**Commissioners** start budget preparations

Giving the preliminary okay to a basic outline for the 1983-84 fiscal year budget, Castro County Commissioners decided Monday to include a three percent increase in the tax rate, which would still leave about a \$37,000 difference in the amount of planned expenses and income.

Figures presented by Henry Ramaekers of the county's auditing firm, Brown, Graham & Co., showed planned disbursements of \$1,456,142.26. Total income was shown at only \$1,398,944, not including the three percent increase in the tax rate, which would add another \$21,000.

Income from ad valorem taxes will be lower this year, even with the increase in the tax rate, says Tax Appraisal District head Jerry Heller, because of the exemptions given to farm machinery. He estimated that ad valorem taxes will bring in about \$438,000, figuring on a 90 percent collection rate.


## **Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District**



The surge irrigation system consists of a pair of water activated diaphragm valves controlled by a battery operated valve switching timer. This allows alternating surges of water to be released through two settings of gated pipe in a time controlled sequence.



On the Darrell Flood farm near Easter, there were several factors that slowed down the rate of advance through the furrow. The top picture shows the large amount of residue in the furrows, and the bottom shows the cloddishness of the soil.



### SURGE IRRIGATION

During the last year there has been a lot of talk about surge irrigation. Most of the agriculture newspapers and magazines have carried stories on surge; how it

works, and how much money it can save you, the farmer. This year, the High Plains Underground Water Conser-vation District gave the Dimmitt Soil Conservation Ser-vice office a set of surge equipment to use. So far the Dimmitt SCS office has run three surge trials. They were on Charles Burks, between Nazareth and Happy, Norman Hinchliffe, near Flagg, and Darrell Flood at Easter. The following is the result of these three surge trials.

On Charles Burks the trial didn't work very well. There were several factors effecting the outcome.

Charles was watering ½ mile runs of Pullman soils, which at the time were very powdery. The slope of land had less than one foot of drop per 100 feet. Charles normally waters 30 furrows at a time for 24 hours. The surge was set on one hour intervals, 30 rows on each side of the surge. Charles was putting 450 GPM out of his wells and 15 GPM down each furrow. The surge worked well until it reached the 1600 mark. Apparently at about this point, the surge lost the energy

it needed to push the water on to the end of the furrows. We assumed that the reason for failure, was one; not enough GPM per furrow to push the water on through, two; the runs were too long. It would have worked if the run had been 1/4 mile instead of 1/2 mile, and third; we probably should have watered 15 furrows instead of 30 on each side of the surge, giving us 30 GPM down each furrow.

The second surge trial was on Norman Hinchliffe. It was 1600 foot runs on Olton soils, planted to corn. The slope was 3/10 of a foot of drop per 100 feet. Norman used one well which was pumping 850 GPM. He nor-mally waters 30 rows on 12 hour sets. This surge trial watered 60 furrows in 14 hours.

This trial went very well. We blackened all the furrows and got good water penetration into the soil. Norman, on regular sets, runs a lot of water to the tail-water pit. On this surge trial however; Norman kept most of the water on the field and a lot less went into


the pit. The last trial was on Darrell Flood, near Easter. Darrell uses 12 hour sets on ½ mile runs on Pullman soils. The slope was 3/10 of drop per 100 feet. Darrell used 2 wells that gave 1000 GPM for watering. Approximately 35 GPM per furrow was applied.



This picture shows water that has just about stopped flowing on the right side and the advance of water from the gated pipe on the left side. This surge of water down the furrow wets, seals, and con-ditions the soil for succeeding surges of water.



As each surge moves down the furrows, the water tends to move faster, on the area that has already been soaked, on to the dry soil on down the furrow. This rate of advance through the field is supposed to be faster than a continuous flow of water.
