# City receives use proposals

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen received two written and two oral proposals Monday night for the use of the city's 99.8 acres of farm land and water from the sewer treatment plant's drainage lake.

A written proposal from Bryce Dowell recommended planting the farm land with tall fescue or other grasses that take a lot of water and then using the area for grazing cattle.

He proposed that no lease fee be charged for the first four years of a six-year contract, in order to cover expenses he would pay for installation of two pumps and gas line, as well as cost of fertilizing, plowing and seeding the land. He suggested that \$15 per planted acre be charged in subsequent years.

Bruce Fuller proposed in writing that the city bear the cost of laying pipeline to the southwest corner of his property, with the city paying all maintenance and pumping costs. He would require that the water meet all state minimum standards for effluent water.

Fuller said that he would furnish the pump and pay a \$2,500 cash lease on a five year basis, renewable annually. He also stipulated that he would like the city to insure the improvements against fire, wind-storm, etc. He also wants the city to pay 50 percent of the cost of maintaining the turbine pump. He noted that he would furnish farm liability insurance.

Charles Summers gave a verbal proposal, asking that the city grant a five year lease, with him maintaining the lake at the desired level as much as possible, and using the land for grazing. He said that he has land in the vicinity to which he could pump the water. He would require that the water be maintained at proper quality for ag use, with tests conducted to insure its quality.

In a verbal proposal, J. H. Myatt said that he would bear the expense of installing a 10-inch line to his property two miles from the city lake and would maintain the lake at a level acceptable to the city. He requested a 15 year lease to enable him to recoup the cost of the line. The aldermen asked that the verbal proposals be put in writing and include any additional details and be submitted at the Jan. 3 meeting of the board. (The board will meet Jan. 3 at 6:30 p.m., since Jan. 2, the regular meeting date, will be a holiday for most businesses in town.)

Approval was given to the second reading of the ordinance denying any further taps on city sewer or water lines outside the city limits. The ordinance goes into effect immediately.

Also, the board's decision to cancel a former resolution concerning the Grace Rogers Addition was put in writing and formally adopted.

Board members met in executive session to discuss legal matters.

## Hance fund-raisers set

Local backers of Congressman Kent Hance are hoping to raise \$20,000 through a public chili supper and a \$100-per-couple reception to help finance his US Senate campaign.

The fund-raising events will be held Friday evening, Jan. 6. The chili supper will be in the County Expo Building, and the reception will follow at the Senior Citizens Center. Hance will speak at both events.

"This will be the only time Kent will be here because of the demands of his statewide campaign," co-chairman Harold Bob Bennett of Hart said, "but this is the most important spot in Texas for him. It's imperative that he get a big turnout in his home county."

To help finance his \$2½ million campaign for the Democratic Party nomination, Hance has set \$11,400 as his target in contributions from Castro

County. "But we think we can help him more than that," Bennett said. "This is a good chance for us to show that we will support him even more than he expects."

Tickets to the two fund-raisers are on sale by members of the 50-person Hance for Senate Fund-Raiser Steering Committee. Tickets to the public

chili supper are \$5 each, and will be sold both in advance and at the door. All tickets to the \$100-per-couple reception, however, must be purchased in advance. The committee has printed 200 of the \$100 tickets.

"The \$100 ticket price for the reception may seem high," Bennett said, "but when you look at what Kent has done for us — the PIK Program, the

special attention and aid he gave us on our 1982 disaster payments — the ticket price is a bargain."

He added, "We farmers don't have much to look forward to next year, and maybe in the years to come. It's imperative that we have a man like Kent in the Senate, with his knowledge of the farm situation and his concern for the farmer."

In his campaign for the Democratic Party nomination in the May primary, Hance faces stiff opposition from former Congressman Bob Krueger and State Sen. Lloyd Doggett of Austin.

Bennett and Carl King are heading up the fund-raising project. Steering committee members with tickets available are:

## Local cattleman dies in accident

Butch Holcomb, 29-year-old Dimmitt cattleman, was killed last Wednesday when he was thrown from his horse and dragged across a pasture 12 miles southeast of Dimmitt.

