# 'Minority backlash' here aids Doggett

An apparent "minority in Box 8, 20-0 in Box 9, 41-5 ried Box 2 by 253-223 and backlash" vote here and elsewhere Saturday helped Lloyd Doggett gain a razorthin edge over Kent Hance in the US Senate runoff.

More Castro County voters went to the polls in the Democratic Primary runoff Saturday than had cast ballots here May 5, but the higher turnout benefited Doggett more than it did native son Hance in the US Senate race.

With 1,885 voting Saturday (vs. 1,802 in the May primary), Castro Countians favored Hance by a 101/2-1 margin in the Senate race, But in actual numbers,

Doggett supporters wiped out Hance's gain here. While Hance received 92 more votes Saturday than he had gotten in the May 5 balloting (1,718 vs. 1,625), Doggett collected 139 more votes (164 Saturday vs. 25 on May 5).

More than half of Doggett's Castro County votes came in Box 4 (Northeast ried by 140-94. In the May 5 primary, Hance had garnered 133 votes in Box 4 to Bob Krueger's 46 and Doggett's

showed substantial gains in Ector, Lubbock and Yoakum.

in Box 10, 33-0 in Box 11, 127-13 in Box 12, 16-3 in Box 13, 22-2 in Box 14, 32-0 in Box 15, and 24-0 in Box 16, with the absentee vote favoring Hance by 201-1.

Hance carried most of the state's rural areas-North, West and East Texas-while Doggett carried the big metropolitan centers of Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston, Austin and San Antonio.

In the three other runoff races Saturday, Castro County Democrats went with the winners.

In the race for the 19th Congressional District nomination, Castro Countians favored former Hance aide Don Richards over Lubbock attorney Thomas M. Richards by a 1,012 to 796 count (56% to 44%).

District-wide, Don Richards won the nomination with 29,144 votes to Thomas Dimmitt), which Hance car- Richards' 28,426 (50.6% to 49.4%).

Don Richards carried all but three of the 15 counties in the 19th Congressional Doggett, a liberal state District. The three that went senator from Austin, also for Thomas Richards were


Meanwhile, in the only runoff race on the Republican ballot, the county's GOP voters favored Lubbock businessman Larry Combest over Lubbock accountant Ron Fleming for the party's congressional nomination. Combest's victory here helped propel him into a Novem-

ber general election showdown against Don richards for the congressional seat now held by Kent Hance. The Republican vote here

was light, with Combest receiving 49 votes to Fleming's 21.

In the Democratic race for two seats on the State Court of Criminal Appeals, Castro Countians favored the two eventual winners by substantial margins. For the Place 2 post, incumbent W. C. (Bill) Davis received 752 votes to challenger Roy E. Greenwood's 502. Davis carried all but two boxes (12 and 16), while in Box 7 the two finished in a 14-14 dead heat. Davis' margin of victory here was 60% to 40%, and statewide his winning margin was 62%.

# **DHS grad from Finland** vows that she'll return

Nina Moberg has returned to her homeland, Finland, with a lifetime supply of memories of her year as a Dimmitt High School student and a Texan.

Before she left, she vowed to return. An she'll probably keep that vow, as her mother, Pia Nassman Moberg, has done three times since her own graduation from Dimmitt High in 1961.

Mrs. Moberg was DHS's first American Field Service exchange student. When Nina (the oldest child in the Moberg family) reached the age, Mrs. Moberg wanted her daughter to have the same experience - and in the same town, among people she knew.

"It has been just great," she said before she left for Finland Sunday. "It was a little hard in the beginning, but with the help of all my classmates it's been great. And staying with Dickie has just been the best I could ever have-we just always had so much fun together."

But in six Castro County boxes Saturday, Doggett didn't receive a single vote, and he got only one vote in the absentee balloting, which Hance carried by 201-1

The increase in Doggett's vote here was seen as a backlash to Hance's opposition to amnesty for illegal aliens. The state's League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) condemned Hance for his stand, calling it an issue with racist undertones, and threw its support to Doggett in the runoff election.

The dramatic turnaround in Doggett's totals in other minority boxes in North Texas-expecially in Lubbock County-was one of the crucial factors in the race.

Statewide, Doggett was the apparent winner by 467 votes out of 979,387 ballots cast, making it one of the closest races in the state's history. Final unofficial results showed Doggett with 489,927 to Hance's 489,460.

Predictably, Hance's supporters have called for a statewide recount.

If Doggett's victory holds up after the recount-as Doggett predicts-it will be the first election loss ever for Hance, who has served two terms in the Texas Senate and three in the US House of Representatives.

Hance received 90.5% of the vote here Saturday to Doggett's 9.5%. In the May 5 primary, Hance had received 91.4% of the Castro County vote while five other candidates had split the remaining 8.6%, with Doggett getting only 1.4%.

govenmental bodies. The ultimate goal is to strengthen the local economy, provide more jobs, and increase the property-tax and sales-tax income of local governments while spreading out the tax load.

Industrial development costs money. Surveys must be run, contacts must be made, sites must be acquired or secured, brochures must be printed-and sometimes, industrial facilities must be provided if one area is to compete successfully against others in attracting new industry.

