DESTRUCTION OF THREE HUNDRED CELESTIALS PLOTTED, BUT DIS-COVERED AND PREVENTED

Suspected of Leaking to the San Francisco Police, Who Catch Four Out of

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 11 .- The police have just discovered a most dastardly plot among the Chinese highbinders here. Four of the eleven presidents of the See Yup Society have been arrested for conspiracy to murder three hundred members of the Chniese society. The four are all of English education, and two of them-Gee Hong On, who is not only president of the Yok High and Binder Ton, but also the Yee Yup, and Lee Ying, who is president of the Bow Leong Tong-have made complete confessions of the plot.

The other seven presidents are in hiding, but will be arrested as fast as they can be found.




