DEAR SIR:

The receipts of cattle for the week were 7,831 head, being much lighter than last week. The market opened Monday strong with last week's close, and we have had a steady to strong market all the week, though, as you are no doubt aware, the market for the last few weeks has been the lowest of the season.

Hog receipts for the week have been very good, there being 2,200 head on the market, although nothing like what we need. Our prices have been on about a steady basis all of the week. We don't think there is any danger in over-stocking the market, and still look for a good hog market.

The receipts of sheep this week were 821 head—not enough to test our market and interest the buyers. All the Northern markets have been much lower on sheep than for the last few weeks and our market has declined, in sympathy with them.
