The races yesterday were the closest that have been run this year. Several of the finishes were so close that it took a consultation of the judges to decide who was the winner. The last heat of the last race resulted in a dead heat and as it was so late the deciding heat was not run.
Lutie K. was sent against the track record of 1:04 1/4, which she herself holds. A running mate was provided for her, but after scoring several times the best that she could do was 1:07. This, however, was the best heat yesterday.
The first race was the most interesting. Four heats had to be run. The first heat was won by David, by a length. The second went to Charley, after a hard drive, by a nose. King won the third with ease, being some twenty lengths ahead. The last heat was called with each horse a winner in one heat. The third event was won by Deacon Post in two straight heats. Whaley was but a short way behind in both.

MOROS ARE CAPTURED
NEW YORK, July 10.—The Best Igdira has captured a party of well known Tangier Moros, says a Times dispatch from Tangiers by way of London.
In the party are the brother of the native secretary of the British legation and a native artillery officer. Two Moros are reported as having been killed in the fight which occurred.
The party was making a pilgrimage to a famous tomb two days distant from Tangier. The government's capacity to maintain order, the correspondent asserts is diminishing daily.

AIRSHIP TO FLY OVER LONDON
Young Aeronaut Will Make Experiment With It Tomorrow

LONDON, July 10.—A remarkable airship trial is to take place from the Bantock Club grounds tomorrow, when Stanley Spencer, the young aeronaut, who sailed over the northern suburbs of London last year, will take a new and powerful airship across the metropolis at a speed which may range up to thirty miles an hour.
A distinguished gathering will be present to watch the start. The journey through the air will not be dependent on perfect weather conditions. The great power of the new ship being sufficient to force it through winds which would otherwise stop a smaller craft. A storm might delay the start, but ordinary summer breezes will make little or no difference.
The total length of the new ship is about ninety feet and the breadth in the widest part about twenty-two feet. Beneath the cigar-shaped balloon is suspended the bamboo framework carrying the one or two passengers, the petrol motor, the screw tractor or propeller, and the rudder. The motor is placed in the front half of the framework, the car in the back half. The propeller is fixed in front, the rudder at the rear. Everything is worked from the car by an apparatus similar to that used for operating the brake on cycles.
The airship with which the successful experiments were made last year was of four-horse power, while the new ship is of twenty-four-horse power. The maximum speed of the former was ten miles an hour, and of the latter thirty miles an hour. The two-blade screw tractor for propelling the ship is twelve feet in length. The rudder consists of a silk-covered framework. The airship is capable of carrying two passengers, but for the initial trip tomorrow the daring inventor will be unaccompanied.
As to the power of the airship, Mr. Spencer says it will be able to go through any wind the velocity of which does not exceed thirty miles an hour. Extended journeys are planned by the inventor, and he says he hopes to provide surprises for the spectators.

CORSICANA WINS TEN INNING GAME

Fort Worth Batters Unable to Hit an Amateur Pitcher. Home Run in Twelfth Wins for Dallas

Fort Worth lost a ten inning game to Corsicana yesterday. The contest was marked with rugged playing and poor base running and took over two hours to be finished.

Corsicana tried a young pitcher who had never been in professional ball before, but he kept the Fort Worth batters in a nervous state throughout the entire game. Ten of them were retired on the third strike and only five hits were made off his delivery.

Fort Worth lost the game on account of errors at critical moments. Combs was the chief offender as he juggled three balls and it was too late to do anything with them.

The seventh inning was particularly disastrous as Corsicana scored three runs on account of inability to field some of the hits that were made. Combs allowed two men to get to first in this inning, both of whom were scored a minute later on Thebo's hit.

The game started like a double figure score for both sides. Corsicana batted first and made two runs without much trouble. Fort Worth went one better in the second half of the inning however.

Fort Worth added another in the fourth. In the seventh Fort Worth went up in the air and the home team made three runs. Another by Fort Worth in the same inning tied the score. No more were made until the tenth, when Maloney, the first man up, drove the ball to deep center for three bases. Miller followed this with a single and scored the winning run.

The visitors could not score in the last half of the inning. Barrett was retired from the game by the umpire, as he thought that the left fielder had thrown a bat at him. This necessitated a complete shift in the field. Dewey going to left, Pendergast to center and Lockhead to the right garden.

Fort Worth has played three series with Corsicana this season. The first series went to the Oil City team with two games out of the three. Fort Worth took all three games of the next series and Corsicana won two out of three in the last.

The team goes to Waco today for a series with the ex-champions. After playing three games there the home series with Dallas will be played. Dallas defeated Waco in a twelve inning game yesterday by a score of 7 to 1. The game was won by Bailing's home run over the left field fence in the twelfth inning.

