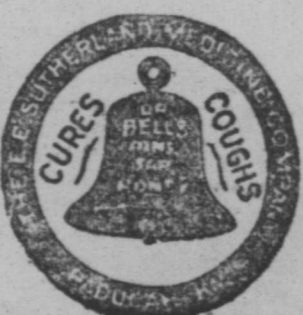

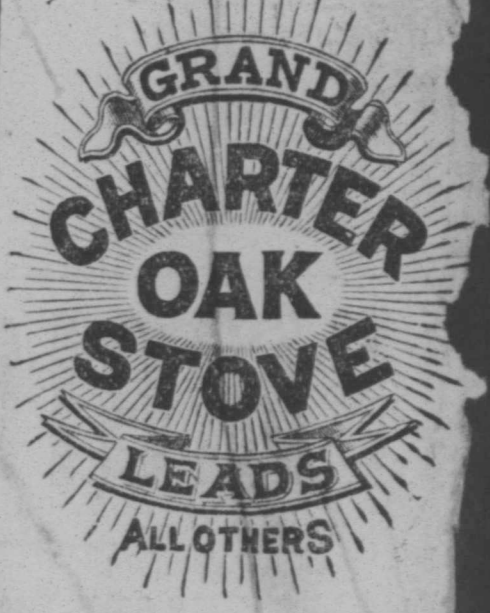

IMPORTANT DECISION REGARDING INVENTION

The Globe-Democrat recently contained a description of a new rotary engine which it said was invented by L. S. Flateau of St. Louis. It was described as a piece of machinery that solved the long standing problem of a perfect rotary engine.

The inside of the machine shows the followers as they go over the cam and fall down in front of the steam inlet, where they are driven to the quarter. Here the exhaust port allows the steam to escape through one of the bearings, and the inlet steam comes in through the opposite bearing.

Weather Conditions

The center of the Rocky mountain storm has moved eastward to us; it is well developed, and indicates considerable energy. It dominates the weather conditions from and including the Rocky mountains, eastward to the Atlantic, and southward to the gulf. Like most spring storms, its prominent characteristics are high temperatures and high westerly winds throughout the southwestern part of the country with scattered thunderstorms; hills in the upper northwest rain and saw with high winds are the results.

Thunder showers with cooler weather will occur in Fort Worth vicinity during the succeeding thirty-six hours.
