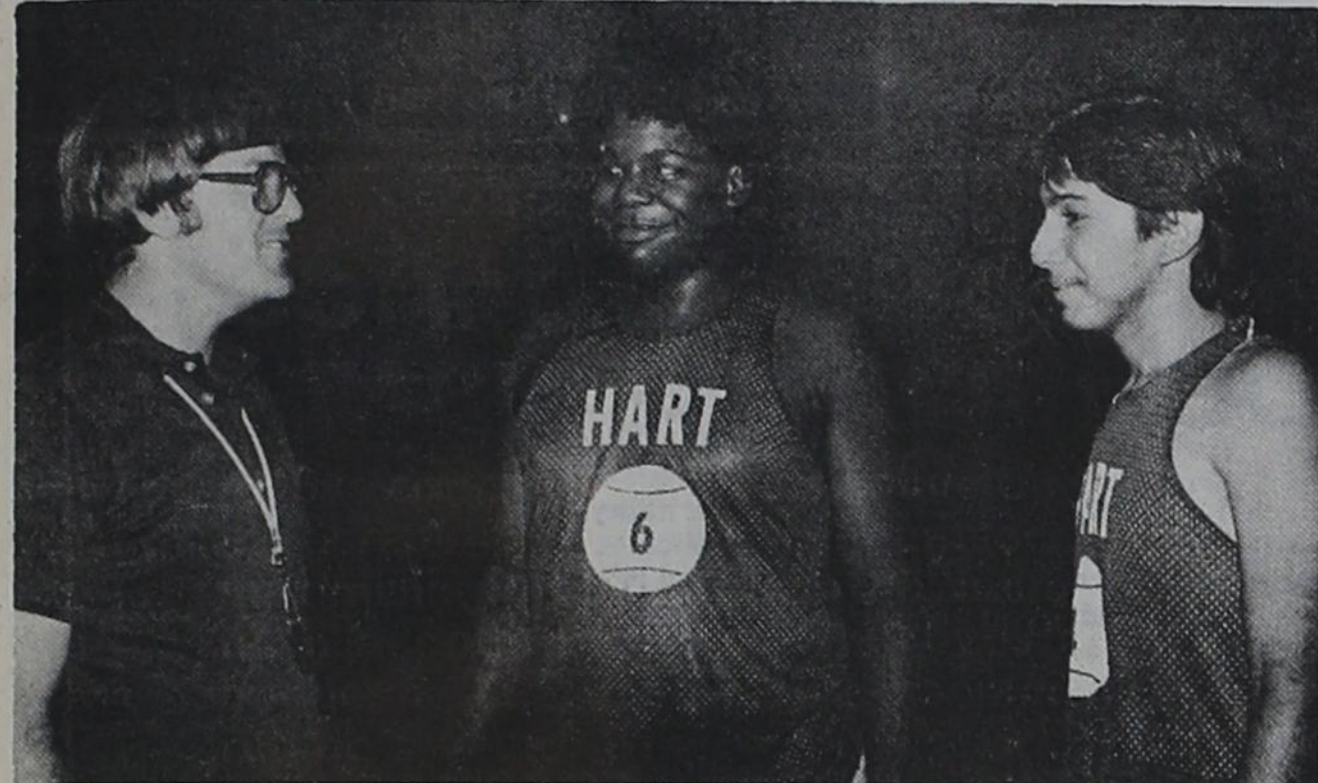

Ramos ranked 27th overall in the three-mile race with a time of 25:11.