Castro County Justice of the Peace Marshall Young pronounced Holcomb dead at the scene. Evidence

indicated that Holcomb's horse apparently got into a hot wire and threw its rider about noon, Young said.

Bobby Traylor first spotted the wandering horse from a nearby county roadway and reported it. Young was

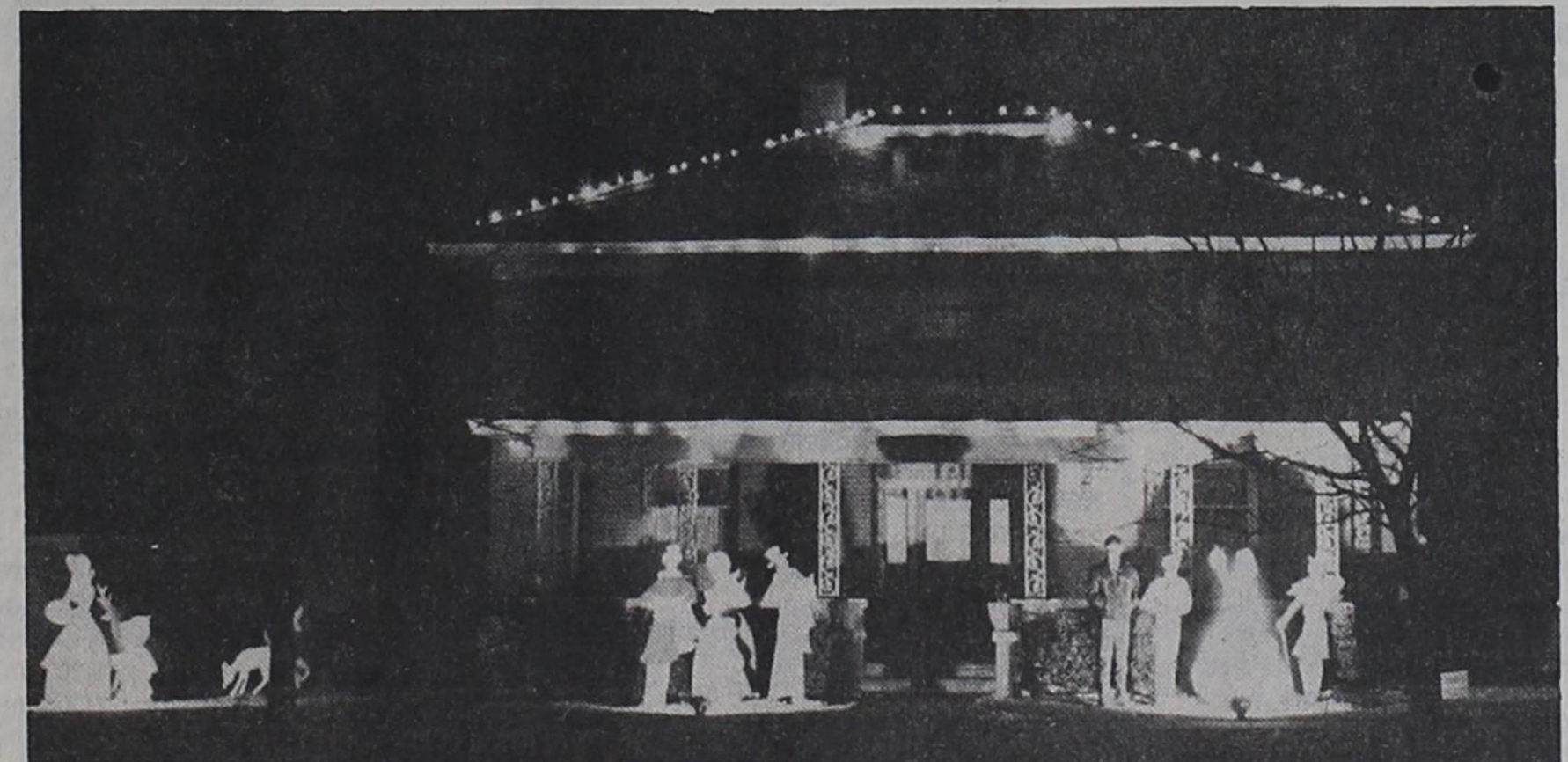
called to the scene shortly after 2 p.m.

