## SAID TO HAVE NAMED HIM

ASSERTION THAT, DYING, HEFFER MAN CHARGED PROMINENT SO-CIETY SWELL AS ASSAILANT

## HAY INTENDED FOR ANOTHER

Theory Advanced That the Assallant of the Dead Man Wanted to Kill a Different Man and in the Darkness Made an Innocent Coachman His Victim,

NEW YORK, May 27.-When it became known that John Hefferman, who was shot on the lawn of the Ardsley club near Irvington, last Sunday night, had made a statement before he died, naming a prominent member of the club as the British Steamer Huddersfield man who had shot him, the greatest doubt was expressed by the people of Tarrytown and vicinity

It could not be possible, they all said, that a man of such social position as the one named was the slayer, and it was tacitly agreed among the club members and the owners of villas around Ardsleyon-the-Hudson to guard his name with great secrecy.