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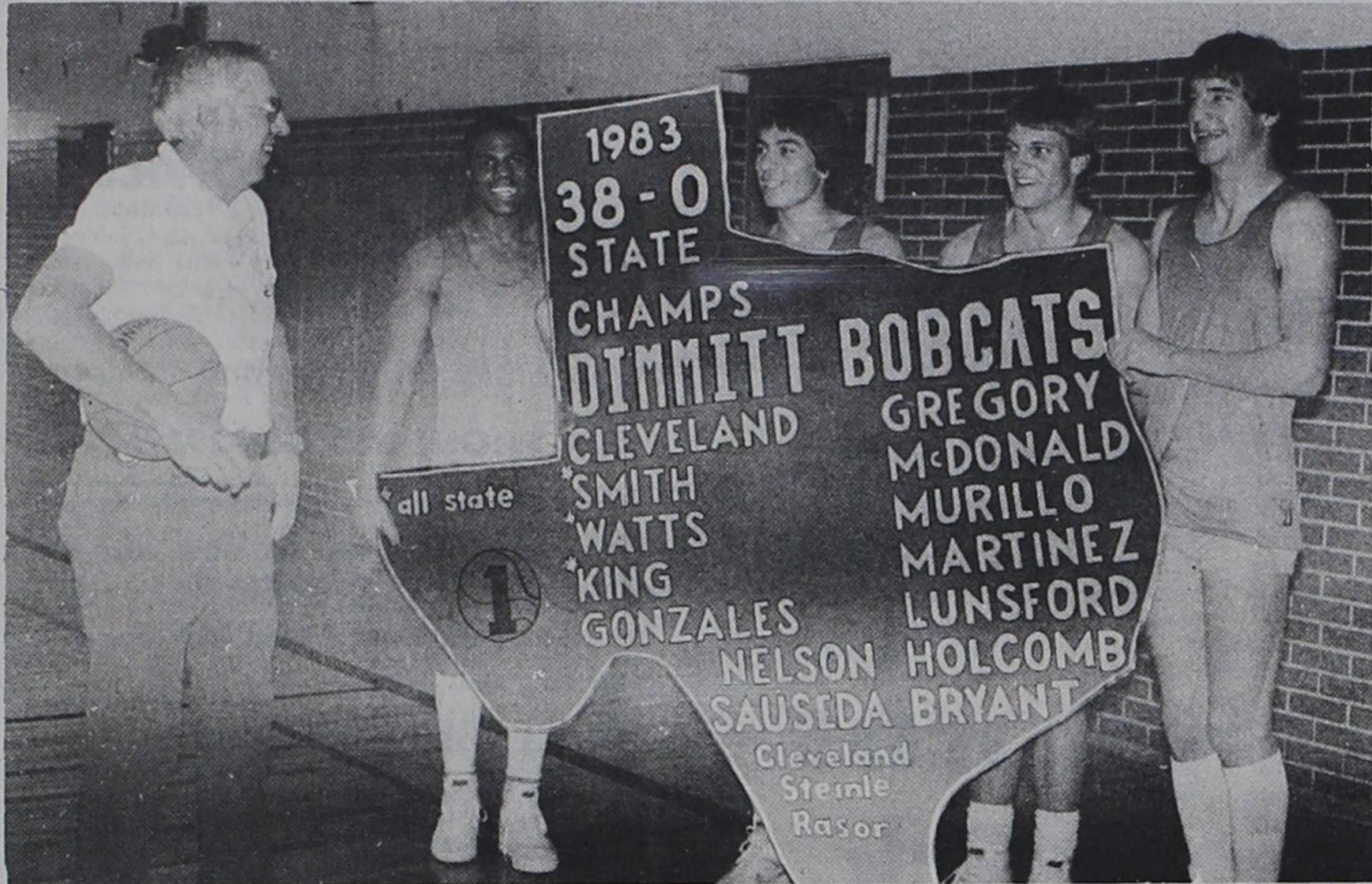

## Bobcats: a 'new' bunch

During the Bobcats' first few games, Dimmitt fans may need a program to tell the players.

The Awesome Bunch of 1982-83 is history. Gone is the bumper crop of seniors that posted a 38-0 record last year while winning a second consecutive state championship — Kevin Cleveland, Fermin Gonzales, John King, Keith Smith, Jeff Watts, Keith Gregory, Steve Lunsford, Tony Martinez and Robert Murillo. Five of them were all-district and four were all-state.

While every other team in the district has three or four starters back, Dimmitt has only four squadmen (no starters) return-

ing from last year. They are senior guards Dwight McDonald and Richard Sauseda, senior post Brad Holcomb and junior forward Nathan Nelson.

So, for Coach Kenneth Cleveland and his Bobcats, it's a whole new ball game.

But Cleveland says he's looking forward to it.

"Last year was just one of those years that you have maybe once in a lifetime," Cleveland said. "I'm ready to get this season started. We've got a good bunch of kids, and it ought to be a lot of fun."

The Bobcats will open their season Tuesday night when they host the Class AA defending state champion Morton Indians

in the Middle School gym. The varsity boys' game will begin at 8, following the 6:30 varsity girls' contest.

Cleveland said his varsity roster "is definitely unsettled at this stage."

"We are in the rebuilding stage, and there are many positions wide open," he said. "The varsity squad will be composed mainly of last year's JV team and some promising sophomores."

Twenty-three boys are vying for varsity positions — eight seniors, six juniors and nine sophomores.

That's a shorter crop than normal here.

Cleveland will carry a minimum of 10 and a maximum of 15 on his varsity squad.