Young said Holcomb's death was apparently caused by a combination of the fall and the horse's dragging him.

Holcomb was a self-employed cattleman who kept cattle for other people.

Funeral services were held Saturday in Dimmitt.

A memorial fund in honor of Holcomb was started at the First State Bank of Dimmitt by Leta Musick. Contributions may be made to the "Brandt and Sky Holcomb Trust." More than \$2,000 has already been received.

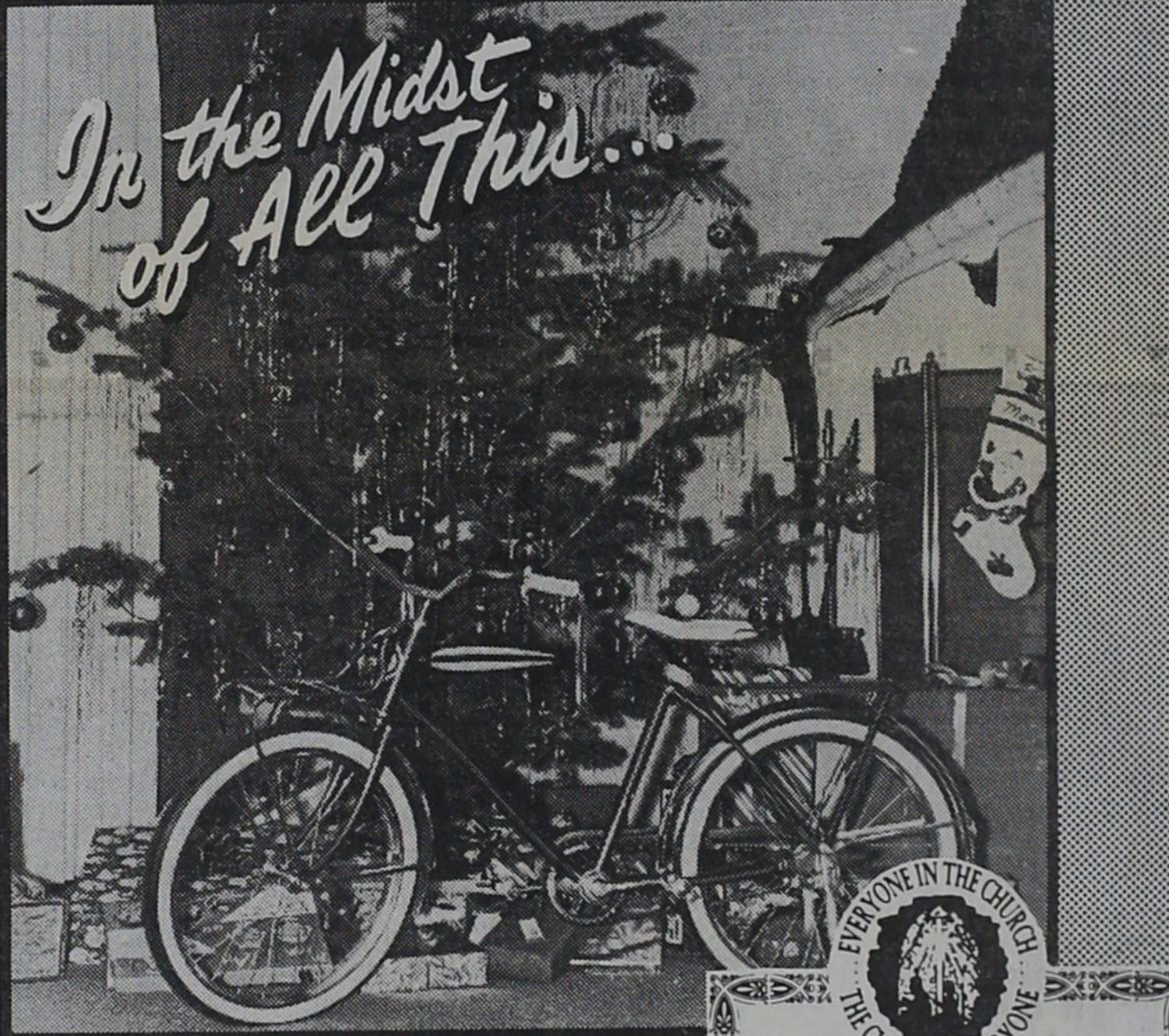



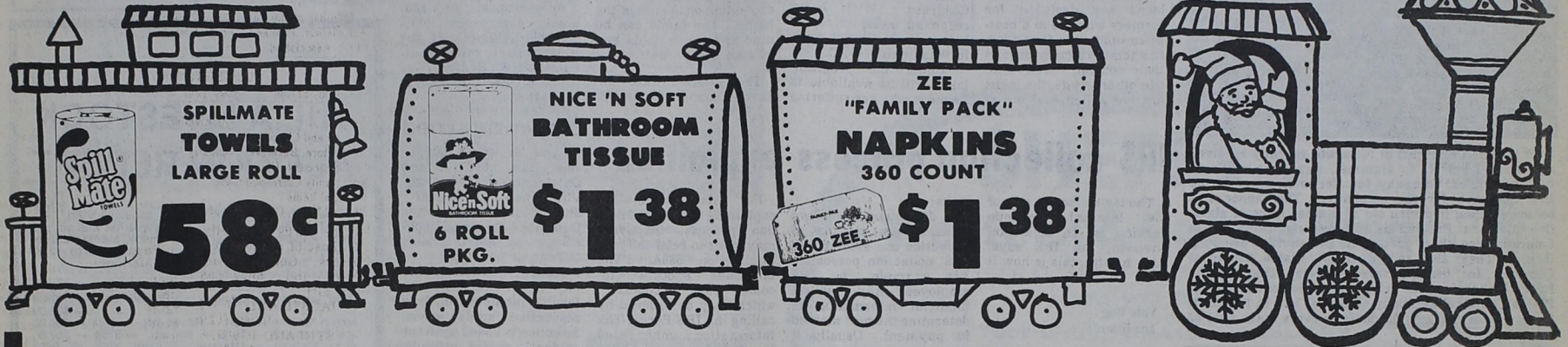

## FmHA will resume making 'EE' loans

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will resume making economic emergency loans by the beginning of next year, according to FmHA County Supervisor, John Wolf III.

"Economic emergency loans are designed for farmers who are in a cost-price squeeze or face other financial difficulty beyond their control," Wolf said. "In other words, the loans are for a financial emergency rather than a natural disaster such as a drought or flood.

The economic emergency or "EE" program was in operation from 1978 to 1981. The program expired in 1981 but was later reauthorized by Congress. It is being reopened under an order by the U. S. district court in Washington, D. C.

"Under the program, loans will be available to farmers who are suffering

with the cost to the government of borrowing money. The interest rates for guaranteed loans, which are made by commercial lenders and backed by the government, are negotiated between the borrower and the lender.

Applications for economic emergency loans will be available at the FmHA county office located at 221 W. Bedford.

## IRS collection process explained

The tax collection arm of the Internal Revenue Service is its Collection Division, the IRS says. And, briefly, this is how it

looks:

If delinquent taxes are owed, several methods of collection are available to IRS' collection personnel. For example, the IRS employee may request financial information to determine the best method for payment. Usually, if the taxpayer can pay all the delinquent taxes at once — by selling property, borrowing, or using savings — this is done and the debt is paid immediately.

On the other hand, if the taxpayer cannot pay the total amount immediately, he or she may qualify for installment payments.

If a taxpayer can pay the tax immediately or under an installment agreement but chooses not to do so, the IRS can enforce collection through levies on wages or bank accounts and seizure and sale of property.