The state government has recognized this, and has sanctioned the use of industrial revenue bonds (similar to school bonds and water bonds) to help bring new industry to Texas. The proposed new Industrial Commission is being established to utilize this revenue bond program should the opportunity arise.

As Chamber of Commerce President George Sides said, "If we can get our commission set up and get it funded, then whenever we hear of something that will fit our people or county, we'll be ready to jump onto it.'

The Chamber of Commerce is currently seeking start-up funds from the county government and local cities and school districts.

Here is the complete Industrial Commission proposal, drawn up by the Chamber of Commerce Industrial **Development** Committee:

#### PREAMBLE

Throughout the last several decades, Dimmitt and Castro County have cycled through a number of growth and nongrowth periods. In general, these cycles followed local farm profitability and influenced the entire county population. In the past, a few citizens have recognized the need to diversify the economic base of our area and have actively sought new businesses. For example, consider the Highway 385 Committee, which almost single-handedly developed this primary thoroughfare through Castro County; and the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, with the foresight to accept financial risks to put their ideas for a corn starch plant into reality. Some experiences were good, some bad, but we all recognize the contributions each development has made to our county.

Each citizen enjoys lower individual taxes and a more diversified shopping/social services district because of industries located in Castro County. Monies paid in employee wages, goods purchased by companies and new people strengthen our local businesses, helping them to survive during depressed agricultural periods.

A number of us have excellent suggestions to add industries to Dimmitt. However, the difficulties one must overcome to begin a new enterprise are tremendous and, as a result, many ideas go unexplored.

The Industrial Committee of the Dimmitt Chamber of Commerce believes that aggressiveness is again required to launch Dimmitt and the County into a new growth era. Total dependence on cycling farm profitability is not acceptable if we can otherwise stabilize our economy.

Increased manufacturing capacity will reduce the individual tax burdens to all citizens and businessmen (especially farm owners/operators), helping to relieve some of the daily pressures that all face in their bid for financial security.

Members of the Industrial Committee, the Chamber of Commerce, City and County have worked at length to equip our area with the necessary tools for development:

- A professional brochure
- County Industrial Revenue Bond Program
- City Industrial Revenue Bond Program
- Planning sessions and coordination of efforts to contact prospective industries

1. Steering Committee

A Steering Committee consisting of eight members will be selected to oversee operations of the proposed program. The Committee will consist of four members from the Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee, one appointee each from the School Board, City of Dimmitt, Castro County Commissioners and the local financial institutions. One person shall be elected by the committee as chairperson and all directions approved by majority vote. Committee terms are to be for two-year periods.

The Steering Committee shall have the responsibility to oversee all Industrial Fund disbursements, fully administer the Industrial Development Program and its personnel, report quarterly to all funding organizations, and participate firsthand in securing new industries for Castro County. The Committee shall work concurrently with the Chamber of Commerce.

#### 2. Office

The Chamber of Commerce will provide office space, typing and telephone answering service free of charge, but will require payment in part for utility and telephone costs. Utility bill assessments will not exceed \$50 per month during 1984 and will be subject to review annually by the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors. Telephone expenses will be based on actual billing for long-distance calls.

#### 3. Working Fund

- A working fund of \$49,000 in 1984 will be established through three means:
  - Contributions by local citizens and small businesses
- Solicited contributions by existing industries
- Funding from local governing groups including, but not limited to, City of Dimmitt and the Dimmitt Independent School District

#### Proposed funding by group:

Castro County\$14,000	
City of Dimmitt\$10,000	
Dimmitt Independent Schools\$14,000	
Financial Institutions\$4,000	
Industry\$4,000	
Private/Small Business\$3,000	
The fund will be administered by the Steering	
committee, which will assume full responsibility and	
ccountability for fund disbursements. General usage of	

the fund will include:

- Salary for a professional developer (appromimately \$27,000 in 1984)
- Labor associated costs for the developer (approximately \$4,000)
- Local supplies and utilities (\$1,500)
- Travel expenses for developer (\$9,000)
- \$7,000 to fund reserves to assist in expenses associated with helping active candidates implement plans for construction in Castro County
- \$500 for miscellaneous expense

#### 4. Reporting

A semi-annual report of fund usage and activities will be prepared by the developer, reviewed by the Steering Committee, and distributed to each contributor donating \$1,000 per year, or more, to the Industrial Development Fund.

- 5. Be willing to do ALL tasks associated with industrial development including clerical tasks, etc.
- 6. Be self-motivated.

Certain taxpayers who sell regardless of any future their home can exclude up to \$125,000 of the sale's gain from taxable income.

Taxpayers who are 55 or older or married to someone 55 or older can make this election when they sell a home. The home must have served as the principal residence for three or more years during the five-year period immediately preceding the sale.

"This option for taxpayers is a provision of the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981," points out Dr. Stebbins, real estate specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The intent of the provision is to allow older citizens to liquidate the equity in their home and enjoy a higher income during retirement without incurring an excessive tax burden.'

One of the important restrictions in the provision is that a taxpayer can use the election only once, notes Stebbins. Once selected, it is binding upon both spouses

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

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