"I'd like to split them up with 12 on the varsity and 11 on the JV, so more kids can get 27 games or more of experience," he said.

This year's seniors include Sauseda (5-11 guard), McDonald (5-9 guard), Robby Hottel (6-2 post), Nick Martinez (5-10 guard), Robert Nelson (5-9 guard), Scott Lane (6-2 post), Scott Simpson (6-0 forward) and Brad Holcomb (6-2 post). Hottel, Martinez, Nelson and Holcomb were starters on last year's JV.

Juniors vying for varsity spots are Nathan Nelson (6-0 forward), Mike Love (6-0 forward), Danny Martinez (5-11 guard), Darrell Washington (6-2 post), Joe Alvarez (5-6 guard) and Ray Cameron (5-9 guard). Nelson was a JV starter last year, and Love and Martinez were among the team's scoring leaders.

Sophomore hopefuls are 6-2 post Pat McDonald, 5-11 guard Woody Glass, 5-8 guard Blake Brown, 6-0 forward Mark Smothermon, 5-11 forward Todd Braafladt, 5-11 forward

Cruz Arce, 5-8 guard Matt Davis, 5-4 guard Tod Bradley and 5-9 guard Leo Vera.

Cleveland is using pre-season scrimmages to try to get a "fix" on his varsity roster, "and I'd hate to even make a guess at this point as to who our starters will be," he said.

The boys scrimmaged Amarillo Tascosa Saturday and will scrimmage Amarillo High and Borger at Amarillo High School gym Friday afternoon at 3:30 (instead of Saturday morning, as originally scheduled).

"We really got our money's worth going over there (to Tascosa)," Cleveland said. "It answered a lot of questions for me, and showed me a lot of things that we needed to work on."

He added, "I was well pleased with the effort. Our kids scrapped. That's the kind of team we're going to have this year."

The Bobcats will need all the scrappiness they can muster — especially when the District 2-AAA race begins. Regional runner-up Abernathy has four starters back, as do Tulia and Muleshoe, while Littlefield and Friona return three starters apiece.

Top 'o Texas Basketball Magazine has picked the Bobcats to finish fourth in the district this year, behind Abernathy, Littlefield and Tulia. Dimmitt fans don't believe it, though. No Bobcat team has finished lower than second in the district in 25 years.

"Although our team will be short on experience, they'll be playing on a lot of tradition and determination," Cleveland said.

## Bobbies' new mentor has experienced squad

Dimmitt's Bobbies begin their 1983-84 season with a lot of promise. But they face a murderous schedule.

They've got five players back who started either part or all of last year's games. Yet they're a young team, with five juniors and two sophomores on the 12-player varsity.

Guiding the Bobbies this year is Lyman Schroeder, who moved up to the head

coach's post when Jimmy Hoyle went to Perryton. Assisting Schroeder are Ken Nordell and Debbie Curlee.