For more information explaining the IRS collection process, taxpayers may want to read the free Publication 586A, "The Collection Process (Income Tax Accounts)," which may be ordered by calling the IRS Forms-Tax Information number listed in the local telephone directory under US Government.

### Insects of interest

## Firewood insects

By ALLEN KNUTSON

**EA-Entomology**

Firewood brought indoors during the winter may be infested with insects which emerge from the wood, says Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-Entomology. Homeowners are often concerned that these insects may attack wood in the home or outdoor plants and trees. However, neither of these possibilities is likely.

The majority of these insects are harmless in that they attack only unseasoned wood. When the tree is cut and the wood brought inside, the life cycle of the insect is accelerated by the warmer temperatures. The infestation becomes evident as piles of "sawdust" accumulate beneath the wood and the adult insects begin to emerge. Often, when the house is quiet, the insects can actually be heard feeding inside the wood.

Since the majority of these borers attack living or recently cut wood, they seldom attack home structures. Also, there are already tree borers in our area, such as the red-head-

ed ash borer, so there is little threat of introducing a new borer. The best defense against wood boring insects attacking trees is to maintain a healthy, vigorous tree.

Firewood stacked too close to the home or improperly stored can harbor nuisance pests such as cockroaches, spiders, and carpenter ants. Firewood adjacent to the home may also provide an avenue for termite infestations.

The best control for these pests is prevention. Store firewood away from the house and off the ground. Commercially available racks are helpful in keeping wood off the ground and reducing insect infestations. Stack wood by alternating direction of rows in a stack. This allows better air movement, speeds drying, and permits easier access by parasites and predators of wood infesting insects.

Do not spray firewood with insecticides. This is not a safe practice because toxic fumes may be released inside the home. Most insects infesting firewood live in the wood or beneath the bark. Insecticides seldom, if ever reach these places. It may be necessary to treat the soil under and around stacks of firewood to control insects in these areas.

### Yule Log Tradition

The tradition of the Yule Log comes to us from England and France. It was the custom for members of a family to carry in a mass of wood or a large gnarled stump from the woods. This log would be brought in on Christmas Eve. The Yule Log is representative of warmth and light during this joyous Yuletide season.

This lawsuit might affect your rights to obtain free or reduced cost hospital care at the Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt, Texas.

The United States District Court in Amarillo has decided that the plaintiffs in this case fairly and adequately represent a group of low-income and Mexican-American persons. Those persons share common concerns regarding the admission and free care policies of Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt, Texas.

The plaintiffs and the defendants have reached a settlement of this case. Before the Court will approve the settlement, low-income persons and Mexican-Americans in this area must be notified. These persons may object to the settlement if they wish.

The proposed settlement provides that the hospital will do the following:

1. It sets up a Medical Assistance Program to give free or reduced cost hospital care to low-income residents of Castro County. The Plan sets out the income guidelines to be used to decide if a person will get free care, or reduced cost care, and sets the procedures for applying for free or reduced cost care. Under this Plan, if your income is low enough, you might not have to pay for your hospital bill, but you will have to pay for your doctor bill. A person must have an income even lower than the Poverty Guidelines to get free hospital care.
2. It requires the hospital to give at least a certain amount of free care every year for the next five (5) years. This averages to about \$50,000 a year for each of the next five (5) years.
3. It requires the hospital to give immediate care in an emergency, regardless of their ability to pay.
4. It requires the hospital to have staff members who speak both Spanish and English available at all times to assist persons who do not speak English fluently.
5. It requires the hospital to try to hire more Hispanic nursing and administrative personnel.
6. It requires the plaintiffs to withdraw all their complaints against the hospital that have been filed with the federal government.

The settlement does not provide for the payment of any money to individuals who might have been wrongfully denied free or reduced cost care in the past. The settlement also does not provide for the payment of any money to low-income or Mexican-American persons who might have paid deposits or hospital bills to Plains Memorial Hospital when the person should have been given free or lower cost care. These persons, if any, will be required to file their own cases, if they wish to claim any money. The Hospital has not admitted any liability or agreed to pay any money to individuals.