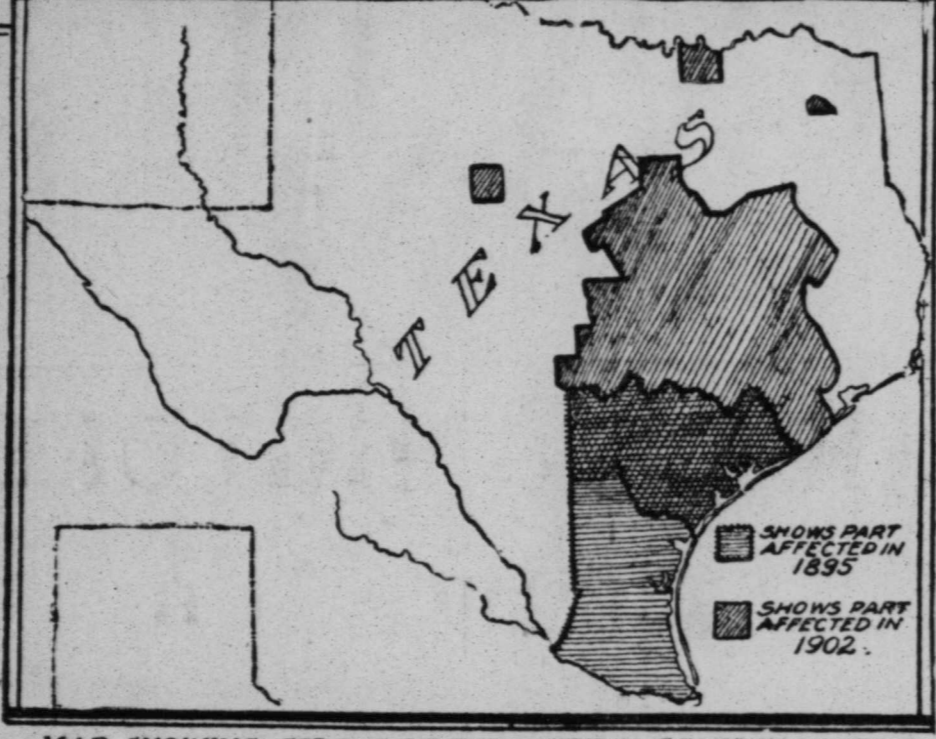

Deadly is a mild term for a pest that robs the cotton growers of millions yearly. If there were a national industrial ledger of the state of Texas in 1903 would contain an item like this: Paid to the cotton boll weevil \$20,000,000.

DR. BOAZ WAS IN GRANBURY

President of Polytechnic College Made an Address in Hood County

From the Granbury News.

Rev. H. A. Boaz, M. A., president of the Polytechnic College of Fort Worth, preached last Sunday evening to a representative congregation at the Methodist church. His text was found in Proverbs 4:7: "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom, and with all thy getting get understanding." The theme was Christian education. Mr. Boaz showed himself thoroughly conversant with his subject and always interests his audience.

He declared an education to consist in the symmetrical development of the entire man and insisted that the chief end in education was the formation of noble character. He showed how an education would enable one to live more in a given number of years, and how it would help one to do more for himself, the church and the state. He pointed out the historical fact that the great leaders of the world had been men of great wisdom, referring to Moses, Paul, Luther, Wesley and others. He gave statistics showing that while only a small portion of our population was college bred, yet a great majority of our congressmen, senators, and political leaders had enjoyed a college education.

Upon these statements he based a plea for the education of the sons and daughters of parents present, and also urged the young men and women present to use every possible means to secure the advantage of a college course.

Discussing the place for higher education, he insisted that it (all higher education) should be given under the best moral and religious influences, and that such influences could be found in the Christian colleges. The sermon was well received.

The school over which Mr. Boaz presides offers many excellent advantages. Its location is ideal, being high, healthful, situated on Polytechnic Heights overlooking the city of Fort Worth and its surrounding country. A new \$25,000 structure hall is now in course of erection and the contractors promise to have it in readiness by the opening of the next term, September 3, 1903. A strong faculty of

thirteen competent and experienced teachers is maintained. Each one is a specialist in his department. In addition to the regular college literary course superior instruction is offered in the schools of commerce, music, art, oratory and physical culture. A number of the prominent young people of Granbury will attend Polytechnic College next session.

THE SAP'S NEW PRESIDENT

Charles R. Hudson Won His Spurs in Strenuous Life of the West

Fort Worth railroad men evidence considerable interest in the election of Charles R. Hudson, former traffic manager of the Mexican Central railroad, to the presidency and also a vacancy in the directorate of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass railroad.