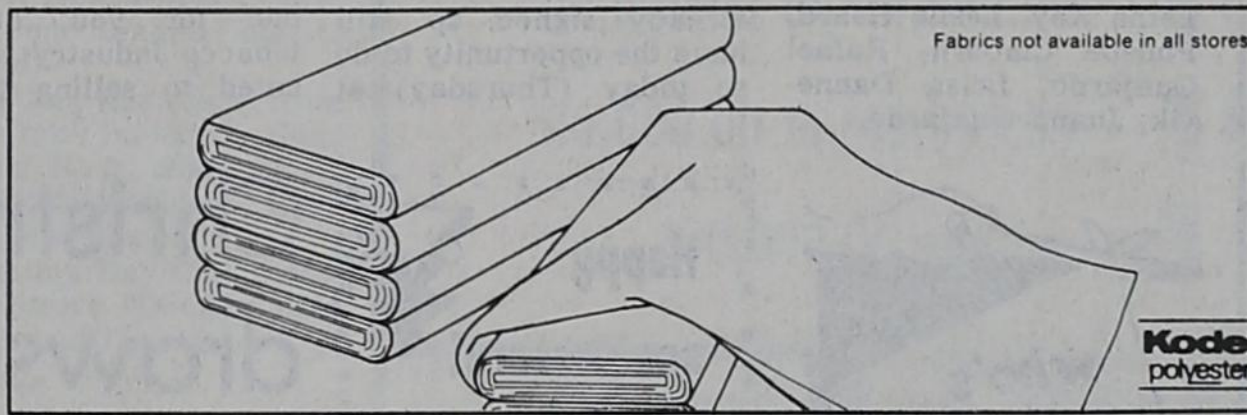

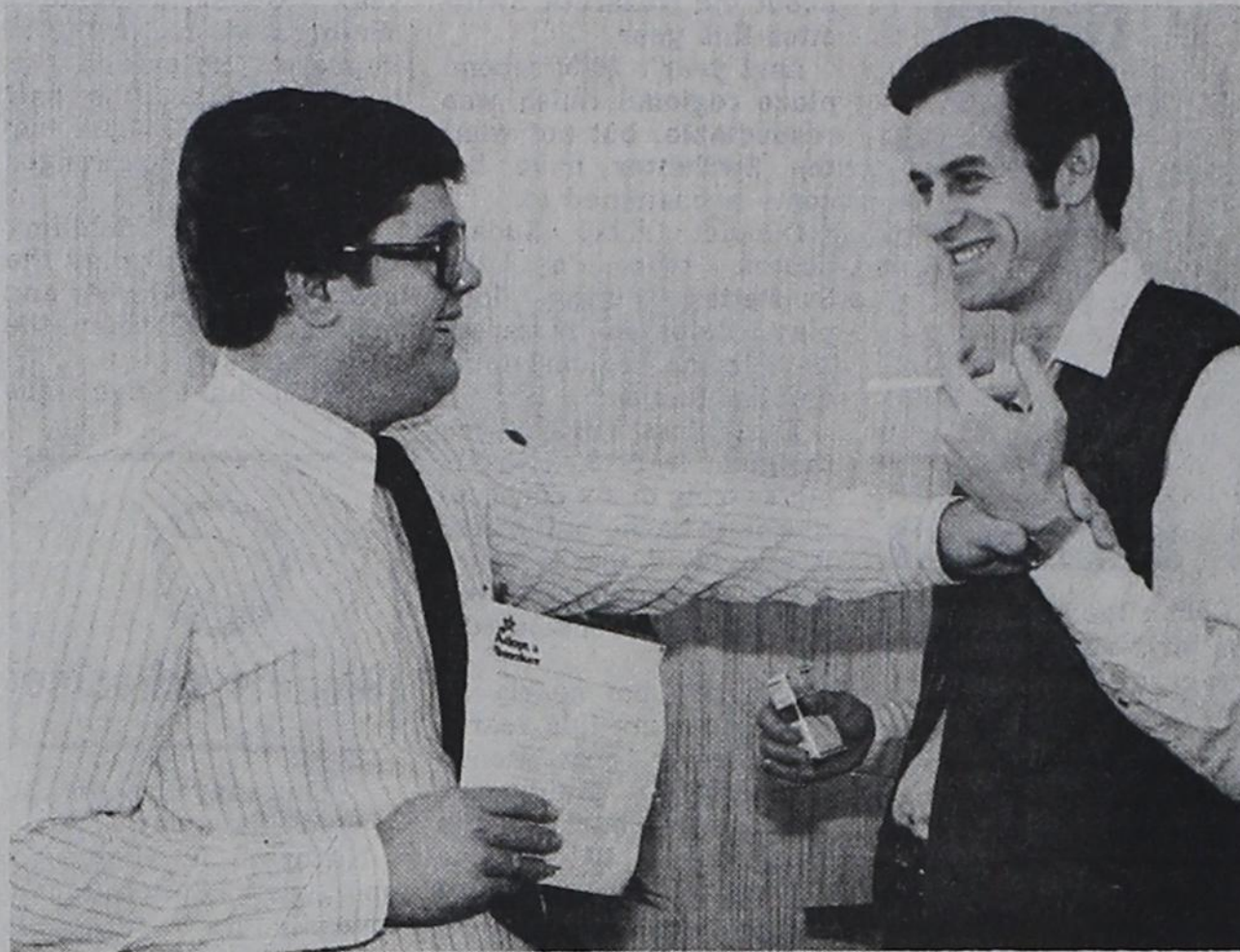

### Insects of interest

## Cedar beetles swarm in fall

Many large chestnut brown or black beetles have been flying around area trees and yards for several weeks. Although called cedar beetles, these insects can be seen on almost any kind of tree.

Large numbers of these crawling, flying, buzzing beetles may appear threatening to people, trees or lawns. Actually these harmless beetles, about 3/4-inch long, are beneficial. The larval stage lives as a parasite on cicadas in the soil. Cicadas, or "locusts," damage twigs of young trees and shrubs in late summer. For every cedar beetle in your yard, there was one less pesky cicada this summer.

Cedar beetles emerge from the soil in the fall. They often swarm on trees to mate and lay eggs in crevices in tree bark. Eggs hatch into tiny grubs

that tunnel into the ground in search of a cicada larvae on which to feed.