The win over Kermit in the consolation finals Saturday was Coach Kenneth Cleveland's 600th victory since he signed on as the boys' basketball coach here in 1961. The coach and players celebrated in the dressing room after the game with a big "600" cake provided by Cleveland's wife, Libby.

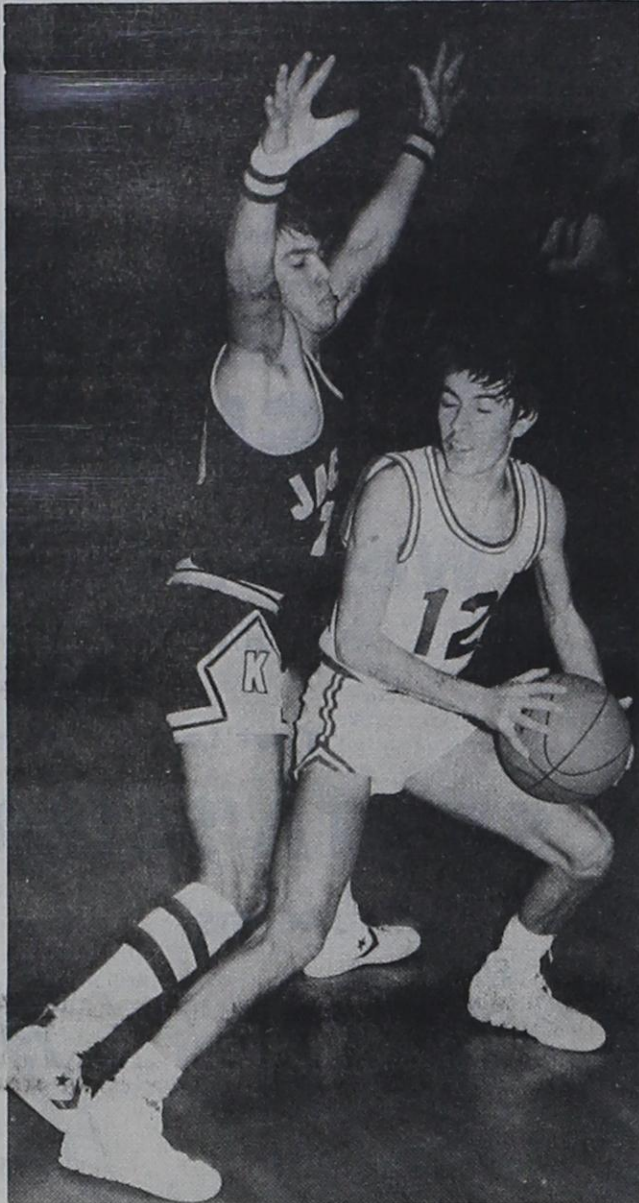
Cleveland and his players would have preferred the 600th win to come a day earlier — and it almost did.

In the opening-round game Thursday, Shallowater's Mustangs couldn't miss a basket in the first three quarters, and had the Bobcats down by as much as 15 points in the third.

But the Bobcats staged a great comeback effort as senior guard Richard

Sauceda sank 16 points in the fourth — most of them jumpers from the corner — to spark a rally that put Dimmitt ahead 62-61 with two minutes to go.

However, the Mustangs got a chance at a last-second shot and made the most of it as senior forward Dee Hohenberger sank a 12-footer to give Shallowater a one-point lead, 63-62. Dimmitt called time out, but was assessed a technical foul because it had no time-outs left. The game ended

with Shallowater's Trey Medlock hitting a pair of free throws to give the Mustangs their final victory margin, 65-62.

That was the Bobcats' most exciting contest in the big holiday tournament. Their other two games were whitewashes as they creamed Canadian 85-33 and Kermit 62-44.

Shallowater, meanwhile, hit the skids in the semifinals with a 69-43 loss to El Paso Cathedral, which had downed Canadian 65-51 in the first round. But the Mustangs bounced back Saturday with a 75-49 triumph over Floydada to capture third place.

El Paso Cathedral went on to win the tourney championship with a 59-38 victory over Littlefield in the title game. Littlefield had edged Kermit 56-55 and had downed Floydada 58-45 to reach the finals.