The retirement of W. D. Cornish from the presidency and William Berry from the board of directors of the Sap, marks the separation of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass road from the Southern Pacific system.

The action of former President Cornish in tendering his resignation was in a way so precipitous the wired Vice President M. D. Monserrate Tuesday his intention to vacate his office) that railroad people were considerably surprised. The celebrity with which Mr. Monserrate called a meeting of the directors the same evening, which chose the above named gentleman, was also a bit of quick business.

The new president of the Sap, has not as yet severed his connection with the Mexican Central. It is expected he will do so shortly, however, when he will remove to San Antonio to reside and assume the duties of his new office.

Mr. Hudson is quite well known to railroad men over the United States and especially to those of the west. From 1887 to 1889 Mr. Hudson was general freight and passenger agent of the New Mexico and Arizona and Sonora railroad. In 1889 he was made vice president of the Rio Grande and El Paso railroad, holding at the same time the office of division passenger agent of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railroad.

President Hudson's next service was as traffic manager of the Mexican Central, which he resigns now to become president of the San Antonio and Aransas Pass.

AN INCREASE IN THE IRON TRADE

Statistics Show That Furnaces Are Operating to a Greater Capacity

NEW YORK, July 10.—Our monthly blast furnace statistics show considerable increase in the operating capacity, from 358,000 tons a week for the coke and anthracite furnaces on June 1, to 403,833 tons on July 1, says the Iron Age.

The June production of all kinds of pig iron was 1,777,000 gross tons and compared with 1,758,000 tons in May, the latter, however, being a month of 31 days. Stocks of pig iron show an accumulation at an increased rate, the reports, however, not including the steel works making their own iron. This would indicate that consumption is not quite keeping pace with the supply, which it will probably be conceded in the case at the present time when labor troubles are so much interfering with the normal use of material.

The pig iron markets, although they show a little more animation, are still in an unsettled condition. There is a good deal of evidence that a number of makers in different districts are still hunting for orders and smelters are reducing their offers accordingly. The outside southern furnaces have been getting pretty close to the basis of \$13 for No. 2 at Birmingham and there is some curiosity to see what the associated makers are going to do about it. A meeting is to be held in Chicago this week. In the east the northern furnaces have been leading the market, and some of them are making lower prices than the Birmingham equivalent.

The steel market is quiet and is receding slowly. An increasing number of producers, who until now have used all they made, are in a position to let the rolling mills have occasional lots so that the offerings are more liberal. The plate and beam associations have met, but no change in prices has been made. The smaller bridge and construction companies seem to be making lower prices to secure work, this

having the effect of causing buyers to hold off.

The amount of tonnage on the whole being placed in the majority branches of the finished iron and steel trade is light and soft spots are appearing in a number of directions. As an offset, it may be observed that the output will probably be little for some time to come, since labor is difficult to keep together in various times and many mills are in need of again overhauling.

EAST-TEXAS TOBACCO CROP

Work of Harvesting at Principal Stations Will Soon Be Completed

L. H. Shelfer, in charge of the United States experimental stations at Liberty in Liberty county, Woodville, in Tyler county, Mantion and Lufkin, in Angelina county, and Nacogdoches, in Nacogdoches county, where the comprehensive experiments are being made in growing tobacco, was in Houston in conference with the Southern Pacific officials in charge of the land and immigration bureau.

When seen and asked for an opinion as to what the result would be in growing tobacco in southwest Texas Mr. Shelfer told the Chronicle:

"Well, I'll tell you now, that I am positive of what I am talking about." The southeast Texas grown tobacco is without doubt going to prove equal to any tobacco grown in Cuba or anywhere else in quality.

Continuing his remarks about the Texas tobacco, Mr. Shelfer said that the work of harvesting the crops at Lufkin, Nacogdoches and Woodville, the principal stations, would be finished within the next ten days. He thinks that the work of harvesting at the other stations which are co-operative stations, will be finished about that time also.

"Yes, I feel sure that within ten days time we will be stripping the leaves from the stalks and that by the 15th of this month the tobacco will be ready to be subjected to the fermentation process which is the next stage of its curing before it is ready for commercial purposes."

"The crops at all the experimental stations at present lead me to believe that the results will prove an agreeable surprise to Texans generally and a very great surprise to people away from this state, who do not realize the scope of the experiment the federal government is making in tobacco growing in Texas."

"The report of the United States department of agriculture will be out as soon as the tobacco at the stations is cured sufficiently to have the quality tested."

In connection with the above mentioned tobacco crops, Mr. Shelfer says that the several crops of tobacco planted in south Texas to determine what quality of tobacco could be raised in that section are about ready to be harvested and that the leaf and plant of the south Texas tobacco show that good tobacco especially adapted to the manufacture of cigars can be grown there too.