Very little is known about cedar beetles. They are a rare insect in the U.S. Our area seems blessed with an abundance of this helpful insect. Although cedar beetles will never eradicate cicadas, think how many more cicadas we would have if it weren't for cedar beetles.

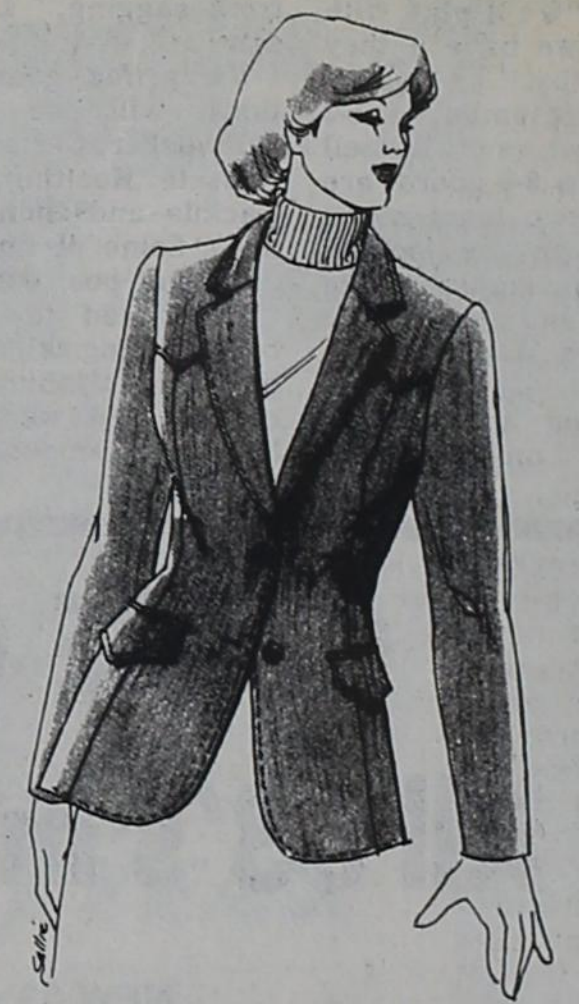

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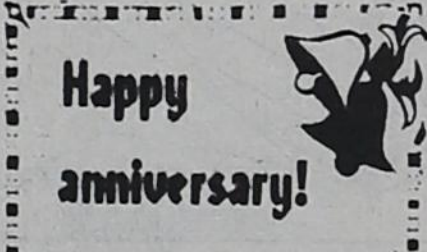

"We did better than I expected to do, though,"

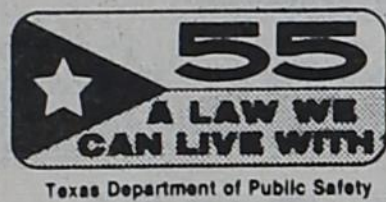

## Emergency loan program renewed

The economic emergency loan program which was in effect from 1978 to 1981 is being reopened by the Farmers Home Administration, probably before the end of this year. These economic emergency (EE) loans are meant for farmers who are

in financial trouble through no fault of their own. They differ from the natural disaster program for farmers in designated counties who have suffered severe production losses.

Economic emergency loans will be available to farmers who are in financial difficulty beyond their control, have tried unsuccessfully to get a loan from other sources

and who can repay the loan over a period of time. Funds from these EE loans may be used to finance 1984 crop production, to pay overdue farm and family operating debts or for other related uses. An economist emergency loan to any one borrower cannot exceed \$400,000.

For direct loans where FmHA lends money directly to the farmer — the interest rates will

fluctuate with the cost of money borrowed by the government. Currently the EE interest rates are 11 1/4 percent for operating purposes and 11 1/2 percent for farm ownership loans, but the rates may change by late December.

For guaranteed loans — made by commercial lenders and backed by the government — the interest rate is negotiated.

today's interest rates, the cost saving to the dealer will amount to much more than the profit from the sale. High-volume sales are the key to the program.

"Most of our sales are expected to be initiated by phone, with salespeople here utilizing 'quick-spec sheets' to quote the factory invoice cost of specific models, based on the customer's specifications," Byrnes explained. "The customer can even buy a car with a mail order and a deposit, without actually visiting the dealership."

The "quick-spec sheet" is a price list showing the dealer invoice cost of every body style of a specific model, plus fixed costs (such as shipping charges) and factory invoice cost of every available option. The list also includes "easy order packages" which combine options to provide package discounts.

