

LOSES IN HIS SUIT CONTEMPT PROCEEDINGS

The house committee appointed to investigate the authorship of an article which appeared in the Beaumont Jourupon the members of the house, met Wednesday night and examined Robert A. the Beaumont Journal during the regular session, who had responded to the summons to appear before it. He acknowledged that he wrote the article complained of.

Asked if he wished to make a statement regarding charges contained in the article, Mr. McLaughlan replied that it was not intended to reflect in any way upon any member of the house, but referred to the lobbyists who were present, O'Quinn was not intended to charge any sinister motives to that gentleman, but merely to intimate that he talked tot make.

O'QUINN ANGRY

Representative O'Quinn was present at the investigation and asked McLaughlan several questions, which the latter declined to answer, alleging that the questions were asked for the purpose of using the replies in a contemplated libel suit against the Beaumont Journal for publishing the article. Some hot words passed hetween Representative O'Quinn and Mc-Laughlin. The committee decided that it would report to the house that McLaughcopy of the statement made by him in reference to it. It decided that the resolution by which it was appointed did not permit it to make any recommendations,

but merely to report the findings.

WAXAHACHIE, Texas, April 16 .- The trial last Thursday, is still engaging the the most important murder trials ever concluded its evidence yesterday afternoon and the defense is now introducing witnesses. There are between seventyfive and eighty witnesses in the case. The crime charged against Willis is that of killing Jim and Claud Shaw in the public road near Ennis on the evening of Dec. 27. The testimony shows that Willis met them in the road and opened fire on them with a shotgun loaded with buckshot. After shooting them down he then shot Jim Shaw one time and Claud Shaw twice with a pistol. All the parties to the tragedy were young men who had been reared in the same community.