Sauceda was named to the all-tournament team after scoring 52 points in three games — 26 of them against Shallowater.

"I think Richard deserved to make the all-tournament team," Coach Cleveland commented. "He shot us back into the game against Shallowater with some beautiful corner shots."

Cleveland added that the tourney experience "was good for us."

"It wasn't much fun to have to go the loser's route — we haven't had to do that much," he said. "In the game we lost, we made some mistakes, but we learned something from it. Anytime you can learn from a game, it's good for you."

"The kids played well all three games," Cleveland said, "and they had a super effort against Shallowater — they just

fell too far behind. But they came back to the point where they could have won it, and anytime you can do that, it's encouraging."

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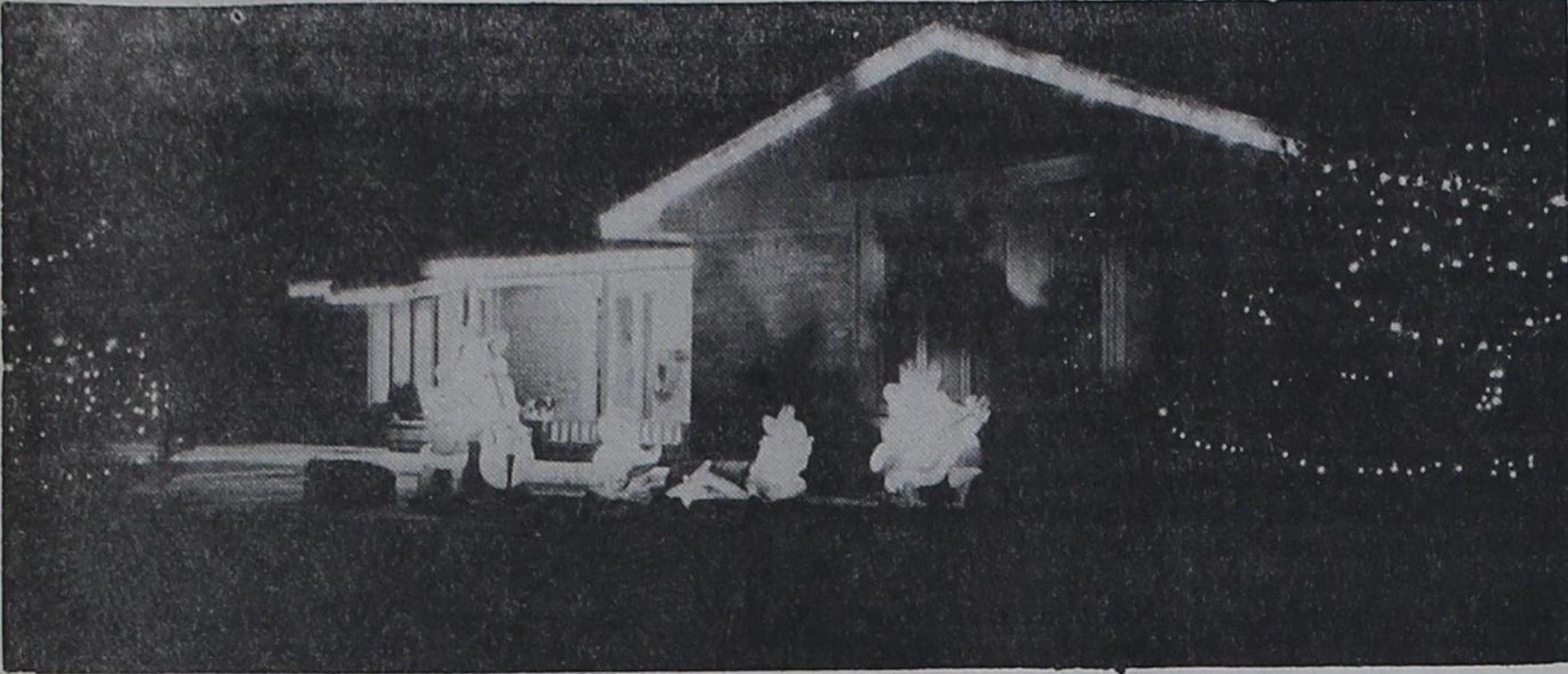