"A customer can request the price list on any model and determine the price of his vehicle from it," Byrnes said. "You total up your basic model, options and fixed costs, and add \$49 to it, and that's the price of your car."

Byrnes Motor Co. is the first dealer in the Texas Panhandle to launch the "49 Over" program. The marketing concept originated with a dealer in New York and one in Lake City, Minn., and has been adopted by other dealers across the US. Most of those who have increased their volume dramatically with the "49 Over" program are small-town

dealers who were looking for a way to survive, Byrnes explained.

Byrnes said he decided in September to launch the new sales program here after visiting and studying the Lake City, Minn., dealership.

Starting today, Byrnes said, his sales department will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. weekdays and from 9 to 6 on Saturdays. The service department hours will remain the same as in the past, he said — 8 to 6 weekdays and 8 to noon on Saturdays.

In conjunction with his new Chrysler dealership, Byrnes is establishing a "satellite store" in Hereford to be run by Bob Sheffy of Dimmitt.

Byrnes Motor Co. will be the dealer for all models of Chrysler Corp. products — Chrysler cars, Plymouth cars and wagons, and Dodge cars, pickups, trucks and vans. The Chrysler line includes two full-size luxury cars, and many Chrysler Corp. products feature front-wheel drive. A new offering in the Dodge and Plymouth lines this year is a "mini-van," and Plymouth also offers a line of compact cars, wagons and sports cars built by Mitsubishi of Japan.

The "Larry Edwards Medical Fund" has been established at the First State Bank in Dimmitt, and anyone wishing to contribute should go by the bank.



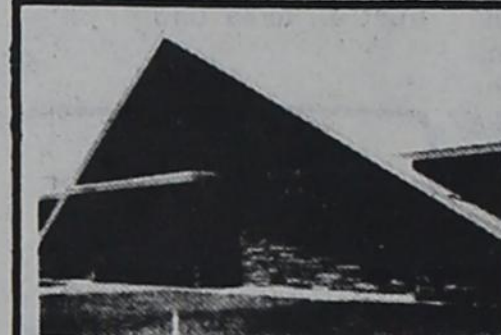

## Checkoff program will help farmers

While Proposition 3 passed by a 66.2 percent margin statewide, the amendment to allow commodity boards to collect assessments from producers gained only 55 1/2 percent of the voter's support in Castro County.

In a small voter turnout, the county passed the amendment by a 294 to 218 margin.

By approving Proposition 3, Texas voters allowed commodity associations to collect fees from growers and use the money to market and promote that agricultural commodity. Farmers not wishing to participate will be allowed refunds.

"Proposition 3 simply returns the program to the way farmers voted it in 1969," said Elbert Harp, president of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

"It was a very effective and profitable program for farmers."

Harp explained the Texas checkoff program. "It has to be voted in by a two-thirds majority in the area of farmers voting. The money is collected where the farmers sell their grain.

"The farmers vote the program in, it is administered by the farmers, and the board is elected by the farmers. You can't have a more democratic system," he said.

"If a farmer doesn't want to participate," Harp said, "our policy is to return the money the day we get the request."

Carl King, president of the Texas Corn Growers Association, said his commodity group has the same policy. "We return the money the day we get the refund request."

King said some commodity groups have shed a bad light on the checkoff program, because "of their reputation in the past making it difficult to obtain refunds."

King said his group will continue to work for the benefit of the farmer. "That money (checkoff) is earmarked for research, development and marketing. It has never been used for pleasure trips, fat salaries or anything we know is unnecessary, because it is against the law."

"Without a viable development marketing program, farmers will have to retire or take out of production a larger percentage of land in the future," Harp said. "We don't want to do that, that's why we carry on the work we do (checkoff)."

"I think the (checkoff) program can be worthwhile and look for the best results from it," said Ray Joe Riley, member of the US cotton board.

"The vote puts a strong obligation on all commodity boards to critically review all projects for which checkoff money is

used, with the view at all times towards maximum benefits for the farmers."

Riley said as far as he knows "the money has been carefully and well spent up to this time.

"It seems to me, with the farmers paying all of the bill for ag commodity groups, that other citizens of the community who benefit from ag dollars would be very pleased to see this type of research and promotional program succeed," Riley said.

Commodity groups say the checkoff program will benefit farmers.

"If farmers are not interested in promoting their products, who is?" Harp said.

To develop new markets for grain sorghum Harp said, "We have to let people know about the quality of our grain before they will buy it." Harp said the income per dollar spent (to the farmer) is \$1,000 plus.

"We do a lot of things farmers are not aware of," King said, "such as herbicide and insecticide clearances."