He says that this south Texas grown tobacco will be mentioned in the general report to be made by the government in the near future.

**HARRIET LANE JOHNSTON,
WHITE HOUSE MISTRESS, DEAD**

Mrs. Harriet Lane Johnston, niece of President Buchanan, who died at Narragansett Pier a few days ago, aged 79 years, and who was buried at Baltimore beside her husband and children, was mistress of the White House during her uncle's term of office, and she is well remembered by old residents of Washington.

She is recalled as she was in 1859, when she was hostess for five days to the present king of Great Britain, then the prince of Wales, at the White House. She was then Miss Lane, not being married until six years later. At that time she was 27 years old, and is remembered as a tall, well-formed girl, with golden hair, violet eyes and a general unusual attractiveness.

She fulfilled her duties as chief lady of the nation with much graceful tact and dignity. Under her regime the social life of the city was particularly brilliant. Her tact was frequently put to the test in managing discordant elements created by the impending civil war, but she met all demands with such success that she was able to preserve social unity up to the very eve of secession.

It was not alone as mistress of the White House that Mrs. Johnston was brought in contact with diplomatic life. In 1852, when Mr. Buchanan was appointed minister to England, she accompanied her uncle abroad. She became a great favorite of Queen Victoria, and many flattering attentions were lavished upon her.

She was much admired for her beauty and grace, and was one of the leading social figures at all court gatherings.

Of late years, Johnston had her home in Baltimore and at the country residence of Wheatlands, near Lancaster, Pa., which passed into her possession on the death of her uncle. She was born at Mercersburg, Pa., in 1833. Her father was Elliot F. Lane and her mother Jane Buchanan, a sister of President Buchanan. She was left an orphan and passed under the care and guardianship of her uncle.

When President Buchanan retired from office his niece accompanied him to Wheatlands, where she was in charge of

profund upon all classes of people. He was then a virtual prisoner in the vatican for many years. Yet from this retirement he has made himself so at home in the affairs of men, so necessary to the rulers of the world, that no monarch receives greater honor or yields more potent influence.

No reference to Leo XIII is complete without a mention of his efforts in behalf of peace. No occasion has been omitted on his part to avoid war and conciliate antagonism.

Such good offices are often unknown, but it is certain that in countless cases the efforts of the pope have averted outbreaks of war between nations.

A great man, filling a great office to a great and original way, with sweet sanity as well as astute statesmanship—such is the aged pope.

**A TRIBUTE TO THE
PRISONER OF THE VATICAN**

(From the Denver News.)

The venerable old man whose critical condition is holding the attention of Christendom was born in 1810. On his accession to the papacy he was 68 years old, and it was not expected that his reign would be long.

Joachim Vincent Pecci came, however, of a strong family, Countess Pecci, his mother, being a descendant of the celebrated Cola di Rienzi, the last of the Roman tribunes. He was, moreover, in spite of his procreancy as a student, a sportsman and athlete during his younger days, adding thereby a supply of reserve strength to a naturally robust constitution. His age, during the later years, although so great, has not impressed those who came in contact with him. Life, energy, active plans for the future on his part drove from the mind the thought of age. "On leaving this man of 88," said M. Vassini five years ago, "one carries away a singular impression. It is that he does not wish to die so long as there is a

battle to fight; that he does not hink of death; that he will not die!"

And the same spirit was present yesterday in his gallant fight against death. The service of Leo XIII to the church and the world has been unique and epoch-making. He has created for himself a worldwide kingdom in which he reigns with dignity and beneficence.

When Cardinal Pecci was elected to succeed Pius IX, the world regarded the papacy as a historic monument rather than an actual factor in modern life. The temporal power of the pope had been lost. Italy had become a united nation and embraced Rome in its sway. The traditions and ambitions of the church had received a blow from which it did not know how to rally. The lesser minds of the church could think only of regaining the old prestige by intrigue and political diplomacy.

Leo bided his time. He looked well to the interests of the church itself, removed inefficiency from office, encouraged learning in every way, but kept aloof from political connections. Finally Bismarck was compelled to seek the pope's aid and advice; other powers followed his example. A great future as a political force seemed opening before him, and the older order gathered hope for temporal sovereignty again.

But the pope's greatness withstood tempting openings of this sort. The kingdom of which he dreamed was a kingdom of humanity, a sway over the judgments and affections of mankind in all nations. His vision went out over all the world. He put himself in touch with every people. Gradually, as he felt himself master of the facts and principles, he began the issuance of his noteworthy encyclicals. Most of them dealt with matters connected with the supposed interests of the working class, "Liberty," "Capital and Labor." His letters to the English people and to America are among the most important of these. The impression made by these letters has been
