The usual mixed quality were on hand and with the moderate receipts the market opened early with trading active and steady to strong prices. Two bunches of medium weight steers brought \$3.75, and considering the quality and weight with yesterday, the price was a little stronger. Cows sold fairly well, with a top price of \$2.45, and 800 extra choice red pole Angus heifers weighing 1,200 pounds, brought \$2.75, a record-breaking price for this market. The supply of bulls, stags and ewes was nominal and sold steady and active at \$1.00 to \$2.00. Owing to the unusual large number of calves this week the market shows a decline of 25 cents since last week, making a top quotation for calves at \$1.25, with the bulk of sales largely at \$1.00 to \$1.20.