"If we have the funds available," Harp said, "we can control insects and diseases which would hurt an area badly."

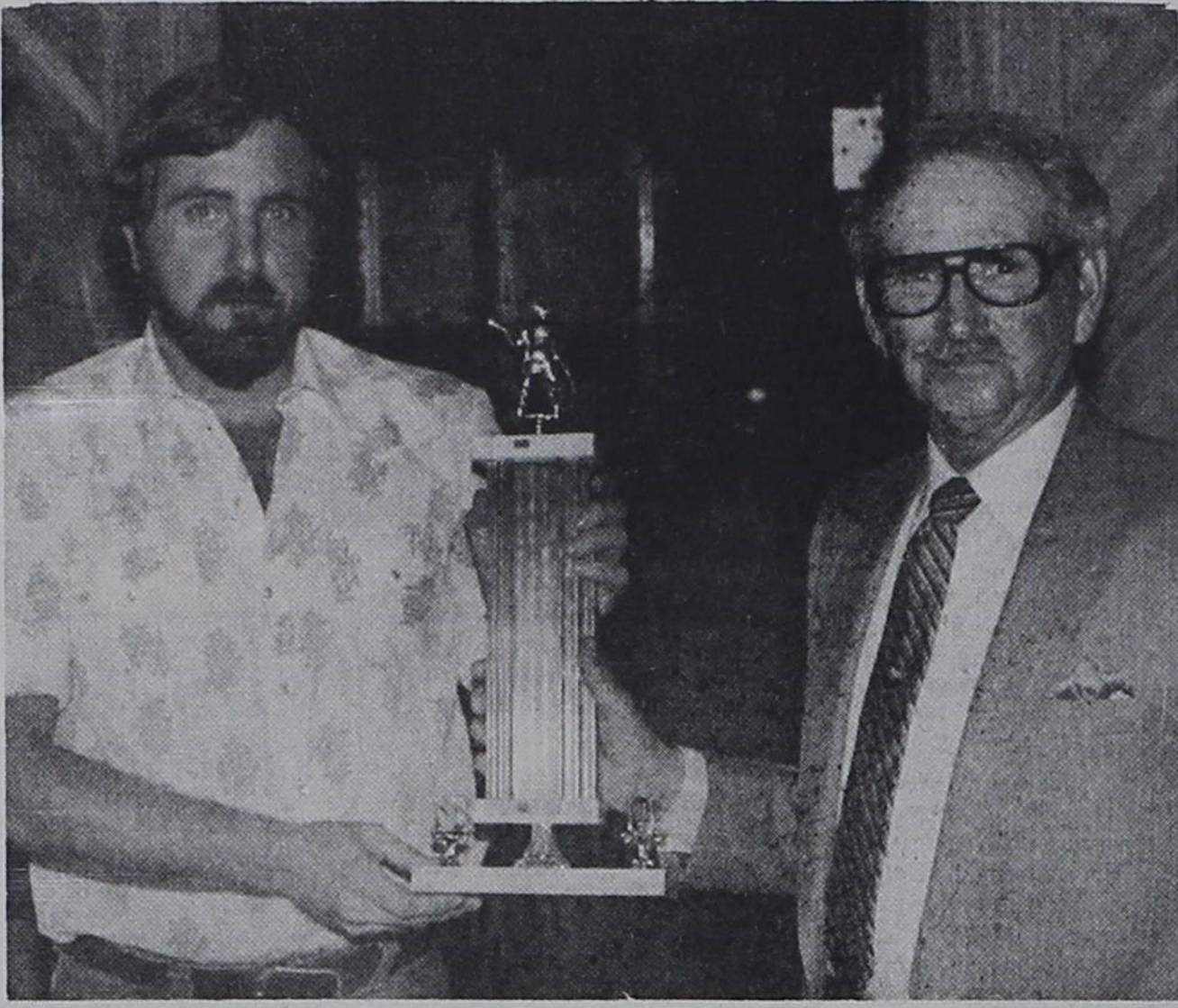
A 40-year-old Hereford man was arrested here Tuesday on a warrant out of Deaf Smith County for violation of probation.

## USDA announces 1984 upland cotton program

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block recently announced a 25 percent acreage reduction program for the 1984 crop of upland cotton, with a program sign-up period from Jan. 16 — Feb. 24, the same as for the wheat and feed grains programs.

Block said an acreage reduction program for upland cotton is needed to prevent ending stocks from rising to excessive levels. "With the payment-in-kind program, we have made excellent progress in bringing cotton supplies into line with demand," Block said. "We urge farmers to cooperate once more in an effort to avoid burdensome production and low prices."

