FALL EXPECTED Rapid falling of the water, it is expected, will quickly drain the inundated section on the Illinois side, where the property loss will be heaviest, and repairs to the damaged property will soon be possible.

TWENTY DROWNED Reports are coming in from Madison, Granite City and Venice, which indicate the death list may be larger than at first estimated. It is known that at least twenty persons have been drowned in that vicinity.
