



#### SHIPPING TEXAS CATTLE ACROSS GULF OF MEXICO

GALVESTON, Texas, March 18 .- Captain J. C. Borden says it is almost too cattle shipping to Cuba through Galveston will be practiced this season. But Spanish-American war. from what he has heard he says the outlook is very good, for several large shipments being made. Among those who probably will make these shipments is H. A. Williams of Austin, who now owns several large ranches in the new republic. Captain Borden further says in about two months from now matters in this connection will crystallize so that those who engage in the business can tell approximately how many head of cattle will be sent through Galveston. The shipping months are May and June When it is taken into consideration that yearlings can be bought in Texas from \$8 to \$11 per head and can readily be sold in Cuba for from \$18 to \$25 per head the profit in the industry can read-fly be estimated. From his own experiences, after making due allowance for løsses, Captain Borden says it costs about \$7.50 per head to ship yearlings from Texas ranches through Galveston to Cuba. When it is taken into consideration that as many as 1,500 yearlings can be shipped on a single steamer the net results are readily computed.