To be eligible for price support benefits, producers must agree to limit upland cotton planted acreage to not more than 75 percent of their cotton acreage base. An acreage of cropland equal to 33.33 percent of the cotton planted acreage must be devoted to approved conservation uses.

Upland cotton price support provisions include a base loan rate for Strict Low Middling one and one-sixth inch cotton,

micronaire 3.5-4.9 of 55 cents per pound and the minimum target price allowed by law. The current statutory minimum target price for the 1984 crop is 81 cents per pound. Other 1984 upland cotton program provisions include:

The 1984 acreage base will be the average of the acres planted and considered planted to upland cotton in 1982 and 1983.

Land designed for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years, except for a summer fallow farm. In the case of summer fallow, conservation use acreage must be land that would have been planted to small grains or row crops in 1984 in the absence of the 1984 upland cotton program. The land must be protected from the wind and water erosion throughout the year.

Offsetting and cross compliance will not apply to the 1984 program.

No advance deficiency payments. Recourse loans will be available for seed cotton in 1984. The loan rate for seed cotton will be the same as the loan rate applicable to lint cotton

## Commissioners accept bid

The Castro County Commissioners at their Monday meeting accepted a bid for a new pickup, discussed the retirement system, paid bills, and canvassed the election results.

A bid of \$14,483.06 was accepted from Stan Byrnes Motor Co. for a 1984 Ford Super Cab pickup. The pickup will be used by new county agent Seth Ralston.

Other bids received were \$14,951 on a 1984 Chevrolet crew cab pickup from Reeve-Fleming Chevrolet and \$15,307 on a 1984 Ford crew cab.

An error was found in the tabulation of election results for voting precinct 5 on Proposition 3. Three votes had been marked in favor and nine against, but

the canvass showed nine in favor and eight against, changing the final totals by only a slight margin.

County Treasurer Oleta Raper asked the commissioners to approve adjustments in the retirement system that would increase retirees' benefits without increasing the amount paid into the system by either the county or the employees. The difference will be covered by spreading the funding period over a greater number of years.

Bills were approved for payment, including the election expenses, and two diesel fuel bills to West Texas Gas — one for \$2,356.22 in Pct. 4, and one for \$2,160.85 in Pct. 1.

total of \$12,750.59 from Mark Davis Carpet in Amarillo and a total of \$13,088.56 from Simmons Carpets of Hereford.

The board looked at price quotes from several firms for computer equipment necessary for the school district to enter into contract to provide computer services to the Castro County Appraisal District.

Items to be purchased would include multiline communications and update at a cost of \$13,000, a remote display station for \$4,158, a 120 CPS printer at \$3,956, two modems for \$1,550 and a CRT for \$1,775, for a total of \$24,439.

Superintendent Robert Ryan told the board that the school would maintain ownership of the hardware, but the tax office would purchase its own software.

"The fee we would charge the tax office for usage of our central computer and the other equipment will help pay for its purchase," Ryan said, adding that the tax district is currently paying for computer services anyway, with the school district supplying a big percentage of the cost.

Board members voted to go ahead with the purchase of the equipment.

Since ventilation of welding smoke from the ag shop at the high school has been a problem, the board voted to spend approximately \$2,969.95 on the construction of three large ventilating hoods and a roof vent in the shop.

Ryan told the board that some of the work of installing the vents, and new welding stalls under them, could be done by vo-ag students.

The Castro County Tennis Association requested that the board look into the construction of a storage building at the high school tennis courts, with the association volunteering to donate \$1,200 toward the estimated \$3,000 cost of construction.

Association member Deanne Clark said she felt the group would also be willing to continue making contributions on a yearly basis until the entire cost is repaid.

The building would be approximately 10x12 feet, made of cinder block on a concrete slab, and would have a concession-type window. The association would use it for storage of water squeegees, the ball throwing machine and other items. It would also be used as a sign up place for tournaments, etc.

The only benefit to the school would be handier storage for the tennis team.

Board members agreed to ask for bids on the project and decide from there whether to go ahead with it.

Appointed to the textbook committee are Pat Keith, Debbie Matthews, Martha Harmon, Darlene Collins, Lana Downing, Zeldia Ellison, June Parker, Zona Vilas, Libby Cleveland, Melanie Hart, Dana Beck and Ed Standlee. Decisions of the committee will be presented to the board at the March board meeting.

A total of \$2,543.82 was delated from the current tax roll by a tax addition-deletion report approved by the board, leaving the current tax levy at a total of \$1,743,365.18.