## Four nurses pass exams

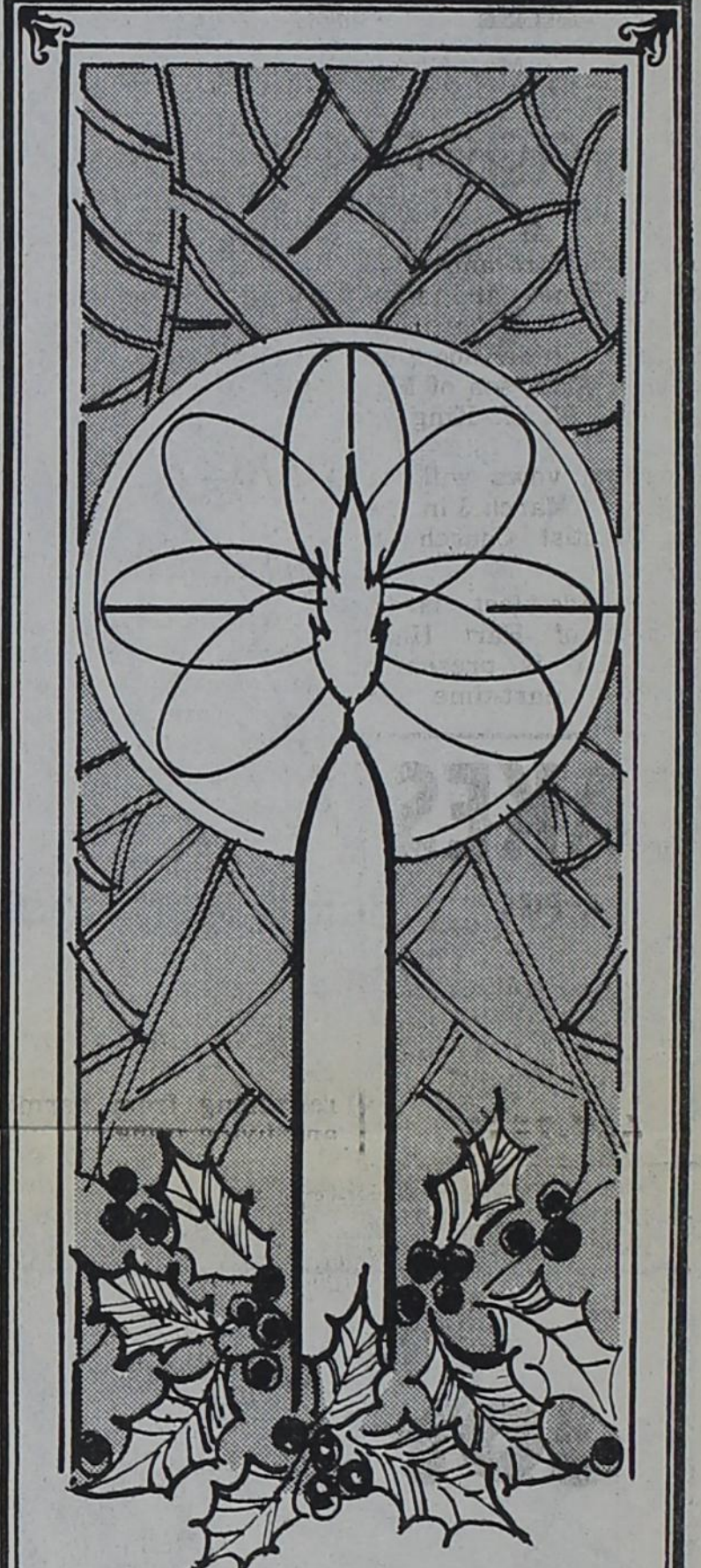
Graduates of Amarillo College Vocational Nursing recently were notified they passed the State Board Examination taken in October.
